Risner's lawyer threatens to sue police officers

An Akron lawyer representing Goble Risner in his bout with the law has handed to The Advertiser a copy of an affidavit he says was executed before him, as a notary public, by the alleged accusers of Risner in which they state they were forced by notice to execute the were forced by police to execute the complaint against Risner.

Sancic prepared the affidavit, which is signed by Bertha Sexton, 170 Nichols street, and it says "the police came to my house twice that evening telling me that if I didn't sign this complaint against Gobel Risner they would make it rough on us." make it rough on us."

She and her husband executed

She and her husband executed the complaints at the insistence of police officers. She does not identify them in the affidavit, but it follows that Chief Frank Hodge and Patrolman Ronald Croxford could not have been the officers involved because they had been hospitalized as a result of the melee with Risner at his home in Riggs street.

"At no time," Mrs. Sexton swears in her affidavit, "did we intend to prosecute Goble Riener for any-thing because he is our friend." Police were called to the Sexton

A woman telephoned the de-partment saying that someone had threatened her husband with death police services.






