

Sandusky Stuns Elyria 27-12; Saints Bow 18-6

Streaks In Brilliant Offensive Showing

A dazzling display of football finesse, under the direction of tailback Jude Theibert, gave Sandusky High's Blue Streaks an impressive 27-12 victory over highly vaunted Elyria before 6,000 amazed fans in the Pioneer's stadium Friday night.

With crackling blocking and heads-up running, Sandusky took a 7-0 lead early in the second quarter and led the rest of the way.

That initial touchdown came at 10:45 of period two on Theibert's four yard jaunt after Sandusky had blocked a punt and taken over on Elyria's 47.

The second arrived at 5:05 as Bill Harple sneaked a yard after the Streaks had driven from their own 20; the third came at 1:25 of the third after Theibert's pass to Alphonse White for what looked like a TD, resulting in costing 15 yards for having an illegal receiver downfield. On the next play, Theibert, on his 18, faded far to his right and hit White who caught the ball, falling backward into the end zone.

But it was the fourth Streak scoring play which brought both Sandusky and Elyria fans to their feet. The Streaks, late in the game, made a first down on Elyria's 43. Then the hip play with Dessalane DeVese taking the ball from Theibert worked for four yards. Another play gained one, and Theibert again called the hip play.

Theibert Keeps—TD
This time he kept the ball, and with DeVese's beautiful fake and Bill Harple's key block on the end, Jude raced 38 yards for the final score with only 1:20 remaining.

In comparison with their performance of a week ago, the Streaks were a veteran outfit. They blocked, ran and tackled well and the only defect which matched last week's was in pass defense.

Observers figured they couldn't contain the fast Jones twins on the outside, and fullback Don Hopkins on the inside. But hard line charging in the second half eliminated the Pioneer backfield threats.

Neither side could do much as Elyria got the ball on its own 20 when Acierio's kickoff rocketed into the end zone.

On the next play the feared running of Elyria's backfield became a reality when Doug Jones hit straight off right tackle on a quick opener and outplayed the Sandusky secondary for 80 yards and a touchdown. Shaffer's try for the point was wide and Sandusky led 7-6.

Acierio Takes Screen Pass
Sandusky lost a 17 yard pass gain on an offside penalty. But Theibert hit Acierio on a screen pass for 13 yards on the following play to start the next scoring drive.

Acierio and Theibert picked up a first down with five yards apiece and then De Vese got seven on a reverse after Acierio had picked up another five to the Elyria 44. That set it up for Theibert who sliced right end and cut beautifully all the way to the 10. Acierio gained five, Theibert, four and Harple punched over on the sneak. Acierio's bot made it 14-6.

Mallory Recovers Fumble
Bill Mallory recovered Ely's fumble on the first play after the kickoff, but after two Streak running plays, the Pioneer's Dick Perkins speared Theibert's pass and returned to Sandusky's 41.

With Shaffer taking to the air, Elyria gained seven, then the Jones' made two first downs with some brilliant running to the Sandusky 18.

On the first play Shaffer hit Doug Jones down the right side for the TD at 1:05. The Pioneer's point try failed again as Don Jones was stopped trying to run right tackle. The second half opened with Theibert carrying on seven of nine plays to Elyria's 10 after McMan had punted out of bounds on the Streaks' 18. But the Pioneer stiffened and took over. A Shaffer to Hopkins pithout moved the ball out six yards, but Don Jones fumbled on the ensuing play and Sandusky recovered on the 22.

Screen Pass Again
Another screen pass from Theibert to Acierio picked up a first down to the 8. Theibert made it to the five, then needing a yard on fourth down, Acierio lateraled to the left to Theibert who was trapped behind the line. With three tacklers on him, Theibert found White alone in the end zone for what officials at first called a TD then changed to a 15 yard penalty for having an illegal receiver downfield.

Lorain Clips Ross' 15 Game Skein, 21-13

FREMONT, Sept. 20 — Ross came to an end here tonight as the Lorain team took a 21-13 victory. Thanks mainly to a long pass from quarterback Dan Jones to end Jim Dick in the fourth quarter.

