

In collision May 10 - Injuries fatal to James Hawk

Injuries received May 10 in a two vehicle collision at Little London proved fatal Saturday in Mansfield General hospital to James K. Hawk, 38, 3070 Scott road, Plymouth route 1.

He died even as his volunteer friends were fitting and sewing two important money crops on his land.

Born Sept. 10, 1947, in Crawford county, he was a self-employed farmer and a leader among those of that calling. He was graduated by Plymouth High school in 1965 and by Heidelberg college at Tiffin in 1972. He taught two years in the mathematics department of the high school and served as bus driver. He was a member of the board of directors of New Washington Equity Co., and had been chosen

an honorary chapter farmer by the Plymouth FFA. He was active in Plymouth adult farmers' class and was a member of First United Church of Christ, Shelby, whose pastor, the Rev. John J. Bradley, conducted services at Shelby Tuesday at 11 a.m. Burial was in Mansfield Memorial park.

He is survived by his wife, nee Christiana Geisler, an elementary music teacher here before their marriage; two sons, Homer J. and Frederick W. and a daughter, Elaine A., at home; his parents, the Kenneth Hawks, Shelby; three sisters, Mrs. Shirley Broach, Miami, Fla.; Mrs. Beverly Zimmerman, New Washington, and Dorothy, now Mrs. Timothy Gleason, Bowling Green, and his grandmother, Mrs. Naomi Brown, Bucyrus.

Appeal by Risner dismissed by court: no jurisdiction

An appeal by Gobel Risner of a conviction of disorderly conduct has been dismissed by the 5th District Court of Appeals.

His attorney, S. F. Sancie, Akron, argued in a brief that Plymouth police did not have probable cause to enter Risner's trailer and that Judge Vincent R. Phelan, Shelby Municipal Court, failed to accord the defendant a prompt trial.

The court found that it lacks jurisdiction in the case because the trail court of Judge Phelan did not file a final judgment.

It noted that he did not sign the

summons nor did the summons bear the official seal of the clerk of the Shelby court.

Risner was found guilty and fined \$50 and costs.

Sancie alleged prejudice by Judge Phelan and asked that he be removed from the trial of Risner, still a fugitive from conviction on four other charges. Judge James Benson, Richland county common pleas court, conducted the trial.

He found Risner guilty in absentia, Risner having fled the village after the first day of testimony.

Planning commission making two surveys

Two surveys, one among retail businesses and the other among consumers, are in course by the village planning commission.

Copies of the consumer survey may be had at Miller's Hardware, Nancy's Salon of Beauty, Mack's Sport Valu and the village hall, should be completed and returned by May 25. After results are

No public funds involved - New library building to rise at end of Square

A new public library building will be erected at 29-37 West Broadway, as a result of the efforts of a committee interested in civic improvement.

When the building is occupied, the library will retain its present name, Plymouth Branch library.

It will serve residents of the village and surrounding areas who qualify as borrowers under rules established by the Mansfield-Richland County library system, of which it was a part.

Plymouth Library Advisory committee, of which Charles F. Hanline, 45 Mill street, civil engineer and farmer on the Willard marsh, is chairman, with Dr. Pierre E. Haver, optometrist, as secretary; Robert McKnight, vice-president, First Buckeye bank, Willard, treasurer, and Mrs. J. Harold Cashman, nee Lois Knaus, as consultant, are members, choose the site on West Broadway, which is now occupied by a business building owned by the McIntire family and by the former residence of Dr. George J. Searle, Sr.

These will be demolished.

The McIntire property, owned by Mrs. Janet McIntire Wisner Reinhardt and her sister, Mrs. Louise Pierfedici, has been donated to the committee by them in memory of the former son, David McIntire Wisner, who was killed in an automobile collision May 8, 1960.

"Since thanks go to Mrs. Robert L. McIntire and her daughters from the committee and from the reading public for their generosity," the committee says.

Much of the funding for the project derives from the late John P. Stambaugh, who died Oct. 23, 1971. His foresight led him to buy 1,000 acres of uncultivated land of the Willard Marsh west of Celeryville and turn a complete wilderness into a productive farm. He and his wife, Rhea Welsh Stambaugh, were devoted to the needs of free education. He served on the board of education at Ada for many years before he moved here. She taught there and in Ohio Northern university at Ada for 10 years.

