Street repairs in village considered by councilmen

Repairs to both water towers were seriously considered by village council Monday night during a work session.

James C. Root, village administrator, recommended that the council accept the estimates of \$4,995 for work on each tower.

The old tower would be put into working order to serve while the new tower is being

renovated and then would serve as a back-up in the future.

Figures prepared by Root for the water department fall within the \$14,600 which is available in the water fund for capital improvements.

Root had earmarked \$2,000 for new water meters but said he has been able to purchase what is needed so far from the operating and maintain-

ance fund.

Council questioned the \$5,000 he had earmarked to find water leaks, and he said that probably was high.

Repairs to the village buildings in New street will amount to \$4,000 and shared by the electric, income tax, water and sewer funds.

Capital improvements for the electrical distribution system are set at about

\$20,000 which will include tree trimming and following the recommendations of John Savvel, electrical consultant to the village, to upgrade the system.

Street repairs being considered amount to \$42,537, most of which will come from the income tax fund if the complete program is approved.

But now the sadness has begun. The last time he was home he said, "You know, Mom, we have two Christmas cards left because everyone we want to school and worked with are divorced. And because it is getting so costly, they send a wife one year and the husband the next."

They were such nice young families, all with young children. To me this is heart breaking.

They all had nice homes and were excellent cooks. If anyone had a party, everyone had a party, everyone pitched in and brought something really special.

They were great on dips, and since they were living close to the artichoke center of the nation, they were readily available and considerably cheaper than here.

If there are just four for a dinner or a supper, this can make a nice first course and not break you up too much.

Cook the artichokes in boiling water for about 30 minutes, drain well and chill.

Serve with these dips.

Combine a cup of mayonnaise with two tablespoons lemon juice and mix well.

The second is a cup of mayonnaise, mixed with two teaspoons dry mustard and a teaspoon of Worcestershire sauce.

This makes a nice variety with very little effort.

Overdue books to cost more

Overdue books cost your more, overdue records and films slightly less at Mansfield-Richland County Public Library.

Fines for items overdue at the main library, branches, and red city bookmobile are as follows:

5¢ per item pre day maximum fine \$5 per item for books, periodicals, pamphlets, pictures, phonorecords, audio cassettes, and films.

\$1 per item per day (maximum \$10 per item) for 16mm films, videotapes, and framed art prints.

\$2 per item per day (maximum \$20 per item) for equipment such as super 8mm projectors.

Because the green county bookmobile makes its rounds less frequently, its fine schedule is slightly different. Books, records, periodicals, and pamphlets checked out from the green county bookmobile will be fined at the rate of 10¢ per item for each stop at which the item is not returned, for example, each time the bookmobile visits the location where the item was checked out. The maximum fine will be \$5 per item on such overdue bookmobile materials.
