

ST. PAUL FLYERS HAVE EASY TIME BLANKING PLYMOUTH, 26-0

Visitors No Match For Saints Who Indicate Potential Power

The St. Paul Flyers opened their 1951 grid season here Saturday night on Whitney Field by blanking Plymouth, 26 to 0, before a small crowd of approximately 300 spectators.

Despite a fracas marred by penalties, with the Flyers suffering four 15-yard street-fines, it was the local ball club's game throughout, both on the ground and in the air. Better than three-quarters of the play was in Plymouth territory, where the Flyers muffed several more chances to boost the count.

No Opposition
Plymouth had virtually no team coordination on either offense or defense, while the Flyers, with a stiff forward wall, unloosened an occasional brilliant, hard-running attack.

St. Paul set up its first touchdown near the end of the first quarter when a red-shirted player snagged a Plymouth pass on the 30 yard mark. Chuck Obermiller took it over from the two-yard line, with a pass from Dave Roth to Junior Nickoli for the extra point.

Although there was no scoring in the second frame, most of the play was in the visitors' end of the field where they made the best account of themselves in the game thus far.

Recover Fumble
A fumble by Plymouth set up the Flyers second TD when they recovered on Plymouth's 34 early in the third quarter. Nickoli on the next play sprinted to the 20, with Roth following up with a beautiful run through the entire Plymouth squad for the marker. A pass from Roth to Nickoli succeeded for the extra point.

Late in the third quarter, Plymouth offered its only threat of the evening when with the aid of two 15-yard penalties they worked the ball down to the Flyers' five-yard strike only to lose it on downs. The Flyers punted out of danger and four plays later were in possession of the ball on their own 29. On a pass from Roth to Obermiller, carried the ball to the visitors' 32. Nickoli carried it to the 15, and Obermiller again helped by sprinting to the 11, and Junior carried it over on the next play. A line buck for the extra point failed.

Snags Pass For TD
Play in the final stanza was fairly even with the Flyers holding the edge. Late in the period, however, substitute Hugh McAllister intercepted a Plymouth pass and raced 15 yards for the final score of the game. An attempted pass for the extra point failed.