Next to the public schools, the Stambaughs came to believe that public libraries offer the most opportunities to a free education. For this reason, Mrs. Stambaugh has assured the funding of the new structure.

An experienced architect has been engaged and final drawings are in course. Plans have been tentatively approved by the committee.

Mrs. Cashman says, "We look forward to a great increase in circulation and an expansion of our activities when the new building is occupied."

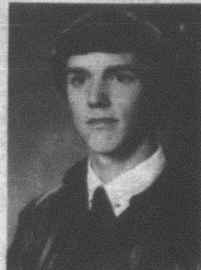

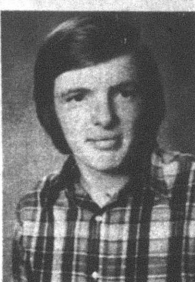
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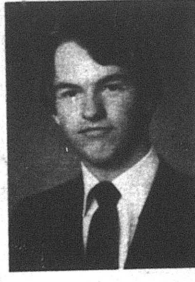

Hampton fans 16, gives three hits; Tuttle's single decisive

Spectacular pitching by Rodney Hampton and timely hitting by Joe Tuttle, a ninth grader, led Plymouth to a 3 to 2 victory over New London in the Class A district finals at Old Fort Friday and put the Big Red into regional competition for the third 1 history.

Plymouth advanced to the regional competition at Deahler in 1988 and to the regional contest at Urbans in 1978.

Hampton allowed the Wildcats, earlier a walkover winner over Plymouth at New London, on an afternoon when the Big Red was strapped for players, just three sophies, two of them by Scott Pfeiffer, the catcher. His second hit went over the fence.

Hampton struck out 16 and issued five bases on balls. His opponent was Arnie Norman, another premier southpaw in Firelands conference play. Norman struck out 10 Plymouth barmen and issued one pass. He hit a batter.

The Wildcats drew first blood in the fourth. Pfeiffer singled and rode home on a double by Tim Wise.

Plymouth erupted for two scores in its half.

Chad McGinnis singled. So did Troy Keene, sending McGinnis to third. Keene stole second. Jason Robinson's infield hit loaded the bases, whereupon Tuttle was safe on an error to score McGinnis. Tim Deskins, the designated hitter, hit a sacrifice fly to send Keene home.

Pfeiffer's homer tied it in the sixth.

In its half, Hampton drew a walk, stole second, and scored on a two out single by Tuttle, just a ninth grader and a coming southpaw pitcher.

Plymouth will play at Findlay college against the survivor of the Class A district at Bascom. Game time is 4:30 p.m.

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The things one finds in spring when cleaning for summer!

Spring housecleaning is a ball. It is taking me 10 times longer to do it than anyone else.
That is because I am finding all sorts of interesting stuff.
My latest big discovery is three recipes to make soap.
It was years back that I decided to be pioneering, but kind of gave it up, although three friends sent me recipes.
I had forgotten what went into soap, and it is shocking.

Is there one gal alive who doesn't like beautiful little, perfumy bars of the stuff? I don't think men care one bit so long as it does the trick.
But fancy soaps are always on everyone's list of desirable little presents.
One of my grandmothers loved the stuff. She had everything and it was hard to dream up a birthday or Christmas present for her, but I always knew soap did it. Way back when things were so cheap, I

would manage to hoard up a whole dollar out of my \$5 a month allowance to buy her one bar of some fancy French stuff.
Little did Grandma really know what she was getting, although she was really old enough to have made soap as a young girl out of necessity. She and her mother were very poor when she was growing up, then great-grandma married a rich brewer, which happily changed their lives.
I have one recipe from a friend who grew up in Kansas. It is from an old pioneer family so this must have been passed down.

All you need for this one is 16 pounds of meat scraps, three pounds of aquatic soda or lye, seven and a half gallons of water and two pints of salt.

Another one, which is a Huron county hand-me-down recipe, calls for 12 pounds of grease, four and a half pints of water, a half pint of ammonia, a half box of powdered borax and two cans of Red Seal Lyons. I have no idea what this is.

If anyone would like to know how to put these recipes together, I will save them.

