

Are data of any use?

Anyone whose interest in who he is and where he lives and how living is there has a proper interest in the returns of the decennial census, which was completed in 1980, almost three years ago.

It is depressing, to say the least, that so much of the data that was assembled at that time has not been made available to the public. Presumably, the Bureau of the Census will in time publish these data so that demographers, planners, economists, community managers and business people can utilize them for the purpose intended. But that does us but little good now.

Nevertheless, we have been active in searching out the data.

Time was when one could obtain for himself, through his Congressman, a free copy of the data. Not very many asked for them, their cost wasn't all that great, and Congressmen were glad to oblige. Some of them even stamped "This document provided by the courtesy of Rep. Soandoo" on the cover.

No more, alas. Some repositories of the data have been declared to be open during normal business hours to any resident who may wish to consult the data. The nearest ones are in the libraries of Ashland college, Heidelberg college at Tiffin, Oberlin college and the city of Marion.

When you get there, you won't find much.

Some of what you will find is worth considering at this time of year, when, classically, folks think of moving.

The official population of Plymouth in 1980, was 1,939 persons, a decrease of 54 persons from 1970 but up from the 1,882 persons counted in 1970. During the 10-year period between 1980 and 1980, the Richland county side of the village lost 211 persons (please don't ask us where they were housed in 1970; we frankly don't know!) and the Huron county side gained 157 persons (we know where they're housed). So in 1980, Richland county population was 970, Huron county 969.

Huron county's population had grown from 49,587 in 1970, Richland county from 129,997.

There were 680 households in Plymouth, of which 678 were white and six of Spanish origin. A total of 1,939 persons lived in households as families, of which 1,924 were white and 19 Spanish.

And there were 461 married couple families and 51 families with only a female as head of the household.

As more data become available, we shall seek to interpret what they mean.

What these data mean is obvious.

It will become more obvious when the data respecting income level is applied to the population.

The Census bureau doesn't make it easy for communities of under 2,500 persons, but it can be done. And we have done so.

We suggested only the other day that this sort of thing ought to be at the fingertips of the village council and those who are engaged in planning, not to mention those whose duty it is to infuse money into the community to provide its needs.

And we were told, "Don't waste your time? They don't want it, and most of all they don't know what to do with it if they do have it."

It is still hard, after 29 years, for us to accept that.

Ohio denies Reed claim for benefits

An order handed down May 2 by Charles W. Kohler, referee, Ohio Bureau of Employment Benefits, contradicts claims by Mrs. Robert Reed, Plymouth route 1, that she will receive unemployment benefits as a result of termination of her employment by the village.

Mrs. Reed represented last week that because of her claim of harassment on the job, an earlier decision of the Bureau on Oct. 26 was overturned and she would receive benefits.

Kohler's findings on appeal stated "It is obvious the claimant had other alternatives to quitting her employment. Although the claimant may have had valid personal reasons for leaving her employment, the reason for

quitting does not constitute just cause for quitting work within the meaning of Section 4141.29 (D) (2) (a), ORC. The referee must hold that the suspension of benefits rights was properly imposed by the administrator."

Mrs. Reed asserted in her initial claim that she performed but did not enjoy searching for female prisoners as ordered by police officers, that taking statements and completing of individuals was not part of her duties, that she did not like making decisions as police dispatcher as to whether to send a police vehicle in response to a complaint, that her job contained too many responsibilities and did not include pay for overtime, and that she did not refuse to work overtime.

A ruling by Ohio's Supreme Court reinstates Judge Robert W. Smith as common pleas judge of Huron county.

The ruling was handed down May 17. His status as judge was challenged by Clark Hunter, clerk of courts, who said Smith failed to take his oath of office within the time period specified by law.

The court said Smith is the duly elected judge of the court and dismissed other parts of a suit filed by Smith's friends.

Absentee ballots available

Absentee ballots are now available at the Huron county board of elections, Newark, for the June 7 special election for those living on the Huron county side of the village.

For Richland counties, they are available at the county administration office, Mansfield. The deadline to use the ballot is June 4 at noon.

