

Cuss and discuss on Tuesday night!

Ohio law doesn't say there must be discussion and/or debate during a public meeting of the governing board of any taxing subdivision. Nor does it require discussion and/or debate of its highest deliberative bodies, the Senate and the House of Representatives.

Which, of course, does not mean that discussion and/or debate shouldn't occur.

More public business is transacted in caucus than in open session. More public business is transacted in committee than in open session. Whenever three or members of a public legislative body gather, the law says the public may attend, may listen and watch, and under some circumstances, may inquire.

There come to mind two statements by widely disparate American political leaders, each of them a jewel in his own right, albeit 28 years apart.

The first was Thomas Woodrow Wilson, one of three college presidents who rose to occupy the oval office. He said, "We believe in open covenants openly arrived at." Amen.

The second was Harry S. Truman, the bankrupt haberdasher who just may have been the best president we have had since Wilson. "If you can't stand the heat, stay the heck out of the kitchen!"

He didn't say heck, but the sense is the same.

Those who seek public office must, they absolutely must, be made to realize that life in a fish bowl is what it's all about, that those who installed them there are entitled to watch and to hear and to make up their own minds as to what they see and hear, and if they can't or won't adhere to that notion, then they should get the heck out.

Those chosen to serve the public have no, repeat no right to arrange their deliberations so that it is inconvenient, impractical or impossible for their constituents to attend.

That most of the public business of Plymouth is transacted after lengthy, often vigorous, sometimes angry, discussion on the Monday night preceding the regular council meeting is patently unfair to the citizenry.

Sure, any councilman will tell you that, save for the media and a policeman or two plus the village administrator and the chief of electric services, nobody ever attends, or almost never attends, a council session. And he's right.

But to require the public to attend more than one session is unfair. It's unethical. It is, as our young friend often says, "for the birds".

One is always at some risk when he comments upon an unsavory situation, or what seems to him to be an unsavory situation, in another town. We've not particularly eschewed risk over the past 30 years, and we do not propose to do so now, despite the encomium that "you can find enough trouble lying around in the street without going out to buy it!"

What the solution is, or ought to be, is not for us to say. But we have a duty to assist those who complain is that they cannot press criminal charges and the police officer won't do so unless he sees the offense to give vent to their needs thus publicly.

For younger now — Mumps injection required

All pupils in public and private schools must be inoculated against mumps, a new law says.

All pupils in kindergarten through sixth grade will be checked by the county health department this year.

In September, 1985, all pupils in grades seven through 12 will be checked. By that time, all pupils must show evidence of a prior infection of mumps or inoculation against them. All female pupils, regardless of age, must show evidence of inoculation against rubella at three-day measles. Earlier, the inoculation was not required of girls who had attained menarche.

Residents of Huron county may obtain inoculations during clinics on the first Wednesday of each month from 2 to 5:30 p.m. and the second and fourth Wednesdays from 9 to 11 a.m. at the health department of Norwalk. On the third Wednesday, the clinic will meet at Willard YMCA. Fee is \$3.

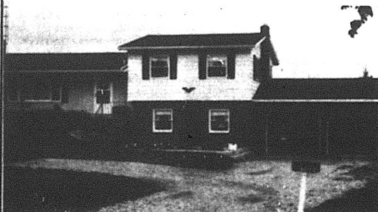

PARK.

WHEREAS, it is necessary and
expedient to insure proper use and

A. Area Description of Village of
Plymouth Industrial Park: A
complete survey description of the

B. General Purpose: The real
property described as the Village
of Plymouth Industrial Park is
subjected to the conditions, coven-
ants, restrictions, performance
standards, and easements hereby
declared to insure proper use and
appropriate development and im-
provement of such building site;

building sites against such im-
proper use of surrounding building

all said use control, subdivision
building and development regula-
tions that are currently in effect
shall be adopted from time to time
by the Village of Plymouth.

Reference should be made to the
Codified Ordinances of the Village
of Plymouth, Ohio, which in-
clude, but are not limited to the
following:

Village of Plymouth Planning
and Zoning Code
Village of Plymouth Subdi-
vision Code

Village of Plymouth Building
and Housing Code
Any relevant County and State
codes are also applicable hereto.

Further, development shall be
subject to all applicable federal,
state and local restrictions, re-
strictions, including water, air and
noise pollution regulations, and
State Health Department Controls
and applicable regulations. C.
Additional Requirements.

In addition to any restrictions
imposed by foregoing ordinances,
the following restrictions shall
be a part of the development of the
Village of Plymouth Industrial
Park:

1. Purpose Restrictions
No building or structure shall be
erected or placed on any building site
other use or purpose than that of
manufacturing or commercial
enterprise.

2. Front Building Line
No building shall be located on
any lot nearer than fifty (50) feet to
the front lot line nor any porches,
stoops, or other pro-
jections of any building to be
located nearer than fifty (50) feet
from the front lot line.

3. Corner Lots
No building shall be erected
nearer than twenty-five (25) feet to
the corner of any building site
that abuts a street.

4. Side Lot Line
No building shall be erected
nearer than twenty-five (25) feet to
the side line of any building site,
except where the building is an open
space of at least fifty (50) feet
between adjacent, but separate
owned buildings. For purposes of
this provision, a building site shall
be considered to mean any
portion of the premises, less than
the entire premises which shall be
conveyed by the owners to any
successor or assign.

