

Just what is abuse of a child, anyway?

The law is clear: those who drive motor vehicles are required to pay careful attention to the safety of pedestrians. Generally, unless outright, and outrageous, negligence by a pedestrian can be proved by the accused driver who strikes him, the driver is convicted and dealt with as the law allows.

And rightly so.

Nevertheless, it is clear that indiscriminate and sometimes reckless use of the streets and thoroughfares by children results in needless concern, deep anxiety and foolish action by the governing authority.

The life of a child, once he's here among us, is sacred. Abuse of children has occurred since time began. Recognition of such abuse is the more sophisticated these days, but abuse in essence is no more than what it has always been: absence of prudent and reasonable concern and care of those of tender age.

So far as we know, there have been no prosecutions hereabouts of parents and/or guardians who allow their children to make indiscriminate and reckless use of streets and thoroughfares. Perhaps there ought to be. Those of the bar who are charged with advice to municipalities are loath to undertake prosecutions that are chancy, at best, and perhaps unconstitutional, at worst.

The public treasury pays for the signs that say "Caution — Children at Play". The signs cost a great deal. Their intent is to warn the driver that children are apt to run into the street, at risk to them and to the driver.

Sure, we were kids once. But we didn't play in the streets. "Oh, your folks must've been rich, so you had a big yard?" Ridiculous! On a lot 64 by 118 feet? We played in vacant fields, in the public park, in the yards of neighbors. Anywhere but in the streets.

Why? Because our parents, and the parents of our friends, even 55 and 60 years ago, well understood what might happen if their children weren't supervised to the extent that they were prohibited, and restrained, from playing in the streets.

That's the point. We were restrained.

How? Sometimes by a fence. Sometimes by a hedge. Sometimes by the presence of a parent or other adult.

But we were restrained. Those who do not restrain their children are, in our book, guilty of child abuse. Make us no excuses. Do not say, "we haven't got any yard". There's no law against use of the park. Nor the schoolground. Nor the triangle under the old water tower. Nor the village waterworks.

Householders who harbor dogs, whether licensed or otherwise, may be punished for allowing them to run freely. An ordinance states they shall be kept on the home property or otherwise on a tether. This is not for the protection of the dog. It is for the protection of the community. If a dog is injured or killed, tough sledding. Its owner sustains the loss, may even be compelled to remove the carcass.

To the extent that unsupervised children are permitted to play in the streets, that's child abuse. It ought to be prosecuted.

Not to worry. Nobody here will touch it with a 10-foot pole. Do we have to wait until one is severely injured or killed? What occurred Saturday night is only a suggestion of what might occur. True, the child is 12 years old. She wasn't playing in the street. But she was crossing in mid-block, in the dark, and she did dart back across the street into the path of an innocent motorcyclist.

One with more experience in the newspaper business than we, and ours adds up to 42 years, said only the other day, "Keep your editorials local. Deal with things that can be corrected, that adoption of your argument will put a stop to or give a start to in a reasonable time. But don't fall into the trap of thinking you can change human nature, of making people do what doesn't come naturally."

Shiloh village 'in distress', HUD says

Shiloh is a "distressed city", U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development says, and as much is eligible for UDAG (urban development action grant) assistance.

Communities must meet three of six criteria set by HUD to qualify. These are age of housing, per capita income change, population growth lag and decline, job lag or decline, poverty and labor surplus. Shiloh qualified on five of the six.

Of \$440 million earmarked by HUD for UDAG purposes, 25 percent must go to communities of 50,000 population or less.

Loans to businesses that on the strength of the grant money are enabled to expand or to locate are repaid to the community to which the initial grant is made. Eligibility for such a grant is conditioned upon whether the award will create jobs, increase the tax base, is ready for immediate start up and is in fact necessary.

Other nearby communities similarly designated by HUD are Tiro, New Washington, Crestline and Chatfield in Crawford county and Willard in Huron county.

ORDINANCE NO. 13-84

AN ORDINANCE TO APPROVE THE EDITING AND INCLUSION OF CERTAIN ORDINANCES AS PARTS OF THE VARIOUS COMPONENT CODES OF THE CODIFIED ORDINANCES TO PROVIDE FOR THE ADOPTION OF NEW MATTER IN THE UPDATED AND REVISED CODIFIED ORDINANCES TO PROVIDE FOR THE PUBLICATION OF SUCH NEW MATTER TO REPEAL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT THEREWITH: AND TO DECLARE AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, The Jurisprudence Publishing Company has completed its revision and updating of the Codified Ordinances of the Village, and

WHEREAS, various ordinances of a general and permanent nature that have been passed by Council since the date of the publication of the Codified Ordinances (September 21, 1981) have been included in the Codified Ordinances of the Village, and

