

Telephone company offers optional service

An optional service that enables customers to call wide area exchanges at a reduced long distance rate is being offered at Plymouth and Willard, General Telephone Company of Ohio announced today.

Called "Optional Off-Peak Toll Service," the discounted toll-calling plan is available to residential and business customers.

Tom Souter of Norwalk, service manager, said the monthly charge is \$4.15 for the first hour (or fraction) of usage and \$1.05 for additional 15-minute segments.

Willard users will be able to call 24 area exchanges and Plymouth, 23. The exchanges are within a 22-mile radius of the two communities.

The off-peak hours are 3 p.m. to 9 a.m. weekdays, 3 p.m. Friday through 9 a.m. Monday and all hours of five holidays.

Souter said the discounted rate applies to customer-dialed station-to-station calls. Operator-assisted calls are excluded, and those made during non-off-peak hours are billed at regular toll rates.

Customers interested in the service can call the company's business office in Norwalk. No fee is charged the first time a customer signs up, he said. And the service can be discontinued at any time.

The offering of off-peak calling comes in the wake of public hearings conducted last January at Plymouth. The hearings involved a separate action initiated by a Plymouth group to establish two-way toll-free calling with Willard.

The information is strictly confidential, and pertinent data is sorted later for key information.

No-tillage planting encouraged here

The Board of Supervisors of Huron Soil and Water Conservation District has entered into an agreement with the Chief of the Division of Soil & Water Conservation Districts, Ohio Department of Natural Resources, to implement an Accelerated Conservation Tillage (ACT) demonstration program within the district for the purpose of abating agricultural sediment pollution.

The board will provide information, education, equipment and technical assistance to area farmers to demonstrate no-tillage planting methods on at least 25 farms in 1982. The program will continue through 1984 and is being funded by the U.S.E.P.A. on a 75% federal, 25% state and local match basis.

The ACT Program in Huron county is being coordinated by Bruce Atherton.

Plans are well under way for the 1982 planting. Assistance is being provided to area farmers wishing to use no-till methods.

The Huron SWCD has a 4-row, 30-inch corn/soybean planter on no-till planting. This planter and technical assistance for its use will be available to Huron county farmers on a first come, first serve basis.

The charge for use of the planter is \$65 per acre or 99 per acre if doubling back for 15-in. soybeans.

Fate of that action still is pending before the Public Utilities Commission of Ohio. The PUCO attorney's report to the commission is expected soon, Souter said.

Eligible homeowners are asked to return their homestead exemption application to the Huron county auditor's office by June 7.

The auditor has mailed out 2,100 applications and only 1,400 have been returned.

To receive the homestead exemption a homeowner must be 65 years of age or permanently and totally

disabled and have owned and occupied the house as a principal place of residence as of Jan. 1, 1982.

Total income cannot exceed \$15,000 yearly. Those who have not applied before and are eligible may call the real estate assessment office in the Huron county courthouse for more details.