5. Fence or Wall Restrictions
No fence or wall shall be
permitted to extend beyond the
setback from the lot line abutting a
street, without the consent of
Plymouth Village Council.

6. Use of Yard - Storage
No building or structure or other
structure or appurtenances which
may be visible above the surface of
the ground shall be constructed
between the front and side of any
building and the abutting street
shall be landscaped and planted
with grass within 240 days after
the completion of construction of a
building on any particular building
site and maintained in such
manner as to keep the same neat
at all times. The storage of bulk
commodities shall be confined to
locations and screening thereof as
approved by the Grantor.

Approval of Design and
Location
The purchaser of any building
site within the premises, and their
successors and assigns, shall be
required, before erecting any
building, to submit to the Village
of Plymouth, Ohio, a plan showing
the location and type of appropriate
plantings and when they will be
planted, and the Council of the
Village of Plymouth may not
unreasonably withhold approval
provided that said plans conform
in every way with these restric-
tions and with the general char-
acter of the development of the
building sites within the
bounds of the hereinbefore de-
scribed premises. The Council of
the Village of Plymouth shall
approve or disapprove said plans
within thirty (30) days of the
Appeal of any decision may be
made to the Village of Plymouth
Zoning Board of Appeals will
consider said appeal at their next
regular meeting.

8. Off Street Parking
Property owners must provide
spaces as follows:
a. There shall be provided one (1)
space per employee at industrial,
research and storage establish-
ments and five (5) spaces per
(1) space for every one (1) employee
per wholesale establishment.

b. All parking areas and drives
must include curbs and shall be
paved with an impervious surface.

c. All parking areas and drives
shall be properly maintained by
the owners.

9. Loading Docks
All loading docks shall be so
placed that trucks and other
vehicles or machinery using such
loading docks will at no time
project into any dedicated public
street when in the process of
loading or unloading.

10. Signs and Egress
All access points to a building
site shall be provided from the
access road within the Industrial
Park.

11. Signs and Advertising
No billboards, advertising signs
or other signs and displays except
for a sign identifying the name,
business, and products of the firm
occupying the premises shall be
placed on any of the building sites
except that a sign offering the
premises for sale or lease may be
so erected, not exceeding ten (10)
square feet.

12. Fences of Building

The front facade of each building
which may be erected on the
premises shall be exposed con-
crete aggregate, stone, glass
terrazzo, brick, or approved metal
design. Concrete, concrete block
and siding, providing they meet
acceptable standards, are also
acceptable material by they
shall be finished by painting,
staining, or other processing,
which will Pollution and Water
Pollution.

The occupants of any building or
structure or any portion of the land
located in the premises will in no
way violate any ordinance or
statute or regulation of the Village
of excessive smoke, fumes, or dust,
and will take all emission of
such smoke, fumes, or dust as shall
be incidental to their operations to
meet and maintain the same, and
the occupants will in no way violate
any ordinances or statutes per-
taining to the discharge of any
liquid or other waste that con-
tribute to water pollution.

Specific dates will be established
prior to the conveyance of any
property within the Village of
Plymouth Industrial Park for the
commencement of construction of
the facility as approved. Further,
a reasonable deadline will be es-
tablished for the completion of the
approved facility.

Every conveyance by the Village
or its agents, is made upon the
express condition that if the
grantee, its successors, assigns
and heirs shall not within the
period specified commence con-
struction and complete the same
for the purpose specified, then the
estate conveyed shall revert to and
reinvest in the grantor for the
original purchase price and it shall
be lawful for the grantor to re-enter
upon the premises and retake the
same. This requirement is a part
of the consideration of the sale
or grant of the site to the
grantee by the grantor.

13. Restoration or Demolition
Any building within the In-
dustrial Park which has been
destroyed or partially damaged by
fire or other causes must either be
repaired or completely demolished
and removed from the site by its
owner. Repair must be completed
within a period of six (6) months
after damage and completed within
twelve (12) months after com-
mencement of repair. Demolition
must be completed within six (6)
months after destruction or dam-
age and completed within two (2)
months after commencement of
demolition. Should repair or demoli-
tion not be completed within the
time as stated above, and after
ten days (10) days written notice
to the owner, the Village of Plym-
outh shall have the right to repair
or demolish and remove any struc-
ture or building from the site.

16. Use of the Subdivided
Once a building site has been
purchased from the Village of Plym-
outh, such site shall be con-
sidered as a single unit and it shall
be the responsibility of the owner,
or any portion of the site lease or
approval of the Village of Plym-
outh Council.

17. Covenants Run with the
Land
These covenants, restrictions,
conditions, performance stand-
ards, reservations and easements
are to run with the land and shall
be binding on all of the parties and
all persons claiming under them.
18. Violation of the Ordinance
If the parties hereto or any of
them or their heirs, successors, or
assigns shall violate or attempt to
violate any of the requirements
herein contained, it shall be lawful
for any other party, person or
persons owning any portion of the
hereinabove described premises to
prosecute any proceedings in or
attempting to violate any such
requirements either to prevent him
from the fruit of his act, or to
recover damages for such violation.

19. Reservation of Right To
Amend
That the Village of Plymouth
reserves the right to privilege to
alter, amend or change any of the
terms, conditions and covenants
on any time during their
existence, subject to the approval
of the grantee and such grantees
immediately adjacent and abut-
ting title holders.
