

Mayor's Court

Historical tour on Saturday

The Firelands Historical society will sponsor a walking tour of the Norwalk West Main Street Historic district Saturday in observance of Ohio Historical Preservation month.

Tours, which will be free, will start from the Firelands Museum, 4 Case Avenue, at 2:30, 3, and 3:30 p.m. If it rains the walking tours will be re-scheduled for May 9.

A portion of Norwalk's West Main Street was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1974 as the result of a nomination prepared by Eric Johannessen, preservationist with the Western Reserve Historical society.

The district is bounded on the east by the Norwalk Public library and the First Universalist church. It extends westward on Main Street to about the 290 block.

Johannessen in his nomination for the National Register quoted from the Phase I report of the 1967 Ohio Historic Survey which state, "Architecturally this is the best individual street of homes in Ohio."

One of the reasons Norwalk's West Main street is significant is the range of architectural styles. Within a few blocks there are well-maintained examples of most of the prominent architectural styles of the 19th century America as well as those of the early 20th century. Building dates for various styles within the district range from 1826 to 1948.

Tour guides will identify styles and give brief histories of the homes. Guides will be: Henry Timman, Huron County historian; Mary Louise Steyer, Plymouth, president of the Firelands Historical society; Shirley Brown, editor of the society newsletter, and Janet Conway, co-ordinator of the Norwalk Old Building Survey.

Schools and village need voter approval for levies

Two issues on Tuesday's primary ballot can affect the future which is needed.

The second levy of 2.5 mills for village and those living in the permanent improvements for our

Plymouth Local School district. The village is seeking a renewal of the existing 1.8 mill levy for the general fund which means the necessary repairs made.

Although the village council is fully aware that 1.8 mills is barely enough, it was decided to put it on the ballot with the hope that it will be approved since it will not raise the present tax, and be in effect for five years.

Economical measures have been taken to trim extra expenses, and Police Chief Stephen Caudill has been able to keep all shifts covered for the safety of the village.

Part of this has been done by volunteer help by auxiliary officers. Since last August a total of 3,361 75 hours have been donated at a savings of over \$21,000 to the village.

If the levy fails, members of the council will have to decide what expenses can be further cut.

The fund is now depleted, down to \$105.30. Because of salary negotiations and the fact that state funding has been cut drastically, to anticipated zero rise for the next school year, the general fund can no longer spare any money for any improvements.

Plymouth schools have been able to operate on the lowest millage of the Richland county schools with 29.3 mills versus Madison which is 43.5.

In Huron county only the Bellevue schools have a smaller millage than Plymouth.

Voters in Huron county who are registered Republicans have three choices for Norwalk municipal court judge.

John Ridge is the lone Democrat seeking the office which Judge Donald Derby is retiring from.

The three Republicans seeking nomination are Stephen Bennett, New London, Phillip White and George Ford, both Norwalk residents.

All three are seasoned lawyers. The only other issue Richland county voters have is the 9 mills for the Mansfield-Richland county health department.

Willard Area hospital has financial worries

Unable to paddle its own canoe, Willard Area hospital will seek to join a stronger entity.

"Trustees meeting on Apr. 27 discussed continuing declines in patient census and management's financial projections that raise serious concerns about financial viability of the hospital," says Joseph Lakes, Plymouth president of the board.

"While the hospital was able to successfully adjust to the 20 patient average daily census it experienced in 1986, show an audited positive net income, and significant improvement in cash reserves, the decrease to a 15 patient average daily census in the first quarter of 1987 may threaten the hospital's financial viability if it continues," according to Frederick M. Welfel, administrator.

The board of trustees has met with every physician to determine what may be causing this decrease and what can be done to improve it to necessary levels.

The board considered options designed to enhance continued hospital services in Willard. The following actions were approved: Commission Ernest & Whinney, the hospital's independent certified public accountants, to review and revise management's financial projections and advise the board of the reasonableness of its May meeting.

2. Advise the Willard city council of Ernest & Whinney's findings regarding the hospital's projected financial position when completed. Also, inform it of the following actions.

3. Initiate discussions with interested area hospitals to explore closer cooperation and/or possible merger. The primary condition will be to insure the continued operation of Willard Area hospital with additional, enhanced

services. 4. Encourage the medical staff to provide reasonable alternative proposals, especially in regards to in-house emergency department physician staffing.

These actions were taken only after lengthy and intensive efforts by the board over the last few years. The hospital's decline has been continuous for this period of time. It was the board's hope that a management contract with HMP would be sufficient to reverse trends. HMP has been somewhat successful, but the unresolved critical issue is that of volume of patients served. This can only be reversed by concentrated, cooperative and expanded medical staff efforts to increase market share and range of quality services provided.

The board has concluded that in order to insure that the hospital remains viable and serves the Willard area community it must seek closer cooperation and/or possible merger with another hospital as its first priority. It is the board's goal, if possible, to keep Willard Area hospital as a non-profit, community hospital, independent of tax subsidy. There are some who say that taxes are the solution but one that the board is not advising being explored by the community unit other, less expensive and potentially more beneficial alternatives are considered.

