



SMCC take advantage of St. Paul miscues

Fumbles hurt Flyers in 34-12 season-opening loss

SANDUSKY --- What started during the two preseason scrimmages carried over in St. Paul's 34-12 opening loss to St, Mary Central Catholic Saturday at Strobel Field.

Seven fumbles, including four that were lost, ended any hope the Flyers had in reversing a scason-ending loss to the Panthers in the fall of 2003.

"It's mental discipline," St. Paul coach John Livengood said of Saturday's game. "It is something that as a coach you have no answer for. Had I had one, I would have fixed it during the game. The bottom line is we gave St. Mary a short field early and often and a good team like that one is going to take advantage of the situation."

St. Mary coach Toby Notestine said that turnovers were the key.

"It is so uncharacteristic of a John Livengood-coached team to do that. I was shocked," the sec-ond-year coach said. "It certainly made it a lot easier, although we knew St. Paul would be without the kid that threw the ball over the place against us last year. They are going to be fine.

"Like I said, I am shocked that we scored this many points on them and we wouldn't have had we not made the most of our opportunities.

"We saw them put it on the ground against Edison a week ago, but I figured John would have that fixed. That's a great

coaching staff he heads and fumbling is not something those guys are going to put up with. It will be fixed and I would think, rather quickly."

Stopping Spencer Dye, St. Mary's All-Ohio candidate, was Livengood's primary concern going into the opener.

The senior running back did get 108 yards in 20 carries, numbers not off the charts considering the potential of an athlete who has scored 51 career touchdowns and will probably rush for over 5,000 yards before its all over.

Besides, Dye's numbers were more than offset by what St. Paul's junior halfback Gabe Stoll did Saturday night, such as 224 yards in 29 carries.

But, before Stoll got rolling, the Flyer brain-trust could only watch as SMCC got one short field after another in piling up a 27-0 lead.

Rob Whitehurst coughed up the opening kickoff with Berkley Michly recovering at the St. Paul 39 yard line.

Dye scored five plays later from the 2. Zach Wasiniak then put it on the ground four plays into the next possession.

The Panthers needed 31 yards. Dye got the final 13 on a pass from Aaron Opfer to increase SMCC's advantage to 12-0 midway through the first quarter.

The Panthers earn their next touchdown. Driving 96 yards with T.J. Blanton running the team and Opfer going to a wide-

Then, when Corey Spaar caught the fumbling disease on St. Paul's ensuing possession, the Panthers saw still another gift.

A 29-yard pass from Opfer to veteran end Brinden Baum got most the 45 yards.

Two plays later, Dyc caught a swing pass in the left flat and chugged in from 15 yards out. That was his 51st career touchdown - a number that tied Mike Lill on the school's all-time list.

With Stoll the primary runner, St. Paul took six plays to eat up 58 yards. Stoll followed blocks around the left side for the final 21 yards.

It took just one play into the second half, however, for Flyers fans to recognize there would be no miraculous rally. Opfer found Olds running

loose in the middle of the St. Paul secondary and the two hooked up on a 67-yard play that made it a

St. Paul attempted to match that score the old fashioned way by continuing to run the football. The Flyers came within a foot

of doing so. That's how close it was to the St. Mary goal line after 13 plays.

Unlike the earlier one, though, the drive wasn't halted as the Gabe Stoll and his cousin Joe pounded the ball the last seven times in gaining 44 yards.

It also featured a rare forward pass — an 8-yard completion from junior quarterback Brendan Roberts to senior tight end Adam Schaffer.

Gabe Stoll worked the final yard with 2:29 left for the eventual final score.

"Now our sights will be set on 9-1," Livengood said. "We are

going to get a few players back this week and that will help. It is obvious where we have to

"This was not St. Paul football tonight. We have to improve and do it quickly."

St. Paul returns to the action Saturday at Whitney Field by hosting Tiffin Calvert.

Berner scores \$20,000 in Pro Stock shootout

Pete Berner was crowned the champion of the \$51,000 Sunoco Pro Stock Shootout Saturday during the 27th annual IHRA Sunoco World Nationals presented by PPG Automotive Refinish Norwalk Raceway Park.

Berner, 49, of Crete, Ill., pocketed \$20,000, defeating defending champion Frank Gugliotta.

The final was a rematch of last year's shootout.

"That was a good race," said Berner, who entered the event as the second seed. "We knew we had to stay focused on winning. Getting the opportunity to race Frank again and for it to be as close as was made the experience tremendous. This was no doubt this was the best race of my career."

Although not the fastest and quickest, Berner was unbeatable in eliminations and posted a quicker reaction time in all three rounds.

The first victory on Berner's march to the money run came at the expense of Elijah Morton from Jacksonville, N.C.

Berner pulled a .083 holeshot and extended that lead to a 6.596, 209.72 to 6.603, 208.39

decision. The semifinals saw Berner put a .03 second starting line advantage in his pocket against Rick Jones, of Galesburg, Ill., winning with a 6.562, 211.66.

Jones in a losing effort produced the top speed of the shootout at 213.16.

In the final, Berner recorded his third consecutive holeshot win as he reeled off a quicker reaction time and sped to a winning 6.608, 210.97.

Gugliotta, of Mt. Airy, Md., was the runner-up with a 6.609, 212.39.

"I have been working hard on my reaction times," Berner said. "That was something we needed to improve on and my team was very supportive. I have a great team that made this win possible."
