Jim Seitz and Bob Beveridge will handle the quarterbacking duties with Mike Sweet pairing with Jameson at the halfbacks. Chuck Hoenig will start in the fullback slot with Dick Thomas in reserve.

ATLANTA. (UP)—Mae Murray, the tiny upset queen from Rutland, Vt., meets Helen Sisel of Philadelphia and Grace DeMoss of Corvallis, Ore., plays Beverly Hanson of Pasadena, Cal., today in the semi-finals of the Women's National Amateur Golf Tournament.

Miss Murray, a poker-faced, 24-year-old spry, won the hearts of the gallery yesterday when she knocked off a pair of favorites on the East Lake course.

The Little New England Miss first defeated Helen Fay Crocker of Uruguay, 1 up, on the 27th holes in a holdover match that was interrupted after 21 holes on Tuesday because of darkness. It was the longest match in the 50-year history of the tournament.

Then, in the quarter-finals, Miss Murray eliminated Dorothy Kieley of Long Beach, Cal., U. S. Curtis cup star and one of the favorite, 1 up, winning the match on the 18th hole.

Miss Siegel gained the semi-finals with 3 and 2 victory over Betsy Rawls of Austin, Tex.; Miss DeMoss, 1949 Canadian amateur champion, made it with a 1 up triumph over Dorothy Kirby of Atlanta, while Miss Hanson beat Philomena Garvey of Ireland, 5 and 4.

Grand Slams Put Bombers Back In A. L. Driver Seat

DETROIT. (UP)—The New York Yankees, blasting homers in traditional Bronx Bomber fashion, jumped back into the American League driver's seat today for the stretch drive sprint.

Dropped to second place by the 1950 edition of murderer's row, the Detroit Tigers' knew that their meetings with the Yankees today and tomorrow could tell the tale of the exciting pennant race.

Come From Behind
The homer-hitting Yankees came from behind with round trippers by Joe DiMaggio, Johnny Mize and Cliff Mapes to clip the Tigers, 7 to 5, yesterday and grab a half-game lead.

The slugging session upped New York's homer total to a blistering 30 in the last 16 games. The Yanks have gone homerless only once during that string.

Art Houtteman drew the apparently difficult task of taming the Yankee bats today. The Bombers threw Tommy Byrne at Red Rolfe's crew in the second game of the vital series.

Top 1941 Bombers
The current Yankee club has topped the homer average of the 1941 Bombers when the latter club set the record of 40 four baggers in 25 consecutive games.

"Homers have kept us in contention all season, and we're counting on 'em to keep us in front all the way," Manager Casey Stengel said after yesterday's Yank victory.

Cincy Reds Take Double Threshing From Brooklyn

PHILADELPHIA. (UP)—The Cincinnati Reds, who absorbed a double threshing from the Brooklyn Dodgers yesterday, move in here tonight for another doubleheader with the Philadelphia Phillies.

Willie Ramsdell, who has eight wins and 12 defeats, and Howie Fox, who has an 8-8 record, will go against Bubba Church and Robin Roberts for the Phils. Church has won eight and lost four, while Roberts has 19 victories against eight defeats.

The Dodgers picked up a game on the idle Phillies by trouncing the Reds 6 to 3 and 5 to 2 yesterday before a crowd of 3,431, the smallest to see a twin bill here in many years.

The Dodgers made it seven in a row yesterday behind the pitching of Erv Palica and Preacher Roe, who hadn't won for the Brooks in about three weeks. Ralph Branca turned in a fine relief performance to save Roe's win for him in the ninth inning of the nightcap.

The Reds loaded the bases on two Texas league singles and a boot by Bobbie Morgan in and struck out pinch hitters Grady Hatton and Lloyd Merriman. Morgan led the 12-hit attack with a pair of doubles as the Brooks tagged Ed Erazt for his first loss of the season.

Palica Coasted to his ninth triumph in the opener after homers by Gil Hodges, Carl Furillo, Bill Cox and Bruce Edwards. The Dodgers drove out Ken Raffensberger in the first inning when Hodges and Furillo hit for the circuit.

Two of the seven hits off Palica also sailed out of the park. Rookie first sacker Ted Tappe from Charleston of the Central League hit a homer his first time up in the majors when he batted for pitcher Frank Smith. Joe Adcock got the other circuit clout for the Reds.

4 Teams Battling In Baseball Finals

YOUNGSTOWN. (UP)—Four teams battled down to the wire in the National Amateur Baseball Federation tourney today with New York rated a good bet to take the championship for the second year in a row.

New York, with five wins and no losses in the two-defeats-and-out tournament, remained the only undefeated team in competition after trouncing Detroit 6 to 0 yesterday.

New York was to play Dayton today and Youngstown was scheduled to meet Detroit. Each of the three teams remaining besides New York has won four and lost one.

NEWARK, O. (UP)—The champion Marion Red Sox were within one game of winning the Ohio-Indiana League playoffs today.

The Sox chalked up their third straight playoff victory over the Newark Yankees here last night, 11 to 3. Marion pounced on three Newark pitchers for 13 hits and sewed up the game with a four-run spurge in the third inning.

The teams will rest today, resuming action here tomorrow night. If a fifth game is needed it will be played here Sunday.

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Flyers Meet Plymouth In New Grid Stadium

Although not getting the work desired in preparation for the game, Coach Bill Mazzocco said this morning his entire squad was in good shape eager for tonight's battle against the Plymouth Pilgrims at Plymouth.

This will be the first game played in Plymouth's new \$25,000 lighted football field. Game time is scheduled for 8.

The new lighted field is said to be one of the best in north central Ohio. The regulation size field is equipped with sixty high-powered lights that will illuminate it perfectly for players and the spectators. Bleachers have a seating capacity for 1200 fans. The field, located in Mary Fate Park, is a "natural," for it sets in the north-end of the park with an amphitheater effect for bleachers. A short slope on which the bleachers are located, gives just enough height for fans to observe the entire field at any angle.

Plans for the lighted field and stadium were drawn up early last spring by the Booster Club, made up of local sports fans who support the high school football and basketball teams. Through donations and bond sales sufficient cash was raised to purchase the necessary materials for the lights and stadium. The entire building program was done by local men who contributed their time.

For the past two weeks the Pilgrims have been in local training to give their opponents a tough time in the initial game of the season. Coaches Frail and Mercer have worked the boys long hours to give them the right techniques for a successful team this year.

Fans in this area will find plenty of seats at the Plymouth stadium if they wish to see the game.

Tribe-Senators In Twin Bill At Stadium

CLEVELAND. (UP)—The Cleveland Indians and Washington Senators, rained out here last night, will play a two-night twin bill here tonight.