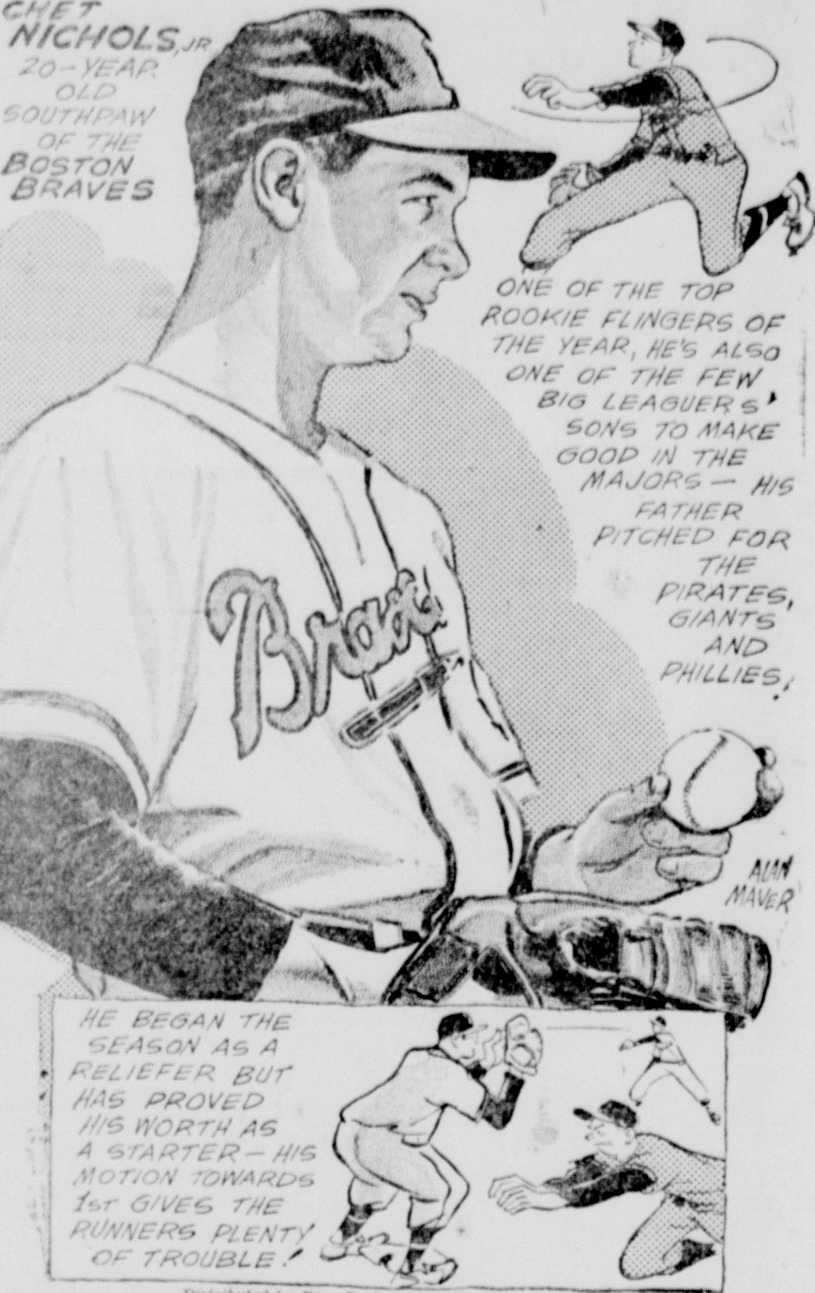

Giles Looms As New Big League Chief

CHICAGO—(INS)—The name of Warren Giles, president of the Cincinnati Reds, looms large in speculation Monday as the future commissioner of big league baseball.

Club owners of the 16 major leagues are meeting in Chicago next Thursday to appoint a successor to ousted A. B. (Happy) Chandler and the consensus indicates that they probably will pick their new czar from their own ranks.

P. K. Wrigley, owner of the Chicago Cubs and a power in his own right in the majors, announced flatly several weeks ago that he and other owners he did not identify would back only an experienced baseball man for the post.

"You wouldn't hire a carpenter to fix your car—you'd get an auto mechanic. Baseball is a highly technical game requiring special knowledge and a baseball background."

"That's why I'm in favor of picking a baseball man for commissioner."

In the months since last December when the baseball owners declined to back Chandler for continuation in his \$65,000-a-year post, many names have been mentioned as Happy's successor.

But the name of the silvery-haired Giles, who has 30 years experience as a club executive, keeps recurring.

Other names have faded out—notably the military men like Gen. Douglas MacArthur and Gen. Eisenhower.

In the troubled international situation, the generals have taken the stand that their country comes first in their service.

Gov. Frank J. Lausche of Ohio—who was understood to have plenty of backing as the leading non-baseball man outside the generally took himself out of the running during the weekend with a flat statement that he was not seeking the job.

By a process close to elimination that leaves the baseball men like Giles as front runners for attention, since 1936 and is universally liked and respected.

The new commissioner must receive at least a three quarters vote of the 16 major league owners.

Indians Have Vital Game Today As Yanks Move Ahead In Race

NEW YORK — (INS) — Those New York Yankees are suckers for a buck.

Put 'em in a money game that means do-or-die and you find out how their machine grinds out pennants with almost boring regularity.

This uncanny ability was demonstrated again Sunday when the Yankees upended the Cleveland Indians, 5 to 1, to move three percentage points ahead of the Tribe in the spine-tingling three-cornered American League chase. The Yankees now have a .624 percentage. Cleveland's is .621.

For the 70,000 fans in Yankee Stadium it was a question as to which team would bounce back in the first of the two game final series between the two prime pennant contenders.

The Yanks had blown four of their last five to the second division, the Indians three of their last five. The Yanks bounced first. Wahoo Allie Reynolds, who had beaten the Tribe four times previously, including a no-hitter, bested 22-game winner Bob Feller with a masterful five-hitter.

The Big Chief made it 15 wins for the season and further convinced the Indians that Yankee Stadium just ain't their territory. The Indians have dropped nine out of ten games in the Bronx ballyard this season.

Pride figured in the Yankee win, too. Casey Stengel shifted his lineup around and had Yogi Berra batting in Joe DiMaggio's customary cleanup spot. The Clipper was moved to fifth.

In the first inning Berra tripled in a run. But in the fifth inning Berra was passed intentionally by Feller to get at DiMag.

