

13 Area Football Teams Open Skeds Today

Madison 11 Will Battle Crestliners

Football, 1950 style, makes its grand entrance this week end with 15 area schoolboy elevens ready to open their schedules. Thirteen teams pry the lid off tonight while Mansfield Madison and Crestline wait until tomorrow evening to inaugurate festivities.

The Mansfield Senior high school-Akron South clash holds the spotlight among tonight's tilts. The two clubs battle at 8 o'clock at Edlin Field in what promises to be a fireworks loaded opener for the defending state champion Tigers.

The inexperienced Madison Rams face pretty much of an unknown quantity in their Saturday duel with the Crestline Bulldogs. The Crestliners had a poor season in 1949, but have nine returning lettermen and eight seniors in the starting lineup. The team is light averaging less than 160 pounds in weight, but is fast.

Don Woods, a 160-pound back, holds the key to the Bulldogs' season. Woods operated at both the quarterback and the left halfback posts and is a triple threat performer. He will alternate at the two positions with Bill Morton, a 130-pound junior.

Woods, however, may not be in the best of condition for the Saturday tussle. He suffered a knee injury in a scrimmage session and may not see too much action.

The Hilltoppers went through a heavy workout last night following which head coach Roger McGee was still undecided regarding several positions. The center slot, the two guard posts, and one tackle spot are wide open.

Bill Briggs was slated to occupy the right guard position, but came up with a badly bruised knee and probably won't see service in the curtain raiser. Dick Fox, a 200 pounder, who anchors the defensive line, is being groomed to fill in at guard.

McGee is very well pleased with the team spirit, which is exceptionally high. "We'll give Crestline everything it wants," he stated last night.

Seven Northern Ohio league squads, Crestline excluded, initiate their campaigns against non-loop opponents tonight. Defending loop champion, Shelby, entertains Fostoria, a team which edged the Whippets in the 1949 opener.

Two NOL members are at home for the first game. Bucyrus plays host to Tiffin Columbian and Upper Sandusky lays out the welcome mat for Gibsonburg. All other contests are on foreign grounds.

A hefty Galion outfit goes against Tiffin Calvert, Norwalk meets Fremont Ross, Bellevue tangles with Fremont St. Joseph's, and Willard journeys to Ashland.

In 1949 the league teams started their seasons with five wins, two losses, and one tie. Upper Sandusky demolished Gibsonburg, 26-6; Crestline downed Lima St. Rose, 37-13; Galion blasted Tiffin Calvert, 31-7; Willard edged Ashland 13-12; and Bucyrus upset Tiffin Columbian 7-0 to account for the victories.

Norwalk and Shelby were beaten, Norwalk fell before Fremont Ross 32-13 and Shelby was nipped by Fostoria. Bellevue and Fremont St. Joseph's struggled to a 6-6 tie.

The two Richland county Class B combines start the campaign on their home fields tonight. Plymouth's Pilgrims dedicate a new \$25,000 stadium when they tussle with Norwalk St. Paul's and Bellevue collides with Millersburg in a Mohican league contest.

New London begins its 10-game state by trekking to Amherst. Mount Gilead, a perennially strong unit, is visited by Marion St. Mary's.

Two area six-man games are booked for this evening. Sparta, which started its season in a preview last Friday against Claridon, is involved in a fracas with Alexandria on the Spartans' field, and Hayesville plays its first of three straight home games against Chesterville.

TIRO — The Tiro Merchants baseball team attempts to close its season with a 500 record when it entertains the Leesville Reds Sunday afternoon at two o'clock.

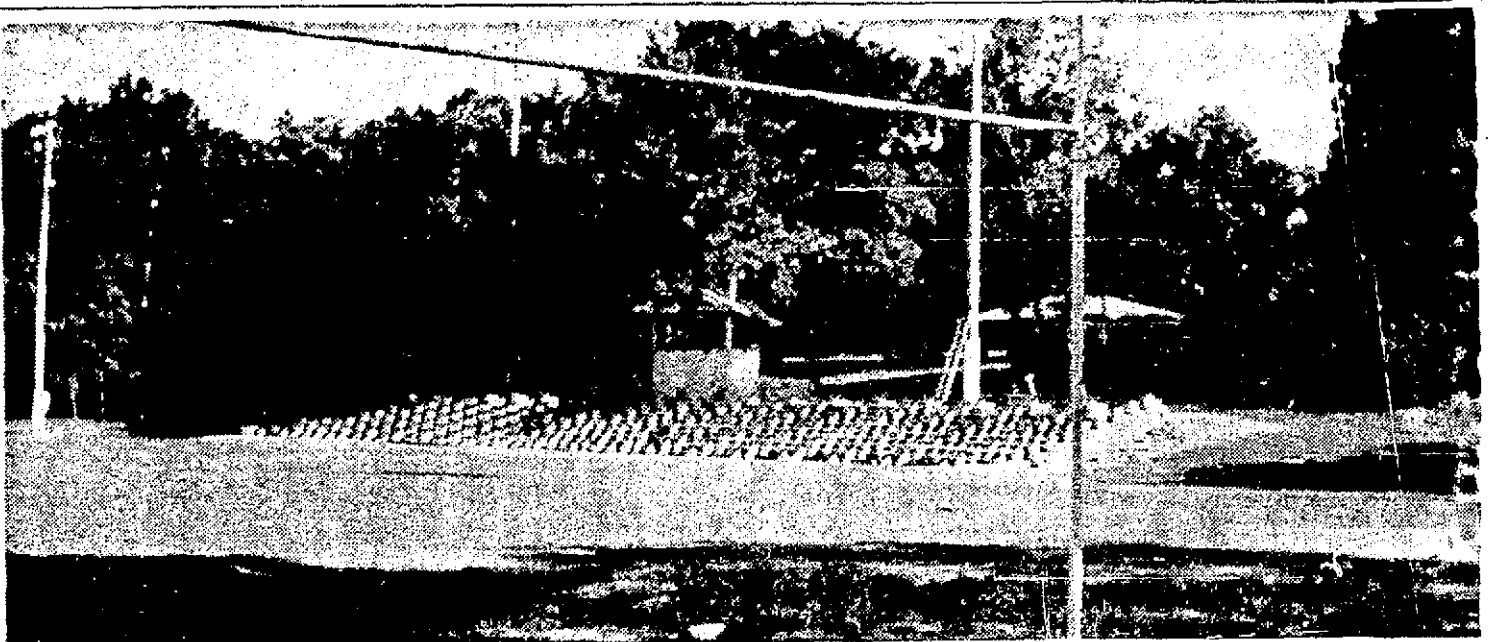
The Merchants need a victory to gain an even split for the season. They have won 14 of 29 games.

