

1937 alumna quits teaching after 25 years

A 1937 alumna of Plymouth High school who found her métier in teaching and did so in Plymouth district for 25 years didn't answer the bell Tuesday. Miss Jeannette Hamilton officially retired.

A graduate of Ohio university, Athens, she taught sixth grade at Shiloh. She is the daughter of the late Leah Hamilton. She was raised on the farm in Route 603 where she now lives. Her late sister, Esther, then Mrs. Frank C. Fennell, also taught in Plymouth schools for many years.

Kevin Steinmetz, a recent alumna of Ohio State university, was hired to succeed her.

He will also be assistant coach in football and wrestling.

Mrs. John Eichelberry, now Vicki Wallen, an alumna of Plymouth High school and of Ohio State university, was employed as third grade teacher in Plymouth Elementary school.

Advisers to high school classes were appointed. These are Mrs. William

Albright, mathematics teacher, 12th grade; Mrs. Carol Kirkpatrick, home economics teacher, 11th grade; Richard Roll, industrial arts teacher, 10th grade; David P. Dunn, work experience teacher, ninth grade.

Mrs. Albright will be adviser to Louis Bromfield chapter, National Honor society, and Mrs. Kirkpatrick to the high school student council.

Sam Cook, athletic director and physical education teacher, was appointed head teacher in the high school. Miss Suzanne Farmer, Shiloh, and Mrs. Paul Gase, Plymouth, will serve in similar capacities in their buildings.

Five were certified as substitute bus drivers. These are James Hawk, Robert Adams, George Shepherd, Marilyn Stevens and Leanne Hall.

Wanda Neely was hired as part-time cleaner in Plymouth Elementary school. Tuition rates were set at \$16.82 a month.

Conley to alter plea, resign as chief here

Robert Conley will resign as police chief of Plymouth and change his plea to the charge that he committed a felonious assault against his estranged wife, Wendy, at Mansfield on Apr. 22 last.

Conley's attorney, Robert Whitney, Lexington, confirmed last week that the chief will plead guilty or nolo contendere (which means he will admit the facts as stated in the indictment) to a reduced charge.

When the plea will be entered is uncertain. Whitney has notified the court of common pleas that Conley wishes to alter his plea. The move comes after an obvious bit of bargaining. Earlier, those who have in the past asserted "insider information" said Conley stoutly refused to bargain after the prosecution offered it to him. Their information was that Mrs. Conley had become disenchanted with testifying and the whole case had devolved into a vendetta by Mansfield policemen against Conley, a former deputy sheriff under the convicted Thomas Walsh.

The facts are that prosecutors showed Whitney their evidence, as required by law. Most of it centered about the firm identification of Conley's black

Mustang hurrying away from the scene of the alleged assault at great speed, so much so that it outdistanced the hot pursuit of Mansfield police, and that an impression taken of Mrs. Conley's bite matched an impression taken of Conley's left hand, where there was a contusion obviously incurred after Apr. 21 at 11 p.m., when he went off shift. Two of his subordinates, Capt. Frank Hodge and a dispatcher, told the prosecutor Conley had no scar nor mark on his hand when he left the police station at the end of his shift on Apr. 21.

Further, Conley is alleged to have gone to a common place of assembly in the village and there to have stated to several witnesses that he planned "to kill that woman". He had not been drinking when he said to have uttered that statement, witnesses say.

Judge Nelson Kimerline, Crawford county pleas court, is hearing the case because Judge Max Chilcote disqualified himself. Chilcote said he had dealings with Conley in the past, when Conley was a detective in the sheriff's office, and wished to avoid any suspicion of favoritism.

A 16-year-old Plymouth fifth school boy was charged with drunken driving Friday night after his car left Route 61 north of Shelby and struck a utility pole and culvert.

George Baldridge, who lives in Preston road, Shelby route 3, was treated and released at Shelby Memorial hospital.

He was the driver. He said he was headed north when he saw a southbound car overtaking another vehicle. To avoid it he steered off the road.

His passengers also were treated and released. These were Jennifer Burkhalter, 13, 223 Nichols street; Jeffrey Badden, 14, 48 Dix street, and Craig Baldridge, 14, brother of the driver.

The 1980 Datsun SL 210 station wagon driven by Baldridge was heavily damaged.

Board approves 4% pay rise for principals

A four per cent pay raise for administrators and non-certificated staff was approved by Plymouth Board of Education Thursday.

Cost to the board for non-certificated staff will be \$14,087. Additional fringe benefits will add \$4,400.

These include a vision plan under the Blue Cross group policy on which the board

will pay \$10.68 a month for family coverage and \$3.74 a month for single coverage.

The board already pays up \$150 a month for hospital coverage for a family and up to \$48 a month for single individuals.

Dental insurance is \$22 a month for both family and single coverage.

Bible classes fail to obtain authorization

Resumption of religious instruction for elementary pupils is still down the road a way, Plymouth Board of Education decided Thursday night.

