Montreal Hits For Nine Goals

Although the Montreal Canadiens have scored 18 goals in two games, they insist they're headed toward being a defense-oriented hockey team.

The Canadiens, after winning their season opener 9-1, whipped the Boston Bruins 9-4 Thursday night, getting two goals apiece from Guy Lafleur and Pete Mahovlich.

After being ousted in last season's Stanley Cup semifi-nals by the Buffalo Sabres, the Canadiens were supposed to undergo a face-lift. Coach Scotty Bowman said. No more offensive, wide open hockey, he insisted.

But even if the Canadiens played their accustomed skating game against the Bruins, there were signs Bowman's predictions were coming true.

"Only one even-strength goal in two games," he said. "I'd say that was playing defensive hockey. Boston scored three power play goals and the (Los Angeles) Kings scored one the night before. No kidding, we're trying to check. We're conscious of defense out there. But it's good to get a game like this, and even better to get two games in a row like this. It gives a team confi-

"It's not the easiest thing to do," says the strikingly handsome running back who was the Browns' first of two ninth-round draft picks last February. "I watch what's going on

and think what we'd be trying to do if I was in there," he added. "but it isn't the same. I want to be able to help my teammates."

Poole says he no longer feels pain, but the danger lies more in being struck another severe blow that could sideline him for good. Surgery is another possibility if the calcium formation hardens, but Poole makes it clear he wants no part of that.


