PLYMOUTH—Prying the lid from the 1950 football season here last night at a new \$25,000 stadium, the St. Paul Flyers turned the power on their host and beat them by the one-sided score of 30 to 12.

In winning their initial game, Coach Bill Mazzocco's stalwarts displayed an effective overhead attack and a heads-up brand of ball, with fast charging line.

Backfield Aggressive
Bearing the brunt of last night's attack were halfbacks Kenny Spaar who scored one touchdown, Chuck Oberwiler and fullback Harold Landoll, who registered two touchdowns. In the last 30 seconds of play, right tackle Ronnie Jaworski intercepted a pass at midfield and raced nearly 50 yards for the final touchdown of the tilt. Two of the extra points were made by Oberwiler, one by Spaar and one by Jaworski.

Norwalk muffed at least three chances to score when they worked the ball down deep into the Pilgrim territory, only to lose the ball on fumbles. They scored a safety on their opponents late in the fourth quarter when the Flyers smothered Plymouth's fullback Larry Schreck as he was about to punt out of danger from the one-yard line.

Stars for Losers
Schreck, who starred for the losers, scored both of the Pilgrims' touchdowns. He intercepted a pass early in the third quarter and raced 20 yards for his team's first marker. His second tally in the quarter, was made on a 45 yard run thru the entire Flyer team.

Norwalk's offensive was highlighted by the passing of quarterback Dave Ross and the running attack of the three men in the backfield, who repeatedly clipped off substantial yardage. The Flyers' fast charging line and the line backers constantly broke thru Plymouth's defense, throwing opponent players for heavy losses.

If the Flyers can eliminate the costly fumbles and develop a defense for a runner of Schreck's type, they'll come through the season with colors flying.

Williams Belts Homer, Three Hits Yet Is Apologetic About "Stiff" Arm

ST. LOUIS — (AP) — Ted Williams of the crooked arm and the booming bat was doing business at his old stand in left field today and the Boston Red Sox thanked their lucky star for his return.

Williams, out of the regular lineup since he broke his elbow in the All-Star game July 11, got four hits in six trips as the Sox ended the St. Louis Browns' eight-game winning streak, 12 to 9, yesterday.

Whistling Drives
Williams' sixth-inning homer, his 26th of the year, was a tremendous fly ball that cleared the roof of the right field pavilion. His other hits, all singles, were whistling line drives.

"Ted told me he was ready and that's enough for me," Manager Steve O'Neill said before the game. He was positive of it before the game ended.

Williams had reservations about his comeback.

"I have only about 55 or 60 per cent of the strength I had before I broke my elbow," he said. "You see, I just can't make a muscle with my left arm," he went on, flexing his arm.

Fears He Shipped
"I had some good balls to hit to-day but I'm afraid I didn't hit 'em as well as I used to."

Williams explained that long inactivity had caused a tightening of his tendons.

"I'm all right if I go right out after a whirlpool bath when I'm warmed up. But if I stand around, my arm stiffens up."

In the Browns dressing room, Manager Zack Taylor seemed to think the Red Sox star had but little to worry about.

"Ted's just a great ballplayer," Taylor said. "After he decided to play in today's game, he came out here to the park early for a private session of batting practice. He must have hit 20 balls out of the park. You can't be as good as he is without working at it."

Need More Fielders
A pressbox observer summed up the defenses against Williams' hitting in a few words. Watching the right field shift they use when he is at the plate, he snorted in derision.

"There's only one way to stop that guy," he said. "You gotta have four right fielders — and one of them has to be on the roof of the stands."

Jameson Scores Lone Tally In 3rd Quarter

A lightning-fast Fremont Ross team struck through the air and on the ground for 25 points in the first 11 minutes and went on to hand the Norwalk High Truckers a 51 to 7 lacing at Fremont last night.

Coach Grant Walls' boys tried hard throughout, but the smooth-functioning Ross High team had too many big guns on both offense and defense.

The locals turned in a creditable job after the first few minutes, but the game was already lost.

The Truckers' attack showed sparks of life in several spots, but no consistent attack was uncovered. The lone Norwalk scoring thrust came in the third quarter.

After Halfback Mike Sweet and Fullback Dick Thomas picked up yardage on two plays from midfield to the Fremont 24, Sophomore Halfback Kenny Jameson took a pitchout from Quarterback Jim Seitz and skirted right end into pay dirt.

A pass from Jameson to Seitz was good for the extra point after an attempted conversion by Jameson misfired.