The third recipe is pretty much the same, and I have no idea where it came from. But it has an added touch. "For guest cakes add oil of rose perfume and pink cake coloring and pour in fancy gelatin molds. Or other perfume oil and corresponding coloring. It makes nice gifts. It floats!"

All I can say is, thank heavens we live today and not yesterday. Some people say we live too fast and need to pause. We really do need that "pause that refreshes" which was a slogan for years of my favorite drink.

A harried housewife with visiting fireman (relatives) for graduations needs a little pause, especially at breakfast time, and this does it.

Get everything ready, sausages and that sort of thing in the oven. This also includes baking bacon, which works like a dream on a cookie sheet. Everything can go in the oven except the eggs.

This will, perhaps, serve six. Melt four tablespoons of butter or margarine in a double boiler, then pour in 12 eggs that have been nicely whisked with a half cup of sour cream. With some freshly ground pepper and salt, if you insist. Pour it into the melted butter and let them sit for 20

minutes over the boiling water, stir a little, and they are ready when you are. You can also add some chopped onion and mushrooms to the egg mixture after it has been cooked a little bit in water and drained.

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Cemeteries in news today; Pioneer's Rest historic site

Plymouth's two cemeteries are the news of the week. Greenlawn will be visited by throngs, but not Pioneer's Rest. Hardly anyone knows there were two other cemeteries in the village.

One was that of the Tyson family in Trux street. It is long gone. The property was purchased by the late Leopold A. Barnes. By then there were very few of that family left, and apparently there were no state law that governed the treatment of a private family burial ground. He uprooted several tombstones to use as an enclosure for his dogs.

The village's first cemetery, according to Richland county historical sources, was given by Abraham Trux, known as the founder of the village.

He and a number of his friends marched through northern Richland county during the War of 1812. They were from Belmont county, and when the war was over, as young men they came back here to settle.

Trux gave Lot 23 for a village cemetery. If the platting of village land has remained the same, which it highly likely, that is where the present day First United Presbyterian church now stands.

After a while more land was needed. Although there are no known dates, that was when Pioneer's Rest began. It was then behind the Presbyterian church in Plymouth street.

Apparently it outgrew itself. The earliest grave has the date of Mar. 1, 1818, which meant the earlier cemetery was no longer used.

In 1874 the Greenlawn cemetery association was formed. A group of citizens purchased 23 acres. From whom? No one recalls.

Robert Marshall was the first person buried there. There is no stone in his name, but Graham's Richland county history says so and most likely is correct. The two cemeteries reflect the history of the country, especially Pioneer's Rest.

It is the resting place of one Revolutionary soldier, Peter Erving, who came "west" with his wife because they had a married

daughter here. He had served seven years in the fight to obtain independence and died in 1846. His wife Elizabeth, died two years later, in 1848.

What is unique is that the family stone lists their grandson, Thomas Smith Bodine, inscribed on it. He died Mar. 27, 1864, as a prisoner at Andersonville, Ga., during the War of the Rebellion.

The village has one veteran of the 280,000 who took part in the Revolution.

The old cemetery at New Haven has two, Paul Pond and William Johnson. Not much is known about them, but they most likely came to Ohio because of their children.

Pioneer also has the graves of five veterans of the War of 1812. The only one not reflected in the cemeteries are the Mexican War of 1846-1848 and the several Indian wars that raged throughout the last century.

Veterans traced by Mr. and Mrs. J. Max Fidler to keep the records for Ehret-Parrel Post 447,

American Legion, show these numbers.

Pioneer's Rest has five from the War of the Rebellion and Greenlawn has 133.

There are seven from the Spanish American War; 53 from World War I; 22 from World War II; seven from the Korean conflict and three from the Vietnam police action.

Several who died in service are buried elsewhere. Capt. Elmer Parrel, who lost his life over New Delhi, India, in World War II, is buried in Louisville, Ky. Lester Willford, killed in World War II, is buried in Italy, and Lieut. Charles H. Rhine in France.

Elwood Kuhn rests in Gallion and Russell Steele in Maple Grove, New Haven.

The late Jacob Schneider served in World War I and World War II. The late Thomas P. Crabbe served in three, World War I and II and Korea.

Schneider is buried in the family plot in Greenlawn. Crabbe is interred in Olivesburg cemetery.