The board said insurance coverage proposed by North Central Council of Christian Religious Education and phrasing of the permission slip to be executed by parents of the children do not meet with its standards.

If and when the council can overcome these objections, religious instruction may be resumed.

The board balked at the phrasing of the permission slip. It wants to have nothing to do with collection of the slips, whereas the

council wants the teachers to administer the program by distributing and collecting the slips. And the board wishes not to be a party to permission slips that relate to the Crawford district as well.

An opinion of Richland County Prosecutor John Allen states the council must solicit permission from the parents by mail. Permission to the council without involvement of the school. The classes must, of course, be conducted off the school premises.

The board had other reservations, none of them sufficient to disqualify the program but requiring further assurances, which may be forthcoming on Sept. 8.

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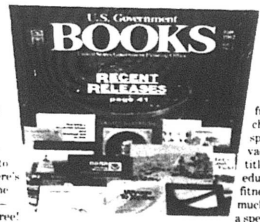

Free, lower price lunch rules set

Policy for free and reduced-price meals for children unable to pay full price of meals served under the National School Lunch program. School officials have adopted the following income eligibility scale for free or reduced-price meals.

Children from households with income at or below the levels shown may be eligible for free and reduced-price meals.
Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced benefits, households should fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. A complete application is required. For an application to be complete, the following information must be provided: the total household income, the names of all household members, social security numbers, social security numbers 21 years or older or a statement that a household member does not have one, and the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct. If information is missing, the application cannot be processed by the school.
The information is provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year. To discourage the possibility of misrepresentation, the application forms contain a statement above the space for signature certifying that all information furnished is true and correct. Applications are being made in connection with the application of federal funds. School or other officials may check the information on the application at any time during the school year. Deliberate misrepresentation of information may subject the applicant to prosecution under applicable state and federal laws.
Households will be notified of the approval or denial of benefits. If a child is approved for meal benefits, the school must be informed when a household's income increases by more than \$50 a month (\$800 a year) or when household size decreases. In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals for them, the school should be contacted.

Bring plants, inside for drying, freezing

There's one thing for sure: September means that summer is ending.
But there is still time to get ready for what is ahead.
Start thinking of bringing some plants inside and get them because they can make great, quick gifts.
This should keep them blooming for months. Mix up a teaspoon each of baking powder, salt peter, agave salts and ammonia. Mix it in a gallon of water, and dose your plants with it every three weeks.
It will do wonders for them, but keep it away from people.
Another little thing to do about now is to mix up what herbs you have growing or can borrow.
Everyone has seen recipes that call for "bouquet garni". It is merely French for a tasty mixture of herbs.
Traditionally it should have parsley, bay leaves, thyme, basil and oregano, dried and tied up in a little piece of cheesecloth, to add to stews, soups, casseroles and such. Once they are put together, it is much better when you want to mix up something, and you must hunt through all your spices looking for this or that.
This can also be a very welcome gift, unless you use them all up yourself.
Small jars of flavored vinegars also come in handy. You use so little at a time, and it saves having a bottle that can possibly last three years, just about any herb will work, but use white vinegar. It's just a matter of simply adding the green stuff to it. Guess, there is no need to even measure it.
Some herbs freeze like a dream. The flavors stay, but they simply do not stay nice like they should. We have tried parsley and mint, and they defrost limp, so it is most likely best to dry them for winter use. When you dry herbs, remember to take the leaves off the stems, don't dry them whole.
Another thing you can whip up from your herbs is jelly. Measure a cup of fresh herbs, pour two and a half cups of boiling water over them, and let stand, covered, for 15 minutes. Strain and measure two cups of the liquid.
To this add a fourth of a cup of vinegar and four and a half cups of sugar. Cook over high heat until the sugar is dissolved. Add a dash of green food coloring to pretty it up.
When it comes to a boil, add a half bottle of liquid pectin and bring to a hard boil that will not stir down. Boil it one minute, then put it in jars, and that is it.

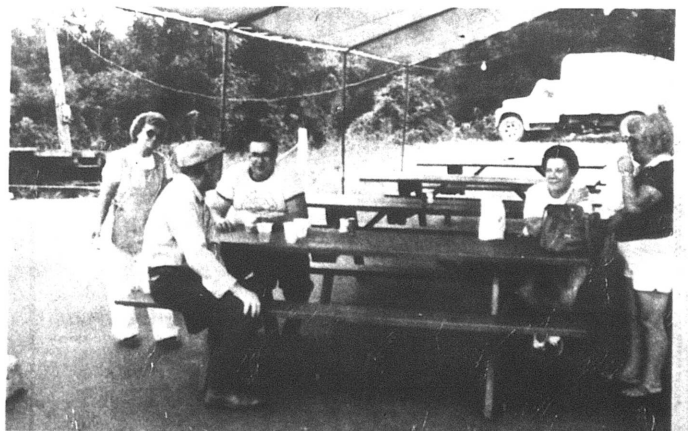

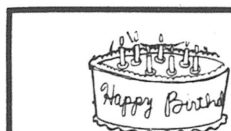