Fremont Scores
Norwalk won the toss, and elected to receive at the outset, but on the first play after Jameson returned to the 24, Fremont recovered a fumble on the locals' 25. After Ross picked up a first down, the Truckers held for two plays inside the five, but a pass from Quarterback Martin Faver to End John Allen gave the hosts first blood.

The same combination clicked for the second score, again after recovering a fumble. They hiked the count to 19 to 0 two plays after they got the ball back after Norwalk was forced to kick, fleet Negro Halfback John Lewis skirting end into pay dirt from the eleven.

Norwalk was forced to kick again, and Fremont promptly moved to another score, Fullback Bob Markley bulging his way nine yards through the white-shirted defenders. Norwalk took the kick-off as the first quarter ended with Ross leading 25-0.

Kick Blocked
The locals picked up a first down, but were stalled again and with Seitz kicking on third down, his kick was blocked and the alert Fremonters recovered on the Norwalk 23. Halfback Charlie Glover carried over on the first play.

The going got tougher from then on, with Fremont unable to score again in the second quarter, only once in the third and twice in the final chapter with the out-manned Truckers bunched.

Fremont Coach Malcolm Mackey, calling every play from high in the press box atop the stands, kept his first string offensive and defensive units in practically the entire game.

Although suffering a decisive setback, Coach Grant Walls was generally pleased with the work of most of his boys, although eager to get back to the practice field on Monday and iron out many flaws.

No Pass Defense
Pass defense, especially in the first half, was very leaky. Offensive blocking was poor, although a halftime conference got things partly straightened out.

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Phillies Regarded As Home Free In Their League Race

NEW YORK — (AP) — The Philadelphia Phillies are regarded by baseball men today as home free in the National League pennant race but their World Series hopes are lightly regarded whether their ultimate rival in the classic is Detroit, Boston or New York.

Given the services of Curt Simmons, the scintillating southpaw called for military service, the Phils might have had a hurling edge in the classic to set up the ancient routine of National League pitching vs. American League power.

Without Simmons, the theory goes, the Phils will be short in both departments no matter which of the involved threesome wins the American League bunting. For whether it is the Tigers, the Red Sox or the Yankees, either will hold a preponderance of power and in all probability, a pitching edge.

Hand any of the three their edge in experience and the Phils will come out on the short end.

Boston, with one of the most murderous batting lineups in baseball history and a pitching staff which appears to have anything needed for the short, seven-game series, figures to be the toughest rival for the Phils.

The Red Sox have a team batting average of .307, against a .267 mark for the Phils. Seven of Boston's regulars are over the .300 mark, with batting leader Billy Goodman hitting .368; Don DiMaggio, .333; Al Zarilla, .332; Walt Dropo, .331; Birdie Tebbetts, .317; Johnny Pesky, .315; and Junior Stephens, .304. DiMaggio is fourth in the batting rolls, while Dropo and Stephens are second and third respectively in the home run race.

Against this array of power, only two of the Phils are hitting over .300, Richie Ashburn at .315 and Del Ennis at .302. The rest slide down rapidly to Mike Goliat's .228.

As for pitching, Mel Parnell, 16 and 8, and Ellis Kinder, 13 and 12, lead a serviceable series array which would include Chuck Stobbs, 10 and 6; Walt Masterson, 8 and 4; and Willard Nixon, 7 and 2. Against weak hitters, they figured to go well.

The loss of Simmons was a major blow to the Phils. They still have Robin Roberts, 19-6; Bubba Church, 8-4; Bob Miller, 11-4; Russ Meyer, 8 and 11; and reliefer Jim Konstanty, 14-5. But the big man is gone.

The Yankees and the Tigers wouldn't be any less of a problem for the Phils. The Yanks are a fire-tested gang with a .280 overall batting average and three .300 hitters in Hank Bauer, 334; Phil Rizzuto, 315; and Yogi Berra, 316 — not to mention a stretch roving gent named Joe DiMaggio.

In the pitching department, the Bronx Bombers have a full house in Ed Lopat, 17-6; Vic Raschi, 20-8; Whitey Ford, 6-0; Tom Byrne, 14-8; Allie Reynolds, 13-11; and Tom Ferrick, 8-6.

Detroit has plenty of power, too, with five over .300, including George Kell, .350; Hoot Evers, .332; Johnny Groth, .318; Johnny Ligon, .316; and Vic Wertz, .312. Kell and Evers are second and third respectively in the batting race.

The Tiger pitching staff would be tough to handle, listing Freddie Hutchinson, 16-9; Paul Trout, 13-4; Art Houtteman, 18-11; and Hal Newhouser, 14-10.

So, no matter who hits the American League jackpot, it looks rough for the Phils. But it's well to remember that not many folks expected them to win the pennant this season, either.