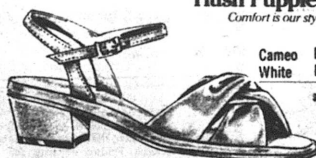

ORDINANCE NO. 84
AN ORDINANCE TO AUTH-
ORIZE AND DIRECT THE VIL-
LAGE ADMINISTRATOR TO
ENTER INTO MUTUAL AID
AGREEMENTS WITH VARIOUS
MUNICIPAL CORPORATIONS,
IN ORDER TO PROVIDE
MUTUAL ASSISTANCE IN THE
INTERCHANGE AND USE OF
PERSONNEL AND EQUIPMENT
OF THE VARIOUS MUNICIPAL
ELECTRIC SYSTEMS IN THE
CASE OF EMERGENCIES.

WHEREAS, mutual aid emer-
gency contracts are a valid public
purpose, and
WHEREAS, Section 735.05 of
the Ohio Revised Code permits
entering into contracts in the case
of real and present emergencies
without formal bidding and ad-
vertising for work to be done and
supplies to be purchased from
municipal utilities, and

WHEREAS, Section 715.02 of
the Ohio Revised Code provides
that two or more municipal
corporations may enter into joint
agreements relating to the operation
of public utilities and
WHEREAS, in the usual daily
operation of the Department of
Electricity of the Village of
Plymouth, Richland-Huron County,
it is necessary to authorize the
Village Administrator to enter
into contracts with the various
municipal electric systems to
provide for emergency services
and repairs to the Village of
Plymouth municipal electric system,
now therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE
COUNCIL OF THE VILLAGE OF
PLYMOUTH, RICHLAND-HU-
RON COUNTY, OHIO, four-fifths
(4/5) of its members elected thereto
concurring,

SECTION 1: That the Village
Administrator be and he is hereby
authorized and directed to enter
into mutual aid contracts with
various municipal electric systems
in the State of Ohio for emer-
gency repair service and for
emergency equipment, personnel
and supplies in case of emer-
gencies, and to approve invoices
for same.

SECTION 2: That such mutual
aid agreements shall contain, inter
alia, terms which provide as follows:

A. That in the event of an
emergency each party may re-
quest, in writing, aid from the
other in the form of additional
manpower and/or equipment;

B. That each such request for aid
shall specify, to the extent practi-
cable, the assistance required and
an estimate of the length of time
said assistance may be needed;

C. That each responding Com-
munity need only respond to the
extent consistent with the proper
operation of its own electrical
system;

D. That the Community ren-
dering aid should be reimbursed by
the Community requesting such aid
as follows:

1. A charge for labor equal to the
actual cost for the total number of
man-hours expended rendering aid,
(including travel time), by
employees of the aiding Com-
munity. Employee fringe benefits
costs shall be determined by using
a factor of two (2) times the total
cost of the labor charge, and;
2. A materials and supplies
charge equal to the actual cost of
fuel, materials and supplies ex-
pended, rendering such aid, in-
cluding fuel expenses incurred in
traveling to and from the site of
such aid;
3. The actual cost of that loss or
damage to the equipment of the
aiding Community, not recovered
from insurance.

E. Payment for such aid, de-
termined in accordance with
Paragraph D above, shall be
rendered within thirty (30) days
upon the presentation of an
invoice detailing the same.

F. Personnel of the aiding
Community shall be considered
acting within scope of their
employment, to the same extent as
if they were performing their
regular duties, while engaged in
such aid.

G. Under no circumstances shall
the responding party or its em-
ployees so responding, be liable to
the requesting party, its inhabi-
tants, or others, for any damages
arising in any way as a result of
the rendering of such aid or the
failure to respond to a call for such
aid.

H. Under no circumstances shall
the party requesting such aid be
liable to the party responding, its
inhabitants, or others, for any
damages arising in any way from
the response to such a request for
aid or the rendering thereof, except
as outlined in D-3 above.

I. That each contract shall be in
effect for one (1) year period
possible time this Ordinance is
declared to be an emergency

measure necessary for the pre-
servation of the public peace,
property, health, safety and wel-
fare of the Village of Plymouth,
Ohio.

SECTION 4: This Ordinance
shall be in full force and effect at
the earliest period provided by law.
