

Teachers to receive salary increase

Teachers of Plymouth Local School district will receive a 2.5 per cent salary increase beginning July 1.

Meeting in a special session Thursday the Board of Education agreed to the salary increase formally with the Plymouth Education association had approved two weeks earlier.

Along with the salary increase, the starting salary was raised \$300 to \$11,900.

Some of the fringe benefits have also been increased.

Also beginning July 1, sick leave was increased to eight days a year from five and can now accumulate up to 200 days; the board will pay \$105 per month for hospitalization insurance on the family plan and \$42 for a single person and severance pay was increased to 40 days.

Beginning Sept. 1, dental insurance in the amount of \$17.72 will be paid.

\$500,000 damage to farm sheds

Two local issues on ballot Tuesday

Tuesday's ballot will have only two local issues to be voted upon.

Both involve new taxation. Plymouth township is asking for 3 mills or three cents for each \$100 of valuation. Plymouth residents will not vote on this issue. Those living in the township outside the corporate limits will vote on it.

It is to run for three years, for 1982, 1983 and 1984.

Proceeds are designated to pay for ambulance service which the township has contracted with the village

for a three year period.

Joseph Leach, township clerk-treasurer, estimates that if the levy is successful, it will bring in about \$2,700 a year. That is the sum the township is paying the village for this year. The next two years under the contract escalate slightly.

The village levy is for a three millage which amounts to thirty cents for each \$100 of valuation.

It is to replace the present three mills which expires at the end of this year

earmarked for the purchase of a new fire pump.

The thinking of the council was that it was really not in effect for the last five years, merely an extension although it will actually cost taxpayers a small amount more because it will be based on the new valuations of property which were not in effect when the first three mills was approved.

It is specifically designated for "providing additional

funds for the operation and maintenance of the fire department, including providing and maintaining fire apparatus, appliance,

buildings or sites or to purchase ambulance equipment or to provide ambulance or emergency medical services operated by the fire department.

If approved, the levy will be for a continuing amount of time with no set year or years. It will bring in about \$20,000 annually.

The sea sonal increase in contact and our adjustment to our West Demolition neighborhood the past four and one half months have caused me to reflect on some of the relationships and experiences my husband, daughter and I have shared with former and current neighbors.

We have always thought good relationships with our neighbors are important. We try to be supportive in appropriate ways.

Over the years my husband and I have collected mail, watered plants, and snow shoveled walks for those we've lived near. I have shared baked goods and baby sitting with them and invited them to dinner. Chip has helped move furniture and moved lawns. Of course there are some memorable occasions to be noted.

The elderly widow who lived next door in California once telephoned Chip at work to say there were unauthorized swimmers in our pool. I never worried too much when we were gone since her kitchen window overlooked our house, and no hired guard could have been more observant.

Another Californian also telephoned Chip at work to say Dolly, our cocker spaniel, had gone into the house via the dog door . . . and so had another dog who had dug a hole under our fence and crawled into the yard.

We arrived in West Demolition the first day of this year and the moving van came on the fourth day. Always will be grateful to the McCullochs who lent us a snow shovel and a card table and chairs. They also invited our daughter to spend moving-in day to play at their house.

All that is secondary, however, to their being considerate enough to have a daughter just the age of ours.

When our daughter was a toddler, we lived next door to a 13 year old boy whom she idolized. We laughed often at how embarrassing it was for him to be called "BO" (her pronunciation of Bill), and to be pursued regularly by such a fan. Bill was truly a patient and tolerant teen-aged neighbor.

Our daughter has her own perceptions of neighborliness and how to implement it.
