Shiloh to spend \$13,860 on streets

Sarver Paving Co. is low bidder at \$13,860 to resurface Shiloh's streets.

Village council there accepted its bid Aug. 14.

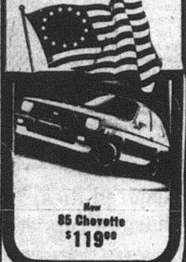

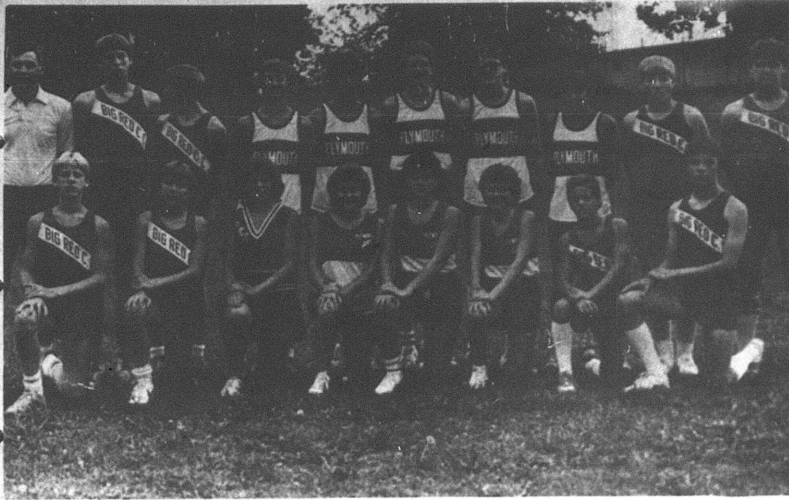

Is carpet cleaning work answer to no work at all?

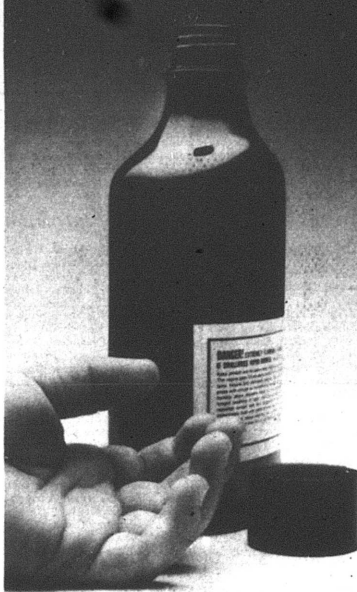

ORDINANCE NO. 5-85
AN ORDINANCE AUTHOR-
IZING AND DIRECTING THE
ADMINISTRATOR TO AD-
VERTISE FOR BIDS FOR CON-
STRUCTION OF A WATERLINE
EXTENSION; AND DE-
CLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, this Council deems
it necessary and advisable to
provide a certain waterline ex-
tension; and,
WHEREAS, this Ordinance is
hereby declared to be an emer-
gency measure immediately
necessary for the preservation of
the public peace, property, health,
safety, and welfare, and for the
further reason that the waterline
extension herein specified is
presently needed in order to ensure
the continued orderly growth and
development of the Village and to
provide essential utilities; now
therefore:

BE IT ORDAINED by the
Council of the Village of Plym-
outh, State of Ohio, 6th members
hereto concurring:

Section 1. That the Admini-
strator be and he is hereby
authorized and directed to ad-
vertise for bids for a waterline
extension, conforming with the
now detailed specifications now
in file in the office of the
Administrator.

Section 2. That for the reason
that the waterline extension
herein specified is presently
needed, this Ordinance is hereby
declared to be an emergency
measure immediately necessary
or the preservation of the public
peace, property, health, safety and
welfare of said Village of Plym-
outh, Ohio.

Section 3. That this Ordinance
shall take effect and be in force
from and after the earliest period
allowed by law.

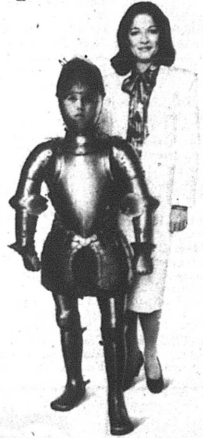
