Millican, Janis clinch titles at Norwalk

Clay Millican might have won the war, but Doug Foley keeps

winning the battles. Foley topped Millican in the Top Fuel Final of the World Nationals presented by PPG at Norwalk Raceway Park Saturday. It was his second consecutive finals win over the perennial IHRA Top Fuel power. Foley was joined in the winner's circle by Pat Moore (Pro Modified), Jim Sickles (Funny Car) and Mike Bell (Pro

Stock). But Millican did clinch his fourth consecutive World Title in the class, while Mike Janis clinched the 2004 IHRA Pro Modified crown at the rescheduled World Nationals.

The Nationals were originally held in August, but was postponed due to inclement weather.

Millican clinched his fourth consecutive title just by showing up, and Janis captured his second overall-the first coming in

The win at Norwalk handed Foley his third Iron Man of his rookie season.

"I've never been in a situation where it was a pedal-fest," Foley said. "Clay has a tremendous amount of experience in that type of a situation, and I don't. I took one stab at it, looked to my side and he wasn't there, so I just kept going.'

Getting down the track safely was his biggest concern.

"I pedaled it, trying to keep it as safe as I could," Foley said. "But I wasn't going to let up that

Foley and his team hope the momentum can continue into the off-season.

"We want to be one of the major players and be a team player within the IHRA," Foley team owner Tim Lewis said. "We want to be a contender and nobody is more amazed at our progress than we are.

The Pro Modified final was another close race, with Pat Moore just getting the best of Quain Stott by posting a run of 6.31 seconds to Stott's pass at 6.35 seconds.

But all of the drama wasn't just in the finals. Upsets seemed to be the order of the day as at least one underdog from each professional class made it to the finals. In the Pro Modified semifinals, Pat Moore beat out Mike Janis with an elapsed time of 6.47 seconds at 213 mph.

In the second race, Stott defeated Rick Distefano with a pass of 6.21 seconds at 230 mph.

In the Funny Car final, Sickles eked out a win against Frederick Tigges, 5.88 seconds against 5.92 seconds.

"We've been struggling, not on our game," Sickles said. "But we went some rounds and got to the finish line. Get the car from A to B, that wins races and we certainly proved that."

In the Funny Car semis, Sickles defeated reigning champ Rob Atchison with an elapsed time of 5.98 seconds at 237.34

mph. Tigges beat Mark Thomas with an elapsed time of 5.86 sec-This ruled out an

Atchison/Thomas final, a much anticipated race between the two points leaders.

In Pro Stock, Mike Bell beat out Ron Miller with an elapsed time of 6.52 seconds at 212 mph - his first IHRA national victory of the season.

In the Pro Stock semis, Bell's reaction time of .003 got the best of Steve Spiess. In the second semi, Miller beat Tony Gillig, who had earlier posted a Norwalk Raceway Park clapsed time record at 6.47.

While the championships are a foregone conclusion in Top Fuel and Funny Car, the other two professional classes will be down to the wire as IHRA heads down to Rockingham Friday through Sunday for the Ninth Annual Bethesda Softworks World Finals, the final event on the IHRA calendar.




