

State's fiscal pinch pressing — Red ink foreseen in schools' '83 budget

The fiscal pinch, brought about in part by straitened state finances, is beginning to squeeze Plymouth schools.

Plymouth Board of Education approved the 1983 budget Monday night. It calls for red ink of \$153,952 in the general fund, with estimated expenditures and beginning balance of \$2,131,520 and expenditures of \$2,285,472.

All other funds are in black ink save the lunch room fund, which shows a deficit of \$683.

Sup. Douglas Stagg told the board the state has cut basic aid by four per cent and categorical aid, such as payments for special education, transportation and other purposes, by 7.86 per cent. Additionally, it has adopted a posture of paying only 40 per cent of a school district's allocation of funds in the first six months. Stagg said the district is losing \$63,291 from what was earmarked in the biennium budget. Coupled with what was withheld last year, loss to the district over two fiscal years is "over \$100,000," he said.

Outstanding indebtedness of the district as of Jan. 1, 1983, will be \$1,210,000, of which \$800,000 will be settled during the year. Interest due will be \$69,800.

Save for the bond retirement fund, the board intends to spend every penny available to it to hold

the line and maintain the present level of instruction.

Two vacancies remain. One is a learning disabilities teacher, the other a business education teacher.

Mrs. Molly Gatoff resigned as girls' junior high basketball coach. Mmes. Thomas Dawson, fifth grade teacher, and Paul McClintock were accorded maternity leave. Mrs. Dawson's leave is for the entire school year. Mrs. McClintock intends to work until her confinement, anticipated to be in December.

Goals of the district for 1983 were approved as submitted by Stagg. Mostly they are a restating of previous aims.

These include:

1. Continue to work on community involvement.

2. Development of CPR instruction. All coaches and extra curricular assignees should be qualified. A six hour course in first aid will be accomplished during the in-service day in the fall. Additional training will be organized so that each employee, whether certificated or otherwise, will be qualified to administer CPR.

3. Development of an attendance policy in the high school. The dropout rate is "fairly decent," Stagg said. Elementary school attendance rate was 96 per cent, an improvement, Stagg said. High

school rate was only 91 per cent two points below the county average.

4. Study and evaluate the grading system for grades one through eight.

5. Examine the health program in grades kindergarten through nine.

6. Coordinate a school bus discipline program.

7. Continue to expand the program for the talented and gifted.

8. Examine and evaluate the board's official policies.

9. Continue positive efforts to improve staff relations, energizing of buildings and to remain solvent.

Owing to poor economic conditions, the board will not tamper with the fee schedule save to increase the driver education fee by \$3 to \$23. Total cost to the district for each pupil is \$73, paid to an Elyria firm. The state will contribute \$50 a pupil.

Approval was given to Stagg, Robert Wagner, Edward M. Kinzel and Keith Johnson to purchase surplus property from the state agency.

Routine renewal was accorded to agreements with the Richland county office to furnish specialized assistance, to continue the PPPF program, by which the guidance counselor at Shiloh is partially funded, and the employees' liability insurance coverage.

\$10,000 set in grant for roads

Plymouth will get \$10,000 from a block grant accorded Richland county; its commissioners have ruled.

The money is to be spent on street repair.

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Remember Sig. M. F. Corne! He proved tomatoes safe

As a country of a lot of people, we are a little slow about some things.

Mostly foods.

It really wasn't until after World War II, when everyone came back from there and there, and traveling became cheap and more available to everyone, that new foods were added to everyday eating.

If you lived in an area where what is called ethnic foods were made, then your diet was a little more varied.

I never had a pizza and

never even heard of one until 1946, when a new husband said one night, "Let's go to Bound Brook for a pizza."

Mexican foods were unheard of in this part of the country, pasta dishes were something like macaroni and cheese on Friday nights, curry was a non-existent word, and none of our mothers thought about making a tasty sauerkraut ball. You simply ate the sauerkraut bare.

This is nothing really new to my life time, granted it

stretches over a lot of time. I really cannot remember if back in the early 1800's if tomatoes were thought polite or made one a little overzealous. Whatever it was, it was bad, bad, bad and to be avoided.

Then, a nice young Italian artist by the name of Michel Felice Corne arrived.

He was a Neapolitan and had been eating tomatoes his whole life.

Somehow he was drafted into the Italian army and made friends with an American general who liked him a free ride over here. In return he painted a lovely picture of the general's ship, which started him on a real career of marine paintings.

