

On Monday

It has been our wont, for perhaps 50 years or so, to avail ourselves of Memorial day to pay tribute to all of our dead, whether military or not, whether died in battle or not, whether died in service or not.

That this was not the intention of General Logan when he issued his famous General Order No. 11 in 1868 is of small consequence to those who, by custom, habitually repair on May 30, or May 24, or whichever Monday the Congress chooses to placate the tourist industry, to burial grounds here, there and everywhere to pay respect to the dead.

But we ought not to lose sight of the truth: it is a military holiday, a time when the survivors in the republic offer up their collective thanks for the sacrifice made by those who, almost to a man unwillingly, laid down their lives. And it is a holiday, to take it from its original concept, for the purpose of remembering those who died when our backs were to the wall.

Can we look upon the graves of those whose mortal remains were returned to us and say, in all truth, that we have not betrayed their trust?

Our society is in disarray.

Some of our citizens, innocent ones, at that, are in arrest as hostages in foreign lands and we seem no closer to freeing them now than the day when they were taken.

Even if the data furnished by the agencies that care the most are only half correct, millions of our citizens are hungry, still ill housed, ill clothed, and poorly educated.

We seek to send more of our substance beyond our borders to support movements that do not command the enthusiasm or encouragement of a substantial number of our citizens, yet we seem patently unable to protect our borders from the penetrations of people and goods that are, prima facie, illegal and immoral. The drug traffic from Latin America is a scandal that, if we would but examine it, is more shocking than a thousand Watergates.

A substantial body of our citizenry remains discriminated against by reason of its color. Another substantial body of our citizenry is still beset by prejudice against its manner of worshipping Him.

Those of us who survived the several conflicts into which we as a nation have been drawn over nearly 70 years affiliate with our service organizations that, in simple truth, are more frequented for amusement and more engaged in self-serving activities than in their established purpose so grandly displayed in their constitutions.

We are, all of us, guilty. Guilty as charged and guilty by implication.

Those who laid down their lives for the republic, in whatever fashion, during time of conflict were performing man's highest commandment, the service of his community. He who responds to that call, which has sounded yea, since the day of the man of Samaria, does so out of a sense of duty and obligation. Some do so, as well, out of thirst for recognition. The degree of recognition is often measured harshly. Some are denied recognition, or what they feel is proper recognition, while they are living.

If each of us will perform his community service, in reasonable proportion to his talents and resources, those whom we honor Monday shall not, indeed, have died in vain.

The educated man is compelled, even condemned, to the sharing of his knowledge with his neighbor.

The rich man is compelled, even condemned, to the sharing of his benefits with the poor.

The gifted man is compelled, even condemned, to the display of his talents among the not so gifted.

Community service knows no limits, there is no minimum, there is no point of no return.

We owe it to the men and women to whom, on Monday, we pay tribute in a fashion that they might, if they but could, applaud. But will they thank us for it? Is it enough? Have we done our community service, as they did theirs?

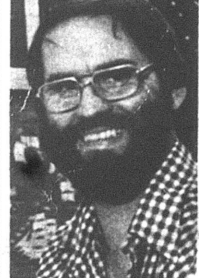
Eckstein new council member; two mill levy on ballot

An alumna of fustoria high school, she was a member of New Haven United Methodist church, whose minister, the Rev. Charles A. Hogue, 3rd, conducted services from Secor Funeral home at Willard Saturday at 2 p.m. Interment was in Maple Grove cemetery, New Haven township.

She is survived by a daughter, now Mrs. Betty Baxter, Willard; three sisters, Mrs. J. J. Patton and Mrs. Leo Lehman, Risingman, and Mrs. Alice Sinsinger, Kewanee, Ind.; two brothers, Cecil and Thomas Sawyer, both of Wayne; four grandchildren and three great-grandchildren. Her husband died earlier.

Councilman Roy Barber said he is puzzled about the full import of sovereign immunity and wishes

the liability of councilmen to be spelled out. Solicitor Richard P. Wolfe, 2nd, will do so.

Hydrants will be flushed the week of June 16, Root said. Householders are warned in advance, he said, that "water may be somewhat discolored for a time".

The two mill operating levy that was narrowly defeated on May 6 will be sent to the Nov. 4 ballot, the council ruled.

Douglas A. Dickson is now the village's director of economic development.

A request that a parcel of land adjoining the pool be made available for storage purposes, in return for appropriate care of the land, was tabled. Mayor Hebble said he would disapprove of an unsightly storage park.

Village to halt Monday to pay tribute to dead of nine wars

Plymouth will halt Monday to join Ohio in observance of Memorial day as the state and nation pay tribute to the dead of nine international conflicts.

A parade will form in West Broadway at 10 a.m. High school band directed by J. Jeffrey Conklin will lead the march, south in Plymouth street to Greenlaw cemetery for ceremonies at the cenetaph and counter march to the Public Square.

In event of inclement weather, there will be no parade. Ceremonies will be in the high school.

