

On drugs

A survey conducted among pupils of Shelby High school and Junior High school shows that the drug problem, which includes alcohol, is somewhat worse than most of us thought.

We confess we have not seen the detailed survey. We haven't much of an idea of how the inquiries were couched, nor whether there can be any genuine validity assigned to the responses. We are told the survey was conducted in connection with required, assigned work. Our experience is that pupils are loath to tell the real truth when it comes to use of drugs, which includes alcohol. And unless the survey was carefully monitored to prevent the intrusion, or infusion, of blarney (a step the American Civil Liberties Union would oppose tooth and nail), some of the data is bound to be suspect.

Nevertheless, that the schools consented to the publication of the summarized data suggests that they believe the data to be valid. Which is enough to justify the opening statement, that the problem is worse than most of us thought.

Most of whom?

This newspaper, for one.

And the folks it talks to and who talk to and with it. Who include teachers, administrators, members of boards of education, people deeply involved in education.

"Why do Shelby's statistics excite you so?"

It's only a few miles down the road. Some Shelby pupils live across the road from Plymouth pupils. What reason is there to believe that Shelby pupils put their pants on other than one leg at a time, as ours do? None, we think. If Shelby pupils are abusing drugs, then it follows that Plymouth pupils are also abusing drugs.

Is there a — and we hesitate to use this term here and now — "quick fix"?

Probably not.

Ohio will raise the legal drinking age to 21 years. He who thinks otherwise has probably been smoking one of those weird cigarettes. There is too much money at stake from Washington not to do so.

Will raising the legal drinking age eliminate abuse of alcohol by the young? Certainly not. But stiff penalties against those who obtain and consume alcohol while under age, and those who provide it to them outside the law, will go a long way toward clearing up some of the problem.

We don't profess to know why teenagers feel they need to drink. It's like that, given any 100 such drinkers, each would have a different one. The Shelby survey noted that many pupils "drink at parties". What parties? Where? Whose house? Were the householders home? Why not? Was alcohol consumed with their knowledge and consent?

"What are these data you refer to? Are you going off half-cocked again? I haven't seen anything like what you're talking about."

Well, friends, here it is, as published by the Shelby newspaper on Nov. 22.

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Will Feb. 3 session give explanation?

Reports that Chairman Douglas A. Dickson labelled as "encouraging" were delivered before the village planning commission Monday night.

Newly created tree commission should have a program plotted by spring, Dickson said.

By May 30, Dickson said, the commission hopes that buildings of historical import will be demarcated by the application of plaques and flags will be displayed by every business. The commission intends to install benches at random about the Public Square.

Mayor Keith A. Hebble suggested that empty storefronts may be lighted and windows decorated with items on sale by other businesses.

Dickson said he hopes the Feb. 3 meeting, when Richard Adair, head of the Richland County

Planning commission, will be present, will disclose the reasons why Plymouth was turned down for a federal block grant.

Last year, it was determined the village — or the Richland county side of it, at least — has so many families whose incomes are below the acceptable level that the village would be certain to be included. But when the last application, filed in 1985, was adjudicated, the rules had apparently been changed and Plymouth was denied.

(Sources available to The Advertiser by telephone said Tuesday "The reason that you didn't get it is not that you don't qualify, but that your priority for a limited amount of funds was low because the others got their applications in and approved before you did."

A three-term councilman here a generation ago, Plymouth's oldest male resident, Clarence O. Cramer, died in Willard Area hospital of a lengthy illness Nov. 27.

He lived here since 1915.

Born in Mercer county, W. Va. July 3, 1897, he lived most of his life in and near Shelby, where he was employed by Ohio Seamless Tube works.

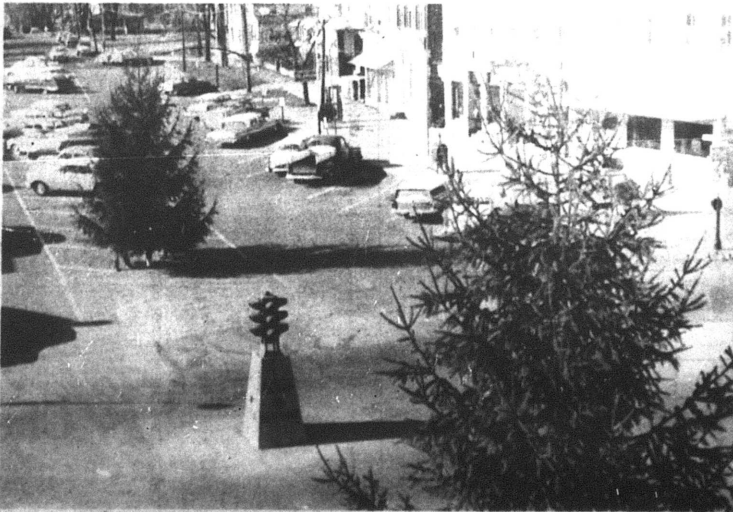
He was a member of First Christian church.

Two dollars (\$2.00) penalty will be added for each tag after January 20th.

