Across the page there is reported that no Plymouth boys wished to be sent as local delegate to Buckeye Boys' State, so the local post of the American Legion was compelled to choose boys from Shiloh.

Which is all right. Perfectly all right.

But it's a slap in the face to a local organization that wants to do local things for local people. The Legion post has from time to time taken its lumps. In this instance it's innocent, more's the pity.

On unruliness

What occurred in the high school gymnasium Saturday night is good reason for us all to feel shame.

For the third time in less than 28 months, unruliness by a crowd of villagers assembled for a schoolboy athletic event has resulted in police action.

Make no mistake about it. What the officials, James Maitland, Galion, and John Sanders, Vermilion, did was certainly a police action. They concluded that unless the game was halted at that point, serious violence would ensue. Who is there to disagree?

The high school principal had earlier summoned police support because of an incident in the second period, when a Plymouth player was ejected from the game for punching an opponent after a foul had been called against a New London player.

At the same time, Maitland ordered a guard retained by the school to leave the premises.

Whether the decisions of the referees were correct is not the issue. When the game was enrolled, the young man at the microphone evoked the notice of everyone in the arena that OHSAA rules would be observed and enforced. There was, there is, no excuse for such untoward conduct.

The referees in their formal report to the commissioner of the OHSAA will state they whistled a foul against the New London player, whereupon a Plymouth player sought to punch the visiting player.

At this point mob psychology swept the crowd.

The mother of a Plymouth player who was knocked down and stunned walked across the court and with the long-stemmed red rose she had been given to celebrate Parents' Night she remonstrated with the alleged offender.

The wife of the president of the Board of Education loudly and vehemently remonstrated with a special officer of the police department, so much so, he said later, "I came within an ace of issuing her a ticket, taking her under arrest and putting her in our cell block."

It is for others to determine if this was seemly conduct. Would the governor's wife be excused for tearing into a police officer summoned to the scene to preserve order and, for obvious reasons, because nobody can ever know when a bud will burst or a firecracker explode, could not prevent an eruption? Certainly not. The incumbent governor's wife would be accorded, perhaps, more publicity, over what she did than at an earlier time, or if she were another woman.

It is only a little over two years that a coach was sacked because he got into a scuffle with some spectators and, later on in that season, when the Black River team was here to play football, the referee and his crew were compelled to call the game because the home team obviously could not control a volatile situation.

It's easy to postulate why these things happen. It's not so easy to prevent their occurrence, or to choose a method of dealing with what appears to be an incipient problem.

In other districts authorities have gone so far as to prohibit attendance at interscholastic contests by all save the contestants, their coaches, their cheerleaders and the media.

Is this what ought to be done here?

Relief to business promised in parley

"We need to do everything we can to help the merchants and businesses of the village," was the opinion of the council rules committee when it met informally Feb. 17.

The three members, Mrs. A.L. Paddock, Jr., Everett Eckstein and H. Lee Welker, will ask the council to amend several ordinances.

For some time several merchants have asked that they be allowed to display merchandise in front of their businesses. This had been allowed for many years until an ordinance was passed July 29, 1985, prohibiting such displays except during a community festival.

The committee hopes the ordinance can be worded so that "eye sores" will not result, and that businesses will cooperate by keeping their displays as close to the buildings as possible.

The other subject discussed was that of being more lenient with advertising signs. This has been requested by several businesses so that people will be aware of where and what they are.

The committee will also suggest this to the full council. The only reservations will be that such signs will not impede traffic, restrict visibility and not cause any hazards to pedestrians.

It all gets made up with love. They love us and everyone else. My right arm proves it. It looks battle-worn because I will be sitting at the kitchen table reading, and they come along and paw it to get attention. They always need to be petted and have their ears scratched. Backs too.

We now have two ladies, and they are lucky. They have their own cat, Charlie, who happily enters into the spirit of it all. They really like each other, which translates to chasing each other all through the house, and it is a real treat when they all decide they need a nap.

All three of them have very high IQ's. The dogs can be outside and somehow know that I am making myself a sandwich, and there they are ready to come in. And the cat moves from his sunny spot to come to the kitchen. So help me, every sandwich I have eaten in years gets shared four ways.

They can change your habits, too. I find myself buying stuff every now and then with bones. For them. Right now they are dealing with ham hocks from black bean soup.

Years back we used to go to a rib place in New Riegel, mostly for just one cocker. Usually there would be just four of us, but one time I hit the jackpot. Five young priests were at the next table, and I leaned over

and asked if I could have their bones. They were nice about it all, and our backyard looked like Death Valley for a week.

Ever since we have been married we have had pets. The first one was Willie, dark expensive, he cost 10 cartons of cigarettes in Italy. We took him to Ethiopia. We flew but he went by boat, and it was pure luck he was found in Eritrea when the boat docked. He became a terrific watch dog, for which I was grateful, but there was one unforgettable incident when we came home from a party and didn't go to bed for a while, but sat up and read. Both of us sniffed something kind of bad. There was Willie crouched in a corner looking very sad. Somehow he had fallen into the outside john the servants used, and he was crucified.

It took the two of us a couple of hours, completely disrobed, to clean him up, and I will never forget those two big brown eyes looking up at us with such gratitude.

One time we had a Siamese who loved television, especially The Untouchables, where they blew up a car each week. She thought it was great. She also liked the Ben Casey program and would actually sit and watch it, just like the rest of us. That is how we all learned how to do brain surgery.

Very unfortunately, our Sunday dinner did not include them. No bones nor left overs. It was a pork roast, the first we have had in years because of diets, but it was so beautiful, I could not resist it.

I had to get out my best cookbook for this, and it was worth it.

