Contests for two offices, the mayorship and seats on the board of education, will be decided Nov. 5 in the general election.

And for the first time in recent years, almost a full slate of candidates for vacancies at Shiloh has some forward.

Incumbent Mayor Keith A. Hebble, who acceded to that post on the resignation July 9 of Dean A. Cline, must by law seek election at the next general polling to retain it. He has filed a nominating petition.

So has Mrs. Terry Jump, incumbent member of village council, who seeks to be only the second woman in history to become mayor of Plymouth. She is already the second woman in history to aspire to that office. Her predecessor in each case was successful both times.






