It is 20 years since Plymouth Board of Education was asked to reexamine its policy of authorizing religious instruction during school hours on school premises.

The request was buttressed with written opinions of the Medina county prosecutor, where the question had been raised, and of the Ohio attorney general.

The board declined to change its position. Each year since, the same objection has been raised by the same person. In recent years it got to be more or less of a joke: the board knew the objector would speak up (the objector grew milder as the objector aged and his children were no longer in school) and the objector knew the board understood what it was doing was unlawful, illegal and unconstitutional, yet it would persist it is error.

Now, under threat of legal action by an organization with substantially more legal horses than the objector could muster, and with substantially less to lose in public esteem by objecting, the board has heeded the advices of its legal counselor and withheld approval of the program.

We'll state, once again, for the umpteenth time, our stance: if the board wants to allow the children to put on their boots and leave the school to go to a church for religious instruction, we'll carry the kids on our backs so long as it holds out. But if it wishes to place those children in a public classroom, heated with public funds, swept by personnel paid by public money, nothing doing!

The law is the law.

And there is nothing so proper as an idea that has ripened, a thought that, at long last, has reached its time.

Religion classes put in limbo

Exactly 24 years after it was first asked to do so, on the grounds that conducting Bible classes in the public schools is unconstitutional, Plymouth Board of Education voted unanimously Thursday night to postpone resumption of such classes.

A request to resume the classes filed by North Richland County Council of Christian Education was tabled.

The board acted after a closed executive session with the county prosecutor, John Allen, himself a born-again.

By sale or abandonment —

First Buckeye to terminate all operations in Plymouth

First Buckeye Bank, N.A., will terminate its operations in Plymouth as soon as possible, in any event no later than July 31, 1983. The announcement was made to stockholders by certified mail Aug. 25.

Efforts to sell the Plymouth operation have been in course for some time, the bank said. These have not so far proved fruitful. If a sale cannot be effected, the bank said on page 7 of its report to the stockholders, it will abandon the banking operation here.

Reason for the action is that the new owner of First Buckeye, Trustcorp, Toledo, fears that the regulating authority will disapprove the merger of First Buckeye Bank, N.A., with Trustcorp unless the combine divests itself of the Plymouth operation which would otherwise give it a dominating position in the banking business in southern Huron county. Trustcorp already controls Willard United bank, with offices in Willard, North Fairfield and Greenwich as well as Plymouth.

When Avery C. Hand, Jr., chairman and president of First National Bank of Mansfield,

attended a luncheon for J. Rives Childs, retired American ambassador to Ethiopia and Saudi Arabia, here on Nov. 26, 1975, he told the editor of The Advertiser that negotiations to merge with Peoples National bank had resulted in refusal of the smaller institution to accept First National's offer. Some fresh data were furnished Hand by the editor. On Jan. 5, 1976, the two banks announced intent to merge. This was approved Mar. 30, 1977. At the time, Peoples National had assets of \$16,081,617, with a surplus of \$531,250 and undivided profits of \$375,473.64.

First National paid \$25 a share for Peoples National stock. This amounted to \$1,265,625. Considering there was \$905,723.64 in cash included in the transaction, First National paid only \$359,901.36 for the banking business in Plymouth.

In its announcement to its stockholders of Aug. 25, dated Aug. 20, First Buckeye says assets of its banks in Plymouth amount to \$14,041,394, with deposits of \$13,887,553 and loans of \$5,529,019.

Buckeye says in its report it is

"unable to predict at this time whether these offices can be sold before July 31, 1983, the date after which Buckeye or Trustcorp may unilaterally terminate the merger agreement, or the terms on which it may be able to dispose of these two offices. However, Trustcorp does not expect that the effect on the net assets of Trustcorp and Buckeye as a result of the proposed disposition will be material."

Under terms of the merger, Toledo Trustcorp's offer provides that stockholders in First Buckeye will receive for each share of common stock of par value of \$5 one share of newly issued Trustcorp no par preferred stock paying a cumulative dividend of \$2.90 annually. The preferred stock is redeemable after five years at \$26.50 a share and is convertible into 55/100 of a share of Trustcorp stock at any time.

First Buckeye had assets of \$271 million at the end of last year. Deposits amounted to somewhat over \$229 million and loans to about \$84.5 million. Net income during 1981 was \$3,770,819. Book value of First Buckeye stock was \$22.41 on June 30, when the stock was sold for 18 1/2 bid, 19 1/2 asked.

Induced to quit here — Sturman seeks \$750,000 from Illinois business

The former president of Plymouth Locomotive Works, Inc., has sued the employer that lured him from here for \$750,000.

William S. Sturman, Mansfield, who says he resigned from PLW on May 14, charges in his suit that Varlen Corp., Rolling Meadows, Ill., induced him to quit here and then withdrew an offer of a high-paying executive job.

