LaVerne L. Moore, 70, 32 Birchfield street, died in his sleep there early Tuesday.

He retired in 1978 after 46 years in the employ of the F&E-Root-Heath Co. and its successor, Plymouth Locomotive Works, Inc., latterly as foreman of the tool room.

Born in Fond du Lac, Wis., Sept. 26, 1914, the son of David and Jennie Lepine Moore, he came to Plymouth as a young boy.

During World War II he served in the Army. He was a member of Ehret-Parrel Post 447, American Legion, here and of Willard Aerie, PO Eagles. He belonged to First Evangelical Lutheran church.

He married Pauline Burkhalter in December, 1937. She survives.

He didn't go about his family duties half-baked, either. He was a good husband and father and a doting and helpful grandfather. His pretty granddaughter and his handsome grandson swelled his heart with pride.

He gave his employer a dollar and a dime's worth of service for every dollar he was paid. Not all of his colleagues could do, or can will say that. Not honestly, anyway.

He was faithful to his patriotic and fraternal organizations and he never forgot his friends.

Hospital selects specialists to manage

A trioka management system of Willard Area hospital was chosen by its trustees Thursday night.

Hospital Management Professionals, Inc., Brentwood, Tenn., will be given a 64-year contract to manage the 64-bed institution.

Donald Kneppel, Willard, president of the trustees, emphasized Friday "control of the hospital remains in the hands of our 17-member board of trustees, all of whom come from Willard School district, Seneca East School district, South Central School district and Plymouth School district."

HMP is an investor-owned firm specializing in management of non-profit hospitals. All of its stock is owned by its employees. It is the third largest company of its kind in the country and the only one managing non-profit hospitals exclusively. It does not own any hospitals. Other Ohio institutions managed by HMP are at Fostoria, Marietta, Amherst and Ironton.

HMP manages 25 others.

HMP will be paid an annual fee. It will nominate several candidates for the vacant post of administrator, left by James H. Ross, Jr., "for personal reasons" after almost 14 years in the hospital's employ. The trustees may accept one or reject all of them and continue to do so until a candidate acceptable to a majority of the trustees is presented.

Kneppel said about a dozen individual applications for the vacant post of administrator had been received. A search committee was ready to screen these and others when the trustees opted for HMP.

J. Michael Bauer, Shiloh, and A. L. Paddock, Jr., Plymouth, are local members of the board of trustees. Paddock was a member of the search committee.

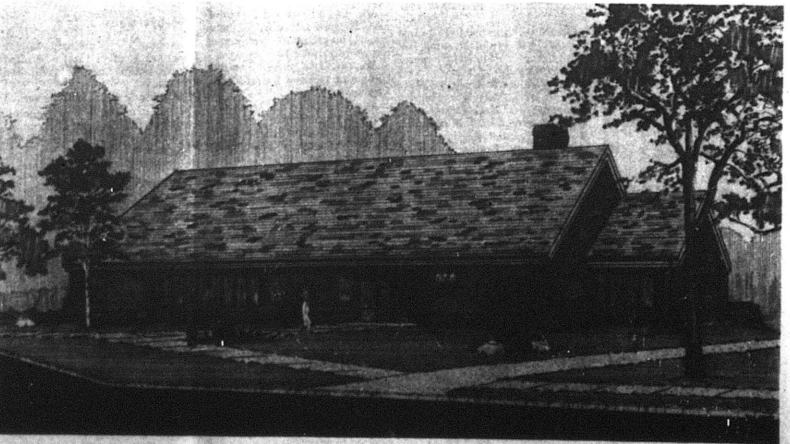

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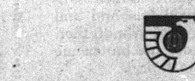

What you need is one cup of prune puree. Add about a half cup of sugar to it and cook until it thickens. Then add a dash of lemon juice and a fourth of a teaspoon of cream of tartar. Chill. Add four beaten egg whites folded in gently. Pour into a baking dish and bake slowly, about 300 degrees, until firm.
With a thick custard sauce, it is great.
Your guests should be very grateful the next morning.

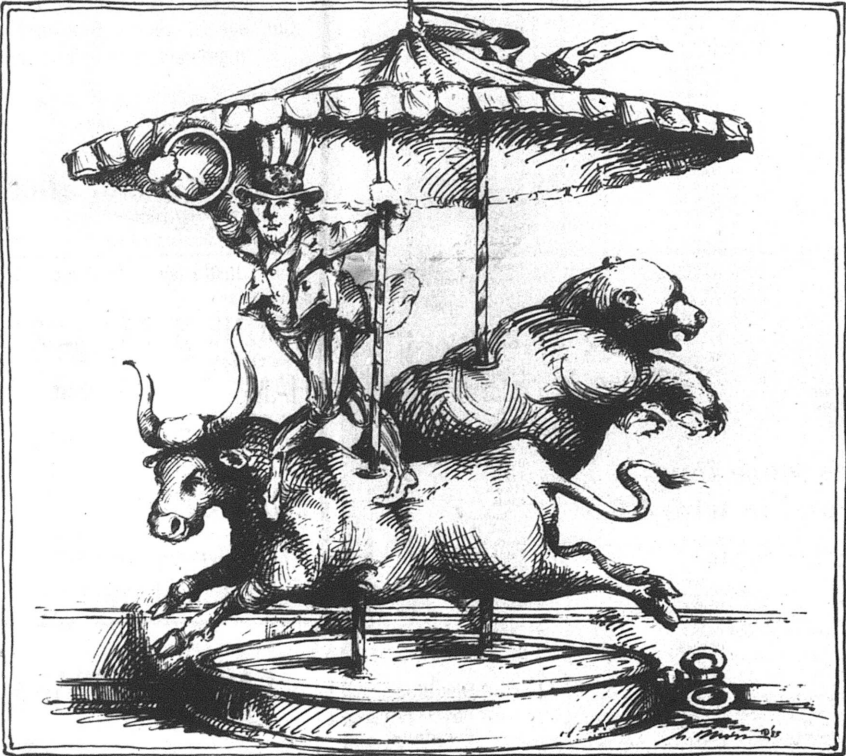

the applicant's proposed movement toward cost-
based pricing, reapportioning market constraints for
its competitive products and services, is reasonable;
- k) whether bonded rates should be eliminated or
phased out;
- l) the level and structure of basic exchange rates
including whether differences in loop length and
density should be reflected in such rates and
whether the applicant's proposal to add 25% of its
non-traffic sensitive costs from its interstate toll
service to basic exchange rates is reasonable;
- m) the applicant's proposal to implement non-
contractual Union-Sentinel (US-Sentinel) business
and residential customers in the Huron, Montrose,
Delaware and Oak Harbor exchanges;
- n) the applicant's proposal for the Extended Area
Service (EAS) surcharge;
- o) the proposed rate for coin service of 20 cents per
call;
- p) the rate levels for operator-assisted calls;
- q) whether the company's sales staff's proposals
regarding customer satisfaction of operational