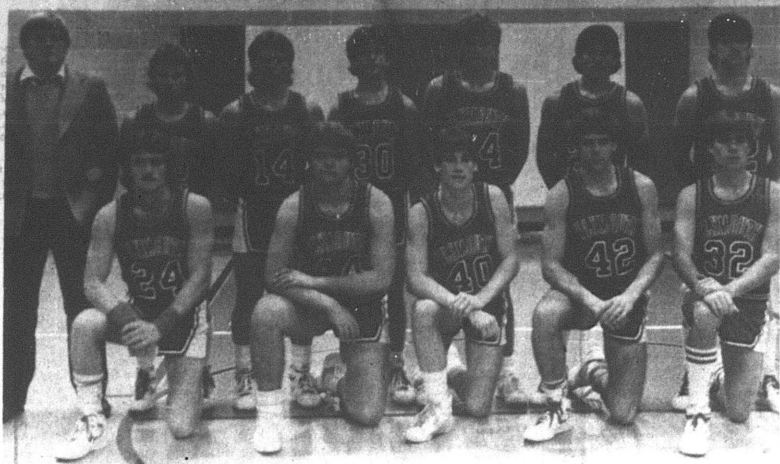

One who is an everlasting optimist, with particular emphasis on Big Red basketball, spoke in glowing words about the prospects of the 1985-86 team, which opens its schedule at home tomorrow against the defending champions of the Firelands conference, St. Paul's.

One among his audience was heard to mutter, "I'm like Mark Twain."

An inquirer put in, "How like Mark Twain?"

The last sentence of Huckleberry Finn is how like Mark Twain. As Casey Stengel said, "you could look it up!"

And the inquirer did look it up. It says, "I been there before."

Truth to tell, there has been but little of deja vu so far as Plymouth basketball goes this season.

The team is larded with experienced players. Beyond the first seven or eight athletes, the reserve strength isn't so great.

So what else is new? It has been ever thus.

Coach Daid P. Dunn is proud of the progress of his squad, each on of whom is of his construction.

He thinks the team should do well. There are others who think so as well, specifically including the players, who together have manifested a better spirit than any team for several seasons.

Who are they?

Four of the five lettermen started last year. These are Troy Keene, Kevin Taylor, Eric Rath, 12th graders, and Steve Hall, 11th grader. The fifth starter, Bryan Christoff, also a 12th grader, was in and out of last season's lineup.

Taylor is the tallest of the lot. He measures six feet three inches. It is upon him that Dunn will rely for much of the rebounding.

Some of which will be done, to be sure, be Keene and Rath, each a six footer.

Hall is the playmaker and the best shot.

Christoff will play at guard. His

defensive work has improved. He has never been a great shooter.

First relief will come from Clarence (Junior) Porter, a 12th grader who also is a strong rebounder. He needs to keep his temper under control.

Next man off the bench will probably be Jason Robinson. As the season wears on, he may very well become one of the most valuable players on the squad. He can shoot, he is quick, he has a good head for basketball and he is a smart passer. If he can produce the stamina required for heavy service over a long season, it will be a plus for him.

Mike Lasch is a pure shooter. He's rather shoot that eat, almost. Through out his schoolboy career he has been

the gunner. On this team he needs to fill a different role. If he can pull it off, he may be the helper that Dunn needs.

It is no secret that the season will rise or fall on these eight. An injury, whether physical or academic, would be disastrous. The others have no varsity experience, no great height, no strong credentials at the senior level. Which is not to say they aren't willing, coachable and eager to excel. Which is, after all, what it's all about.

If Plymouth can manage a 14-and-6 season it will be a remarkable achievement. Its most ardent supporters would be more than satisfied with that record at tourney time.

The full slate of 10 Banner directors, including Steiner and four of his organization who were placed on the board when Krasney sold his shares to Paske Investments Ltd., a London-based investment owned by the 48-year-old Steiner and his family, and Harold J. Harris were chosen as directors.

A native of Austria who was raised in Turkey and in Paris, France, Steiner divides his time among London, Paris and New York. He plans to spend more time in Cleveland, headquarters of Banner, and to visit Plymouth.

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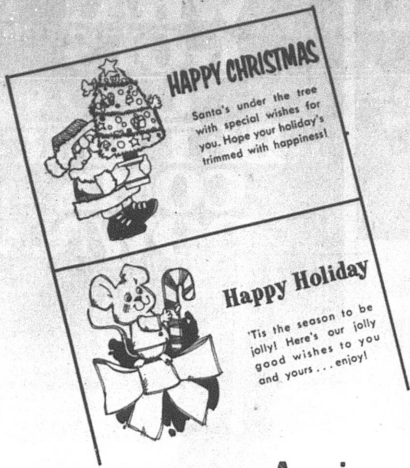
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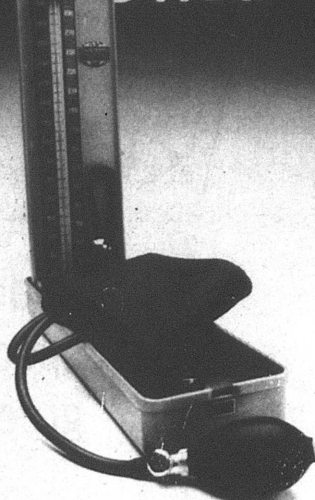
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