WHEREAS, certain changes were made in the Codified Ordinances to bring Village law into conformity with State law, now therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council, Village of Plymouth, Ohio:

Section 1. Section 3. All ordinances and resolutions or parts thereof which are in conflict or inconsistent with any provision of the new matter adopted in Section 2 of this ordinance are hereby repealed as of the effective date of this ordinance except as follows:

(a) The enactment of such enactment and subsections shall not be construed to affect a right of liability accrued or incurred under any legislative provision prior to the effective date of this ordinance, or an action or proceeding for the enforcement of such right or liability. Such enactment shall be construed to relieve any person from punishment for an act committed in violation of any such legislative provision shall continue in full force notwithstanding its repeal for the purpose of revision and reclassification.

(b) The repeal provided above shall not affect any legislation enacted subsequent to January 24, 1984.

Section 4. Pursuant to Ohio R.C. 731.23, the Clerk-Treasurer shall publish, in a manner required by law, a notice of the enactment of this ordinance, containing the title of this ordinance, together with a summary of the new matter contained in the 1984 Replacement Pages hereby adopted, a copy of which summary is attached hereto as Exhibit "A".

Section 5. This ordinance is an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public health, safety and welfare and shall go into effect immediately, the reason for this emergency being that it is necessary to have a current codification of the legislation of the Village, one that is consistent with current State law, as required by the Ohio Constitution, to properly provide for the administration of government and to ensure law and order in the Village.

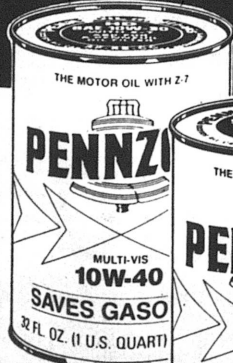

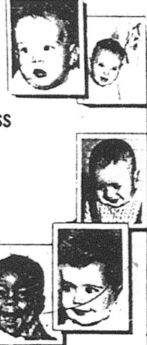

necessary to provide for the

property, this Ordinance is hereby
enacted to be an emergency
measure necessary for the im-
mediate preservation of the public
peace, property, health, safety and
welfare; now therefore,

BE IT ORDAINED by the

thereto concurring:

Section 1. That the Mayor be and
he is hereby authorized and
directed to enter into a purchase
agreement and purchase from the
Farmers Home Administration
(FmHA), for the Village of Ply-
mouth, Ohio, the mortgage in-
terest of FmHA upon lands owned
by the Village of Plymouth, Ohio,
Community Pool, Inc., more fully
described as follows:

Village of Plymouth, New Haven
Township, Huron County, Ohio,

**AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING
FOR ZONING RESTRICTIONS,
CONVENANTS, PERFORMANCE
STANDARDS, RESERVATIONS,
CONDITIONS AND EASEMENTS
RELATING TO THE VILLAGE OF
PLYMOUTH INDUSTRIAL PARK.**

WHEREAS, the Village of Ply-
mouth, Ohio has committed it-
self to the formation and develop-
ment of an industrial park on
lands now owned by the Village of
Plymouth, Ohio in the vicinity of
the Water Plant for the promotion, growth
and establishment in Plymouth of
industrial, commercial and
research facilities for the wel-
fare of its people, to stabilize the
economy, provide employment and to
provide additional opportunities for
the employment of its people;

WHEREAS, the Village of Ply-
mouth, Ohio, has been, is now and
will be devoting its time, effort, resources,
and financial support and that of its
citizens and employees, to such
commitment;

WHEREAS, the Village of
Plymouth, Ohio, has been, is now
and will be providing, or con-
tracting for the provision of
engineering, surveying, adminis-
trative and other professional
services for the planning, in-
stallation and construction of
sanitary sewer, water line, paved
street, storm drainage, grading
and other facility improvements;

WHEREAS, it is necessary and
expedient to insure proper use and
appropriate development, and to
encourage development by private
investment, the following covenants,
performance standards, reser-
vations, conditions and easements
pertaining to the Village of
Plymouth Industrial Park be
legally established, and the same
shall be known as the Village of Plymouth
and all its grantees within the park area.

**NOW THEREFORE, BE IT
ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL
OF THE VILLAGE OF
PLYMOUTH, STATE OF OHIO:**

SECTION 1. That the Mayor
and the Village Administrator be,
and they are hereby, authorized
and directed to prepare the plat
and documents required to impose
the hereinbefore itemized restrictions,
covenants, performance stand-
ards, reservations, conditions and
easements, and the same shall be
legally established, and the same
shall be known as the Village of Plymouth
Industrial Park; to have the same
recorded in accordance with law
in the office of the recorder of
other disposition of the same, and
to rectify in full all of the same, and
any additions or amendments
thereto, in each and every deed,
grant, gift, lease or other in-
strument conveying an interest in
the same, and such restrictions, covenants,
performance standards, conditions,
reservations and easements
are hereby adopted and approved.