He settled in Newport, R.I., and built himself a lovely house and planted a nice garden, mostly tomatoes, which he ate everyday.

His neighbors, being friendly people, watched him like a hawk, for the bad effects. Nothing happened, he simply thrived and kept on painting.

By the time he passed on at the age of 88, all his neighbors were enjoying those reddish tidbits.

He is buried in Newport

and there is a marker on his house which says, "Corne House, Home of the Artist Michel Felice Corne, Who Introduced the Tomato into This Country."

He really is one of our greatest heroes and hardly anyone has even heard of him.

So far, this is plain fact, but this I am kind of making up.

I think perhaps this Father of Tomatoes might possibly have enjoyed this. It is an old Dutch recipe, and the Dutch were here when he was and as were we.

It is Honey Bread.

Grease a bread pan, turn the oven on to 350.

When those chores are done, the rest is easy.

Mix two cups of flour, three fourths of a cup of brown sugar (dark), a tablespoon of baking powder, two teaspoons of cinnamon, a fourth of a teaspoon each of cloves, nutmeg and salt.

Add a cup of buttermilk, a fourth of a cup of honey and a well-beaten egg.

Mix thoroughly and bake for about an hour until a toothpick comes out clean.

The spices perk it up, and if you have some stray raisins around, toss them in too.

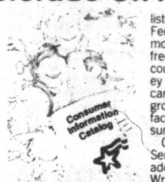

51 runs made by ambulance

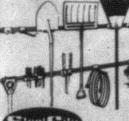
Fifty-one runs were made by the ambulance during the first six months of the year.

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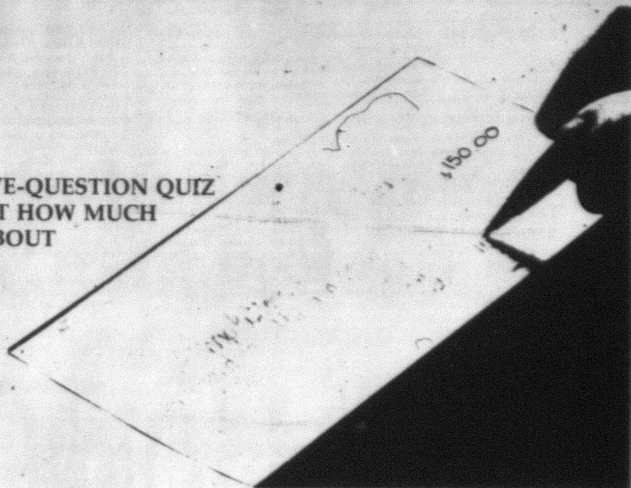

- False.** Shoplifting accounts for \$3.5 billion in lost merchandise nationally, according to the Federal Bureau of Investigation. Ohio's shoplifting tab is estimated by the Attorney General to be \$488 million for 1973. Shoplifting is the fastest-growing white collar crime in America. Between 1963 and 1973 it increased at a faster rate than any other crime.
People pay the shoplifter's way. People pay over \$35 individually per year or \$150 per family on increased cost of goods they purchase.
- False.** People who shoplift are not generally poor. They often have sufficient cash with them and can afford to pay for what they steal. But you pay for them through higher prices.
- False.** More women than men shoplift. The Mass Retailing Institute conducted a survey in 1972 in 1,188 of the nation's largest discount stores and discovered that 58 percent of the apprehended shoplifters were women.
- True.** Eighty percent of all shoplifting is done in suburban outlets of retail establishments.
- False.** You can do something about shoplifting. If you see someone shoplifting, quietly mention it to the nearest sales clerk. You need not become involved. The thief will probably steal somewhere else before leaving the store, and the store detective will be there to see it happen.

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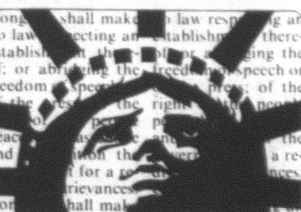

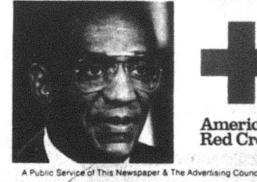

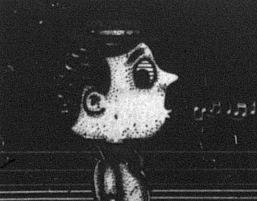