Salt (if you want) and pepper the roast and put it in a roasting pan, fat side up.

Place a small onion and half an orange, and a little celery, and put in the pan along with a speck of oregano and a cup of orange juice and a tablespoon of wine vinegar. While the meat is roasting keep basting it with this mixture. When it is finished, skim off the fat, and add a little cornstarch to the liquid for a gravy.

Postema guilty; he gave beer to Robert Hamman

Unruly fans force calling of game

Failure of crowd control compelled officials refereeing Saturday's Firelands conference game to call the contest with 4:22 remaining in the fourth period and New London leading, 66 to 49. What occurred defies description because only a few actually saw what happened and the upshot was more bizarre than what one newsmen said "In 55 seasons of covering high school basketball, I never saw anything like it."

The hero of Friday's contest at Black River, Tony Haymond

collected his third personal foul in the second quarter and was called to the bench. He played the latter part of the third period and started the fourth. He scored two field goals, one from the corner to make it 62 to 46 and another from 12 feet away to make it 66 to 49.

A collision occurred with Keith Cawse and Haymond fell on his back to the floor. He rolled over as a teammate hurried to his side and crawled to his feet. Apparently still dazed, he fell to the floor again.

The Plymouth bench flooded the floor, indignant. At this point, his mother, Mrs. George Haymond, stylishly attired in a sheath dress with spike heels, marched across the court. She held in her hand a single, long-stemmed red rose, the gift to all mothers of players and cheerleaders for this Parents' Night event. She shook it in the face of Cawse. By this time the referees had had enough and called the game. They were about to call a foul on Cawse, it was said, but the fat was by now in the fire.

A handful or so of sheriff's deputies, village police and auxiliary materialized, seemingly from nowhere. There was no melee, there were no threats, there was no violence.

But the damage had been done. Red fans were aggravated earlier in the game when Co-Capt. Terry Hall was ejected at 2:17 of the second period, accused by the referees of throwing a punch at a Wildcat player. It came on the heels of a technical foul whistled against a New London player for pushing after an adverse call by a referee.

Emotion ran high as the game got under way. The arena was nearly filled. And Plymouth built a lead of 16 to 10 before the Wildcat ran nine to the buzzer and led by three at 19 to 16. They continued the run into the second quarter, for 13 points all

told, before Plymouth was able to recover its equilibrium. The Big Red began to show it knows, at least sometimes, what rebound is all about: hit the open man. It cut a fine swath and only a three-pointer by Craig Shaver, who scored 20 for the Wildcats, just at the buzzer, on the heels of an Alley Oop bucket by Keith Shepherd, gave the visitors a six point lead at 40 to 34.

A 10-point run by New London early in the second half sank Plymouth. After 24 minutes it was New London 58, Plymouth 42.

A week earlier, this same Big Red team began the fourth period against Monroeville in the ruck by 16 to 10.

But New London is not Monroeville, not Monroeville, not Monroeville. Not by a long shot. Its tight defense held off Plymouth's attack — in such time as the referees allowed, Plymouth got off only four shots at the basket, making three of them — and indeed outscored the Big Red by one.

The Wildcat shot for field goal 48 times, converting 28, of which one was a three-pointer, and missed six of 15 free throws. They rebounded 28 shots and erred on offense 16 times, 12 of which were unforgotten.

The Big Red shot 41 times and succeeded with 17, of which three were three-pointers and missed six of 15 free throws. It erred on

offense on 15 occasions, 14 of them unforgotten, and rebounded 25 shots. After Shaver, Shepherd and Mike Sunderman had 12 apiece, For the Big Red, Bloomfield was top man with 11, Wilke Schutte scored 10.

That on two occasions in 28 months Plymouth has been involved in unruliness by spectators does not bode well for the community. There is no evidence whatsoever to show that such conduct is taught or encouraged by any of the school staff. If it is a communal affliction, like typhoid, perhaps, or scarlet fever, perhaps quarantine is the right solution.

Anyone with any reasonable idea or explanation of why what happened did, in fact, occur, and what may be done to prevent its ever happening again can write his own ticket and probably collect a couple of thousand signatures on his petition for sainthood.

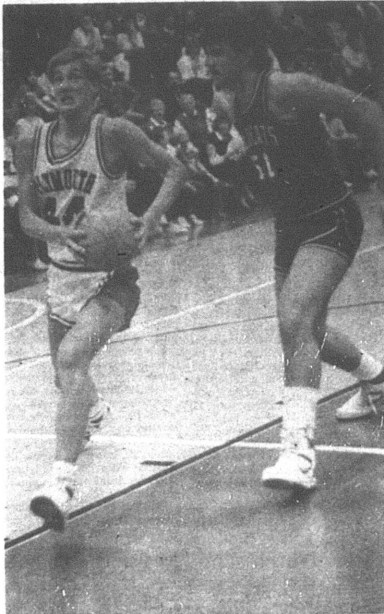

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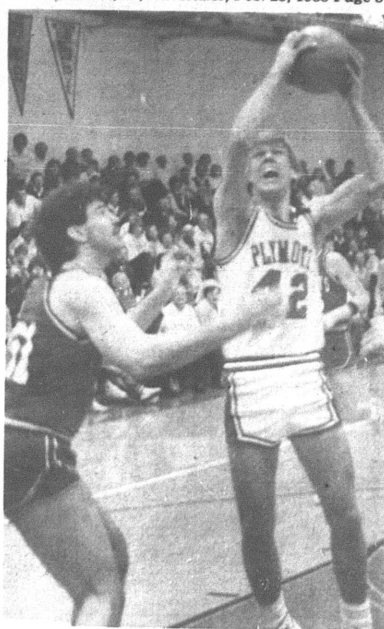
