She carried powder blue and baby pink and yellow statens with fresh daisies. She wore a gold cobra heart

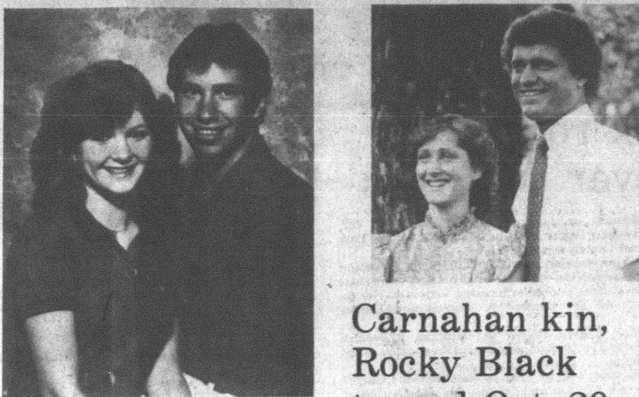

'We ought to get out of Ghana at once!'

"There are a lot of reasons," Williamson said, "and they all have to do with being able to show them that doing it another way doesn't damage them and works faster and cheaper. But that's easier said than done."

Ghana has experienced several coups d'etat since Nkrumah was deposed in the late 60's. He was sent to Guinea, where he died. His remains were returned to Ghana for entombment.

The chief of government now is a young air force officer of company grade

who plays hand-in-glove with Colonel Khandaf of Libya and fosters an anti-American, pro-Marxist government that makes life for Americans difficult at best. To live at the official rate of exchange is prohibitive for Americans, but to do otherwise is to court arrest by the Ghanians, who deal harshly with Americans, to whom the U.S. government only promises to see to it that mail is delivered if they are incarcerated.

"West African jails are unspeakable, and that's a mild word," Williamson said.

Is the Peace Corps a

success? "Yes and no. Ghana was the first country to sign up for the Peace Corps and I'd have to say from what I saw of it and know about it, the Peace Corps hasn't been a great success. Some of the fault is that of the Corps, but the most of it is that Ghana expected the wrong thing at the wrong time and didn't do its share of cooperating to make the idea work."

His lament is the same as hundreds of Point IV and Peace Corps and similar workers throughout Africa, Asia and Central and South America.

I am a mixture of white and dark meat, cheaper than buying chickens, cooking them and taking them apart. So far we have only made chicken salad from one package. With all that goes in besides the chicken like some chopped onion, a couple hard boiled eggs, celery, mayonnaise, grapes, and flavoring, salad olives, too you can almost clean out your refrigerator. Even small pieces of raw zucchini, peas, carrots, you name it.

Anyway, it made enough for five large servings. The second night, I threw in some curry powder, which made it a new meal.

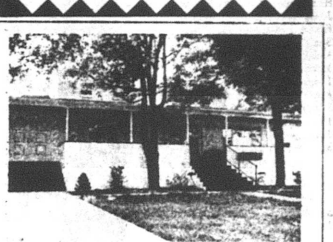