A registered voter in the village is entitled to vote by absentee ballot for the following reasons:

He is over 62 years of age; he will be absent from the county on election day; he will be confined to a hospital; he is a service man or spouse or on active duty with the organized militia; he is personally ill or physically disabled; he is confined to a jail, under sentence for a misdemeanor or awaiting trial on election day.

One may vote in person at the election board office or request in writing that a ballot be sent stating one's reason and some address. All ballots returned to the election board office by the closing of the polls on election day are eligible to be counted.

Plymouth will pause Monday to pay its respects to those who died in nine national conflicts.

Its annual Memorial day program is organized by Shiloh-Parmel Post 447, American Legion.

The planner, Salvatore J. Glorioso, a life member of the post, was taken ill May 9 and admitted to the intensive care unit of Shelby Memorial hospital.

The post commander, J. Max Fidler, has substituted for him.

Stanley Wolczyk, a wounded veteran of Army service in the Aleutians, now principal of Loyal Oak Elementary school at Norton, will be principal speaker.

He is the father-in-law of Mark Sheely, principal of Plymouth Elementary school.

Married 42 years, he is the father of two children and the grandfather of five. He is an alumnus of Baldwin-Wallace college, Berea, and took a master of arts degree in education administration from Kent State university.

As a youth, he served 13 months in the Civilian Conservation Corps. He taught 10 years in Army dependent schools in Germany and is the first Ohioan in education to receive the Freedom Foundation medal for service to American youth.

He will retire as an educator on July 1. David Williamson, president and general manager of Station WSWR, Shelby-Willard, will be master of ceremonies.

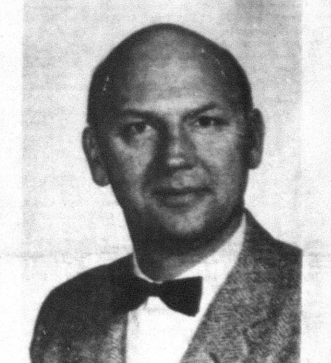

Richland county coroner dies at 78

Services for Dr. Milton C. Oakes, 78, Richland county coroner, were conducted at Mansfield Saturday at 10 a. m.

He died of heart seizure at his home May 18 at 6 a. m. Dr. Barbara A. Reed, Mansfield, has been named acting coroner.

A replacement to succeed Dr. Oakes will be chosen by the central committee of the Republican party in the county. A successor must be named by June 3.

Born in Breckville June 21, 1904, Dr. Oakes grew up on his parents' farm. He was graduated by Breckville High school, where he ex-

celled as a pole vaulter and high jumper, in 1921. He attended Baldwin-Wallace college, Berea, for two years, then transferred to Western Reserve university at Cleveland, where he received a bachelor of arts degree in education in 1925. He coached the famous Olympic champion Jesse Owens at Fairmont Junior High school, Cleveland.

Dr. Oakes was principal, teacher and coach at Tallmadge and Valley City before he entered the college of medicine of Ohio State university in 1927. He interned at Methodist hospital, Indianapolis, Ind., and began a practice in Lexington in

1932. He entered Harvard university post graduate school of medicine in 1938, specializing in eye, ear, nose and throat ailments. When he graduated, he was assistant resident in ophthalmology of New Haven hospital, New Haven, Conn.

He served five years in the Medical Corps of the Army, including two years as chief of eye, ear, nose and throat department, 61st General hospital, Burford, Eng. He was discharged as a lieutenant colonel.

He returned to Mansfield in 1946 and opened his practice there.

He was chairman of the EENT section, Mansfield General hospital, from 1957 to 1962 and served on the staff of Mansfield General, Peoples, Madison and Shiloh by Memorial hospitals until the early 1960s.

He learned to fly in 1937 and retired from the air in 1972.

He was appointed to succeed Dr. Raymond Thabet Dec. 14, 1978, and was elected to a full term in November, 1979.

He is survived by his wife, nee Mary Louise Tillman, and a sister, Beatrice, now Mrs. Wilson C. Jones, Ft. Pierce, Fla.

Burial was in Highland cemetery, Breckville.

cups of boiling water, add the