Joe smashed one to deep left center for a two-run, three-bagger that gave Reynolds a four-run bulge and just about finished Feller. Bob pitched to one more man, walked him, and was replaced by Lou Brissie, who finished up.

The Red Sox, who can decide the whole thing with their two remaining games with Cleveland and eight with the world champions, moved to within 2½ games of the top by beating the Chicago White Sox, 5 to 4.

Clyde Vollmer singled home the winning run in the eighth inning for lefty Leo Kieley. Buddy Rosar made three hits, including his first homer, to drive home three of Boston's runs.

Detroit topped Washington twice, 3 to 1 and 4 to 3, and the Athletics scored a double over the Browns, 7 to 1 and 7 to 5.

Brooklyn's Clem Labine is making a strong bid for a world series pitching assignment. The Dodger rookie right hander won his fourth straight complete game, 6 to 1, over the Chicago Cubs.

Labine, who has limited the opposition to a run a game, gave up six hits and was helped by Gil Hodges' 38th homer.

The New York Giants kept alive and cut the Dodgers lead to 4½ games with a 7-to-1 and 6-to-4 sweep of the Pittsburgh Pirates. But the Giants, who have nine games left, are seven games out in the "lost" column. Brooklyn has 14 games remaining.

Larry Jansen won his 19th game in the opener with a three-hitter, one Ralph Kiner's 40th homer of the season, which makes the Pirate slugger the only man in National League history to hit 40 or more homers in five straight seasons.

Sal Maglie, who blew a three-run lead in the eighth only to have his mates get him the two winning runs in the ninth, registered his 21st victory of the campaign.

Bobby Thomson homered in each game for the Durochermen.

The St. Louis Cardinals leaped the Philadelphia Phillies, 9 to 2, as Stan Musial led the way with a triple, double and single.

Boston and Cincinnati split. Warren Spahn won his 21st as the Braves took the opener, 6 to 5, and Ken Raffensberger blanked the Braves on five hits as the Reds won the second contest, 4 to 0.

Maxwell Carries A M Golf Title Back To Texas

BETHLEHEM, Pa. —(INS)— The National Amateur golf title was carried back to Texas Monday for the first time in the long history of the tournament.

Billy Maxwell, 22-year-old North Texas State college student who won the 1951 crown with a 4-and-3 victory over Joe Gagliardi of Mamaroneck, N.Y., also became the second youngest player to capture the championship. Only the great Bobby Jones was younger.

Gagliardi, a 39-year-old lawyer who doesn't get away from his desk often enough, had trouble with his teeth, his feet and his shots as he bowed in the 36-hole final Saturday at the Saucon Valley Country Club in Bethlehem.

The barrister and father of five children had come up against the long-driving Odessa, Tex., redhead with a giant killing record.

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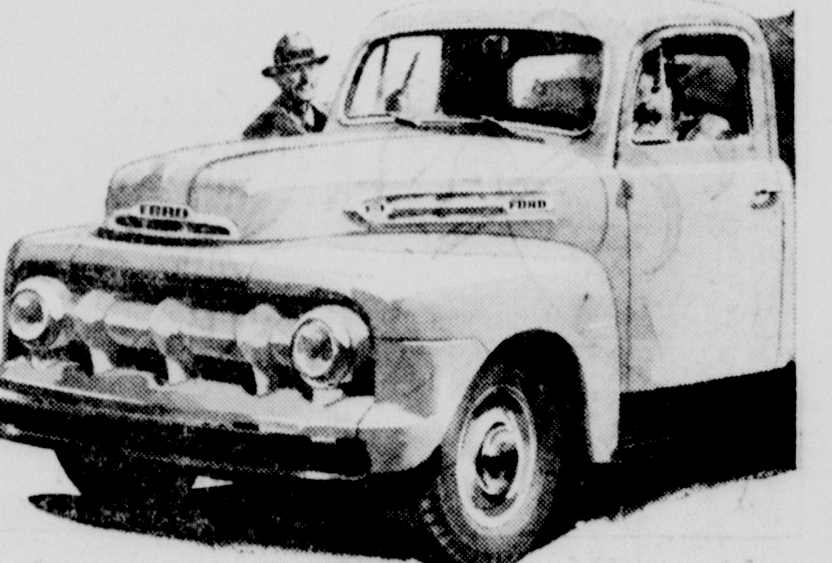
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