**RESTRICTIONS, COVENANTS,
CONDITIONS, PERFORMANCE
STANDARDS, RESERVATIONS
AND EASEMENTS
FOR VILLAGE OF PLYMOUTH
INDUSTRIAL PARK**

A. Area Description of Village of
Plymouth Industrial Park: A
complete survey description of the
real property is contained in the
last provision of these conditions.

B. General Purpose: The real
property described as the Village
of Plymouth Industrial Park is
subjected to the conditions, covenants,
restrictions, performance stand-
ards, reservations and easements
declared to insure proper use and
appropriate development and im-
provements of each building site
thereof; to protect the owners of
building sites against the im-
proper use of surrounding building
sites as will depreciate the value
of their property; to guard against
the erection thereon of structures
of ill proportion or unsuitable
location; to insure the most
reasonable development of said
property; to encourage the erection
of attractive improvements thereon,
with appropriate locations
thereof on building sites; to
provide for the most harmonious
improvement of building sites;
to secure and maintain proper
setbacks from street, and
adequate free spaces between
buildings, in order to give to the
area a high quality of improvements
and property.

Accordingly, development of
building sites within the Plymouth
Industrial Park shall conform to
all and use control, subdivision
building and development regulations
that are currently in effect, or
shall be adopted from time to time
by the Village of Plymouth.
Reference should be made to the
Codified Ordinances of the Village
of Plymouth, Ohio, which in-
clude, but are not limited to the
following:

a. Village of Plymouth Planning
and Zoning Code
Village of Plymouth Subdi-
vision Code
Village of Plymouth Building
and Housing Code
Any relevant County and State
codes are also applicable hereto.

Further, development shall be
subject to all applicable federal
and state development restric-
tions, including water, air and
noise pollution and approved
State Health Department Controls
and Regulations.

C. Additional Requirements.
In addition to any restrictions
imposed by foregoing ordinances,
the following restrictions shall
apply to development of the
Village of Plymouth Industrial
Park:

1. Purpose Restrictions
No building or structure shall be
erected and no portion of the
premises shall be used for any
purpose other than that of
manufacturing or commercial
enterprises.

2. Front Building Line
No building shall be located on
any lot less than fifty (50) feet to
the front of the line of the
porches, stoops, or other pro-
jections of any building to be
constructed be made to lie within
fifty (50) feet of the front lot line.

No building shall be erected
nearer than twenty-five (25) feet
to the Lot Line of any building site
that abuts a street.

No building shall be erected
nearer than twenty-five (25) feet
to the side line of any building site,
the intention being that an open
space of at least fifty (50) feet exist
between the side of the front lot
owned buildings. For purposes of
this provision, a building site shall
be constructed to mean any
portion of the premises, less than
the entire premises which shall be
conveyed by the owners to any
successor or assign.

5. Fence or Wall Restrictions
No fence or masonry wall shall
be permitted to extend beyond the
front lot line of the building site
street, without the consent of
Plymouth Village Council.

6. Use of Yard - Storage
No out-building or other struc-
ture or appurtenances which may
be used for the storage of goods
or materials shall be located on
the ground shall be constructed be-
tween the front and side of any
building and the abutting street
shall be landscaped and planted
to screen the building site from
the completion of construction of
a building on any particular build-
ing site and maintained as
neatly and well kept condition
at all times. The storage of bulk
materials shall be confined to
locations and screening thereof as
approved by the Grantor.

7. Approval of Design and
Location.
The purchaser of any building
site within the Village of Plymouth
and the successors and assigns, shall
be required, before erecting any
building or laying out any parking
lot or other improvements, to
submit their plans and specifications
for approval in writing from the
Council of the Village of Ply-
mouth, Ohio. These plans shall
include an overall site plan with
specific mention of intended use of
the site, and the following: a. A
landscape plan to indicate the
location and type of appropriate
plantings and when they will be
provided. The Council of the
Village of Plymouth may not
approve any plan which does not
provide that said plans conform
in every way with these restric-
tions and with the general charac-
ter of the development of neigh-
boring building sites within the
Village of Plymouth, Ohio, as de-
scribed premises. The Council of
the Village of Plymouth shall
approve or disapprove said plans
within twenty (20) working days.
Appeal of any decision may be
made to the Village of Plymouth
Zoning Board of Appeals will
consider said appeal at their next
regular meeting.