Plymouth High Grid Team Dedicates \$25,000 Field

PLYMOUTH—The Plymouth high school football team dedicates the city's new \$25,000 stadium tonight at eight o'clock when it opens the 1950 season against Norwalk St. Paul's. The new field is said to be one of the finest in North Central Ohio. Sixty high-powered lights illuminate the playing area and the concrete stands seat 1,200 fans. The stadium is located in Mary Fate park here.

Plans for the stadium were drawn up early last spring by the Plymouth Booster club. Through donations and bond sales sufficient cash was raised to pay for the installation of lights and the construction of the concrete bleachers.

The Pilgrims face Norwalk with a team bolstered by the return of seven lettermen. However, Don Frail, who is in his first year as Plymouth coach, is concerned by the lack of capable reserves to support the regulars.

Returnees from the 1949 team, which won three of nine encounters, are Center Neil Kennedy, a 150-pound junior, End Duane Wilson, a 155 pounder, 100-pound halfback Larry Hampton, Larry Schreck, 155-pound fullback, Lou Root, 160 - pound quarterback, and Tackles Dan Eby and Don Ray. Eby, a converted end, is a junior and weighs in at 153. Ray is the heaviest squad member. A senior, he tips the scales at 250.

Filling out the starting lineup are End Bud De Viny, Guards Joe Lee Kennedy and Roger Hampton, and Right Halfback Tom Rhine. De Viny is a 150-pound senior. Kennedy is a junior weighing 153, and Hampton and Rhine, both sophomores, weigh 140 and 145 pounds each.

Tackle Jim Deoneworth is also expected to see heavy duty. He is a 175 pound senior. The Norwalk line will outweigh the Plymouth forward wall considerably, but the Pilgrim backs will have a weight edge on the visitors' offensive quartet.

Both clubs run from the T formation.

Ewell, Hark to This Hard Luck

NEW YORK--(UP)--Ewell Blackwell can moan about his luck after losing a one-hitter to the Brooklyn Dodgers, 3 to 1, Tuesday but the Cincinnati right-hander is as lucky as the guy who fired 28 consecutive passes at Monte Carlo compared to baseball's "Les Miserables."

They're the unlucky seven who pitched no-hitters and didn't win!

Charter member of this unique club was a Brooklyn Dodger (natch) pitcher named Edward J. Kimber. Kimber pitched his heart out, without allowing a hit for 11 innings trying to win one for the 1884 Dodgers but all he got was a 0-0 tie when the game was called on account of darkness.

But even Kimber was lucky (well, practically) compared to the other members of the club. They lost their games!

For the record, these unfortunate were Earl Moore of the 1901 Cleveland Indians, Leon Ames of the 1909 New York Giants, Tommy Hughes of the 1910 New York Yankees, Jim Scott of the 1914 Chicago White Sox, Hippo Vaughn of the 1917 Chicago Cubs and Bobo Newsom of the 1934 St. Louis Browns and a couple dozen other major and minor league teams.

Vaughn lost because he just wasn't the best pitcher on the field that day. His opponent, Fred Toney of the Reds, hurled 10 hitless innings to gain the nod, 1 to 0. Vaughn matched him for nine innings in the only double no-hitter on record but "collapsed in the 10th." Obviously he just didn't have a strong arm.

Ames pitched nine hitless innings against the Dodgers on April 15, 1909 only to lose, 3 to 0, in 13 frames. Hughes didn't allow a hit until the 10th inning but the Cleveland Indians routed him, 5 to 0, in the 11th.

Scott held the Washington Senators hitless for nine only to lose, 1 to 0, in the 10th. Moore lost, 4 to 2, when the Chicago White Sox caught up to him in the 10th and Newsom blew the duke to the Red Sox, 2 to 1, in 10 after getting his no-hitter.

So, losing a one - hitter just can't be considered too tough to take unless you care to feel sor-

ry for Floyd Bevens, who picked the fourth game of the 1947 World Series to pitch a one-hitter and lose, 3 to 1. That was the famous Cookie Lavagetto game and it had a further ironic twist when both were shipped back to the minors the following season.

Dizzy Dean has a heart-rending story to explain how he missed his no-hitter. Dix was furious after Brother Paul hurled one in the second game of a Sunday double header with the Dodgers in 1934. Dix had pitched a three-hit shutout in the opener. "How do you like that guy," wailed Dix. "He don't even tell me he's gonna do it. If he tells me, you don't think them bums get a hit off me in the first game, do you?"

So, how can you feel sorry for Luke Sewell? He's lucky! Manager Luke Sewell is going to let him take his next start in turn.