A reception for participants and their families and friends will be conducted in Ehret-Parsel Post 447, American Legion, which will conduct the observance, after the parade is dismissed.

The Rev. M. (For Melancthon) Patrick Paetznick, Lutheran pastor here from Mar. 31, 1948 to 1949, one of the most beloved professional men to have served here, will deliver the Memorial day address.

The Rev. Mr. Paetznick is retired as pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran church, Bucyrus, in which city he served in a number of civic appointments and offices, including member of the board of education and trustee of the

community hospital. He was graduated by Paducash, Ky., high school in 1926 and by Wittenberg university, Springfield, and its Hamma Divinity school in 1933.

He served until 1939 as assistant pastor in First Lutheran church, Shelby, whereupon he was transferred to Carey to serve St. Paul's and Pleasant Valley Lutheran churches.

He joined the U. S. Naval Reserve in 1943 and was assigned to the Marine Corps as a chaplain. He served two years in the South Pacific.

After his service here, he went to Bucyrus and stayed there until he retired.

From time to time he served as unpaid and substitute pastor here and in other churches.

He is married to the former Ruth Tindale, Shelby, and they have two sons, John, Canton, and Rick, Shelby.

Invocation and benediction will be delivered by the Rev. Thomas Hoover, minister, Plymouth and Shiloh United Methodist churches.

William Blaud, commander of the post, will lead the pledge of allegiance.

Pate? Why not? Here's recipe!

Not too long ago I read an article on why I wrote describing the worst meals he has ever been forced into eating.

It starting me thinking. Never have I had a really bad meal. Certainly, there were some that I didn't like, but I knew they were tasty and good and everyone else thought they were great.

I've been forced into saying how tasty caviar is when I hate the stuff. That goes for tripe, sweetbreads and boiled dinners as well.

Then I remember a simple supper we had while visiting some French friends who lived practically on the Spanish border in the Basque country.

I vaguely remember that there was some kind of potato salad, soup, hard crusty rolls and a pastry. The one thing I vividly remember was the thin slices of pate, which is nothing but the French version of meat loaf.

After days of hunting, I borrowed the best cookbook I have ever seen, and found what sounded just right.

There are two things about it which make it different from the meat loaves we all slap together. It is partly liver, ground very, very finely.

A food processor does the trick much better than an ordinary meat grinder.

Grind up a pound and a half each of pork liver and lean pork — pork steak works — and three fourths of a pound of salt pork. Mix with two eggs, a little salt, a crushed bay leaf, about two tablespoons of chopped onions, some thyme, about a fourth of a teaspoon of cloves, ginger and nutmeg and a heaping teaspoon of ground pepper. A little brandy or white wine can also be thrown in.

In a greased loaf pan, spread slices of bacon, put the pork mixture in and top with more bacon. This makes a good size loaf and can be divided into several pans.

Bake in a pan of hot water about two hours at 350 degrees.

It's not ready yet. It needs to be pressed down so it is solid. A foil-covered brick will do the trick. Chill it for a good 24 hours. If you try to slice it sooner, it will crumble.

It is to be eaten cold. A little goes a long way, because it is so rich, but filled with vitamins. Pork liver has more than other livers.

There are other versions that can be more expensive, but this is the most common one. The fanciest, of course, is the pate made with goose liver and truffles, both of which are kind of hard to find.

This has been a week of a little experimenting. We all get in such a rut in kitchens and take the easy way out.

Actually, this is easy and I found it when I thought we had to take a dessert to an affair.

It may be old to some. It's just a version of Brownies but with brown sugar instead of chocolate.

The best part is that it only takes one pan and doubles nicely. There

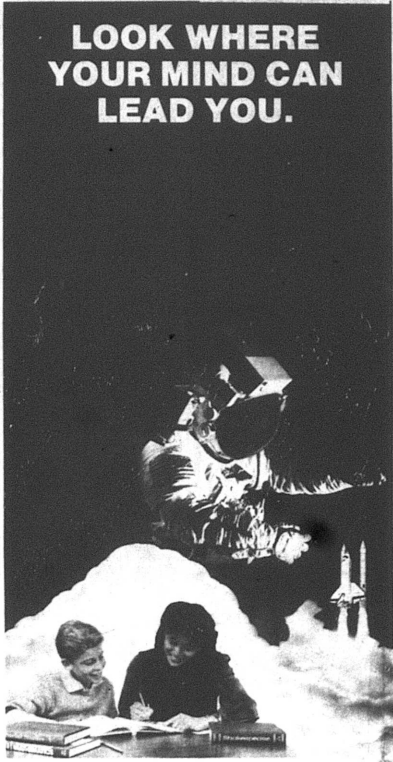

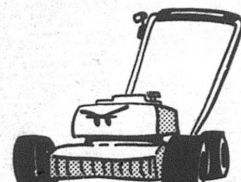

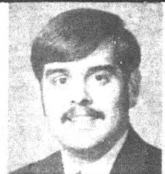