A board-level committee has been appointed to work with the administrator in discussions with area hospitals. By business necessity, these discussions will remain confidential, until proposals are completed and presented to the board of trustees. If a proposal is approved by the board it will then be presented to the Willard council for its approval as required by the lease agreement with the city.

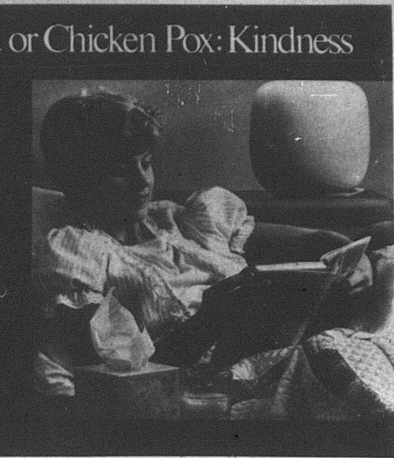
R_x for Flu or Chicken Pox: Kindness

But then he isn't the only one who writes letters to us not knowing a thing about us. I still haven't figured out how Bloomingdale was off in New York knew I was looking for a new pair of shoes and sent me a nice catalogue loaded with them.

Everyone complains about junk mail, but it can be fun and sometimes very interesting. Let's face facts, it creates lots of jobs.

Only once in my life have I ever "sneaked" on to a mailing list. Maybe I shouldn't tell it.

A few years ago I read that Governor Celeste and Dagmar had their Christmas cards done by a Cleveland artist, Robert Laessig. This is as close as we are going to get to having any of Laessig's work in our house.

Years ago when one of our kids graduated I thought a good picture would be a really lasting gift and really not too costly. I even called the gallery in Cleveland to do a little pricing. He never got the

picture, we could eat a year or two on what it would cost, so do you blame me for sneaking in on the governor's Christmas list?

I can hardly wait for the next one, and I'll kill anyone who tells him how sneaky I have been.

If he does find out, I'm ready to ask him to lunch since I have found a new ground beef recipe which makes ordinary hamburger look even less ordinary.

Cheap and easy and downright tasty.

Start with a pound of good ground round steak and don't cheat on the rest of the ingredients. It will make enough for four good servings.

Soak a third cup of fine fresh bread crumbs in a fourth cup of milk. Then mix the meat with a beaten egg and add the crumbs. Mix in with your hands a fourth teaspoon of nutmeg plus some salt and pepper (you can leave the salt out since every doctor says none is good for you). Shape into balls.

In a pan or even on a plate, sprinkle it well with paprika and roll the balls in it. Brown them in about four tablespoons margarine.

Then add some thinly sliced fresh mushrooms and a third cup of finely chopped onion. Cook them together a little longer.

Next add two tablespoons or so of canned beef gravy with a fourth cup of dry sherry. After this add a fourth cup of good cream and simmer over a low flame for about 15 minutes. Next comes a cup of sour cream to be stirred in slowly.

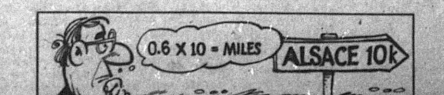
These saucy meat balls can be served on either rice or buttered noodles. Pretty it all up with chopped parsley on top of them.

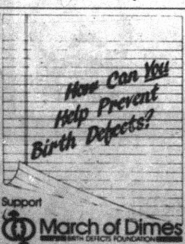

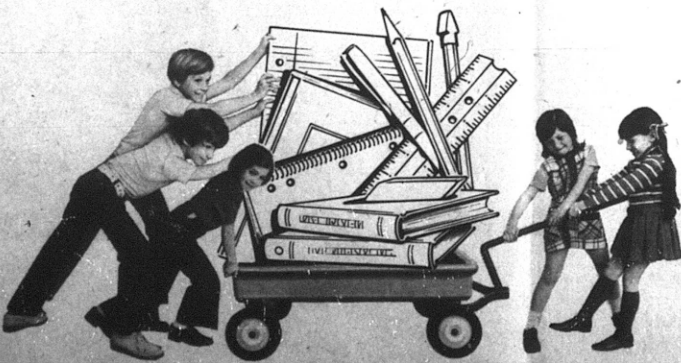

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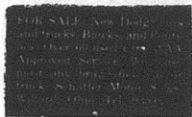

INTENT TO NEGOTIATE
JOINTLY WITH OTHER MUNI-
CIPAL CORPORATIONS FOR

uniform rate shall be defined as a
single gas rate which would apply
to every municipal corporation in
the group of municipal corpora-
tions passing an ordinance to
adopt such a rate.

Garden Tips

A Year 'Round Harvest

Did you know that by planting
on a schedule, you can enjoy fresh
and nutritious vegetables from your
garden practically the year
round? Here's how.

Try planting lettuce between
rows of tomatoes,
cucumber and cab-
bage seedlings. The
lettuce will be ready to pick by the
time the slower grow-
ing plants need the
space. As you harvest
spring crops like peas and spinach,
replace them with a summer crop
of broccoli or celery. Follow summer
crops with a planting of hardy kale
or collards, and you'll harvest
greens right into the winter.

To help ensure bumper crops each
season, you will need a fast acting fer-