Sturman's petition, filed in Richland county common pleas court, was filed by Terry Kilgore, a Mansfield lawyer. It asserts that J.J. Conner, president and chief executive officer of Varlen, promised him a position as president and chief operating officer of a newly formed

locomotive manufacturing operation, with an annual salary of \$55,000, a guaranteed bonus of \$15,000, use of an automobile, paid hospitalization, paid life insurance and other benefits.

The 53-year-old Sturman says that, based on Conner's promises, he resigned here from a post that paid him \$60,000 a year, plus use of a car, a \$100,000 life insurance policy, stock options and a substantial pension. He says he was employed by Varlen between May 24 and June 9, when he supplied Varlen with "valuable information" and performed "valuable services" for the development of a locomotive manufacturing plant, including

establishment of a 24-month management timetable organized in six month increments, development of a market analysis on the state of locomotive manufacturing, preparation of computer programming information system and the preparation of some work-up process formats.

Sturman says he received two months' salary from the defendant.

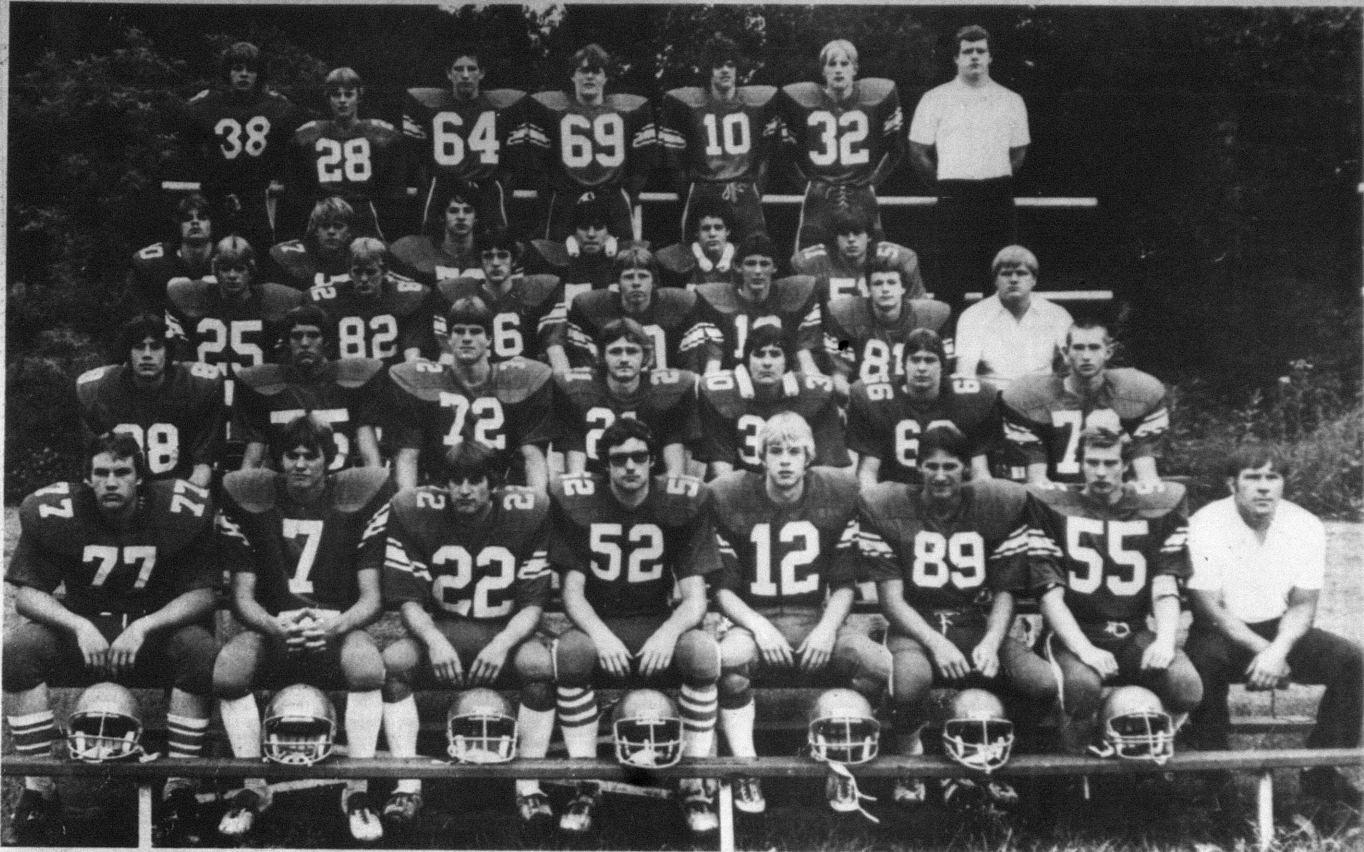

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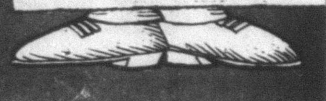
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'65 grad's son a champ

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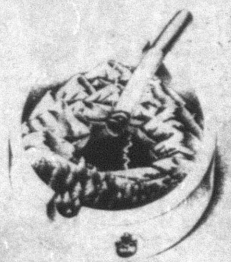
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