8. Off-Street Parking
Property owners must provide
space as follows:
a. There shall be provided one (1)
space per employee at industrial,
research and storage establish-
ments, and five (5) spaces plus one
(1) space for every one (1) employee
at all other types of establishments.

b. All parking areas and drives
must include curbs and shall be
paved with an impervious surface.
c. All parking areas and drives
must be properly maintained by
the owner.

9. Loading Docks
All loading docks shall be so
placed that trucks and other
vehicles or machinery using such
loading docks shall not be a time
project into any dedicated public
street when in the process of
loading or unloading.

Ingress and Egress - A building
site at any point on the Village
of Plymouth Industrial Park shall
be accessible from the Village of
Plymouth Industrial Park.

11. Signs and Advertising
No billboards, advertising signs
or other means of displaying
advertising shall be erected
for a sign identifying the firm,
business, and products of the firm
occupying the premises shall be
placed on any of the building sites,
except as to the clothing, and
premises for sale or lease may be
so erected, not exceeding ten (10)
square feet.

12. Fences of Building

The front facade of such build-
ing which may be erected on the
premises shall be exposed con-
crete aggregate, stucco, glass,
brick, or other approved material
design. Concrete, concrete block
wood siding, providing they meet
applicable fire regulations, are
acceptable materials by which
shall be finished by painting,
staining, or other processing.
13. Air Pollution and Water
Pollution

Any occupants of any building or
structure or any portion of the land
located in the premises will in no
way violate any ordinance or
statute pertaining to the emission
of excessive smoke, fumes, or dust,
and will take all emission of
such smoke, fumes, or dust as shall
be incidental to their operations to
an absolute minimum. And, the
occupants will in no way violate
any ordinance or statute relating to
the discharge of any liquid or
other waste that contribute to
water pollution.

14. Right to Repurchase
Specific dates will be established
prior to the completion of the
premises within the Village of
Plymouth Industrial Park for the
commencement of construction of
the facility as approved. Further,
the grantor or contractor will be ob-
ligated for the completion of the
approved facility.

Every conveyance by the Village
or its agents, is made upon the
express condition that if the
grantee, successors, assigns and
heirs shall not within the
period specified commence con-
struction and complete the same
for the purpose specified, then the
grantee or contractor shall be ob-
ligated to convey the premises re-
verted to the grantor for the
original purchase price and it shall
be lawful for the grantor to re-enter
upon the premises conveyed and
reclaim the same. This requirement
is a part of the consideration ob-
ligated for the completion of the
approved facility.

15. Restoration or Demolition
Any building within the In-
dustrial Park which has been
destroyed or partially demolished
by fire or other causes must either
be repaired or completely demolished
and removed from the site by its
owner. Repair must be started
within six (6) months after the
after damage and completed
within twelve (12) months after
commencement of repair. Demolition
and removal must be started
within six (6) months after de-
struction or partial destruction and
completed within two (2) months after
commencement of demolition.
Should repair or demolition and
removal not be completed within
the time specified above, and after
ten (10) days of written notice to
the owner, the Village of Plymouth
shall have the right to repair or
demolish and remove any structure
which, in the opinion of the
Zoning Administrator, is either a
health hazard to the industrial
park, and the owner of the building
shall be responsible for all costs
and expense thereof.

16. No Right To Subdivide
Once a building site has been
purchased from the Village of Ply-
mouth, such site shall be con-
sidered as a single unit and it shall
not be subdivided, or any portion
of the site leased or rented, without
the approval of the Village of Ply-
mouth Council.

17. Covenants Run with the
Land
These covenants, restrictions,
conditions, performance stand-
ards, reservations and easements
are to run with the land and shall
be binding on all of the parties and
all persons claiming under them.

18. Violation of Covenants
If the parties hereto or any of
their heirs, assigns or successors
assigns shall violate or attempt to
violate any of the requirements
herein contained, it shall be lawful
for any other party, person, or
persons owning any portion of the
hereinabove described premises to
prosecute any proceedings in or
attempting to violate any such
requirements either to prevent him
or them from doing or to recover
damages for such violation.

19. Reservation of Right To
Amend
That the Village of Plymouth
reserves the right and privilege to
alter, amend or change any and
all of the hereinbefore covenants,
conditions, reservations and easements
at any time during their
existence, subject to the approval
of the grantee and such grantees
immediately adjacent and abut-
ting site holders.

D. Survey Description of Area
On record in Village Adminis-
trator's office.

SECTION 2. That this ordinance
shall take effect and be in
force from and after the earliest
period allowed by law.