With Ross leading 13-7 in the fourth quarter, Jones uncorked a 41-yard pass to Dick, who was hauled to earth on the Ross 13. On fourth down, John Karason took a pitchout and skirted left end for a touchdown and Gary Krause booted his second of three extra points for a 14-13 lead.

Lorain moved 58-yards for its final score, Jesse Garcia dashing over from 10 yards out.

Lorain, which blocked four kicks, two by Bill Van Buren, threatened all during the first half and finally scored with 3:10 remaining when Jones passed to Karason for four yards. However, Charley Black, junior halfback, ran Krause's kickoff back 90 yards and Ron Whitcomb's kick tied it 21-21.

Sophomore Ward Sewell scampered 55 yards in the middle of the third quarter to put Fremont on top, 13-7. Then the Steelers took to the air and snatched the first.

On the next play Theibert broke left with DeVese trailing him for the hand-back play. At the line, DeVese faked expertly at grabbing the ball, shooting to the left side-line. With a corking block by Harple which knocked the end outward, Theibert sped 38 yards down the left side in a tremendous running stint for the touchdown at 1:20.

Panthers' First SBC Title Defense Fails

St. Mary's Panthers virtually eliminated themselves from Sandusky Bay Conference contention as they fell victim to a football malady known as "fumbleitis" in dropping an 18-6 contest to a surprisingly strong Oak Harbor eleven, Friday night.

The Saints played almost the entire game with their back to the wall as the backfield fumbled five times, losing the ball on four occasions. Two of the fumbles set up Oakie scores while the third was set up by an intercepted pass.

The Rockets kept St. Mary's bottled up in their own territory as the Oakie line consistently out-charged the Panther defense and moved the ball to the Saint's 10 yard line early in the second stanza. The series of plays leading to the first Rocket score started on the St. Mary 40 yard line when back Don Cass took a hand-off from quarterback Bill Williams to the 30 for a first down. With third down and nine to go Ken Apling took over the quarterback spot and passed to left wing Dave Mylander who fumbled deep in Panther territory Jesse Burdine, 185 pound end recovered for the Oakies, however, and back Ronnie Depner swung around right end for the remaining distance and the first score.

Blackwood Punts 65 Yards
The Rockets try for the extra point failed and center Don Couture kicked to the St. Mary 10. Sam Blackwood returned the kick to the Panther 35 yard line, but the Saints were unable to move the ball and Blackwood was forced to punt. Blackwood booted a fine 65 yarder to the Oakie 10 yard-line and the Panther's first real scoring opportunity came when Oak Harbor fumbled on the first play from the line of scrimmage and the ball was recovered by tackle Jim Hurst for the Saints. Jack Leibacher, Chuck Lococo and Blackwood carried for the Saints, but fell one-half yard short of pay dirt and the Rockets took over on their one-half yard line.

Depner, Jim Madison and Vender took the ball to the Oakie five, but a holding penalty moved the ball back to the two and one-half yard line. Mylander then punted the ball to his own 43 and the Rockets were out of danger. The half ended with the Saints stalled in their own territory, as Butch Wagner attempted to pass, his team back into the ball game.

The Oak Harbor squad came out strong in the second half, scoring after four minutes of play as the Rockets marched on a 65 yard sustained drive, with Depner again providing the scoring punch with a 15 yard plunge off left tackle. The extra point try again failed and the Rockets led 12-0. Oakie tackle Allen Genzman intercepted a Wagner pass on the Saint's 35 and Oak Harbor marched to the 10, but the Panther line stiffened to repulse the threat.

Apling Intercepts Pass
The Saints held for the remainder of the third quarter, but a Wagner pass intercepted by Apling led to the final Oakie score as Apling passed to Mylander for the touchdown with 4:33 remaining in the game.

The Panthers suddenly came to life as Wagner began to hit his targets and the Saints started an eighty yard march to their only score. Twice during the touchdown drive Wagner hit his man on a fourth down pass to Everett on a 17 yard play and to Blackwood for six yards.

With 20 seconds remaining Blackwood took a handoff from Wagner and went over guard for the score. Joe Lang's try for the extra point was blocked and the score stood 18-6, Oak Harbor. The final play of the game saw Oak Harbor's Tom Kreiger break into the open with but Buddy Everett between him and a touchdown. Everett caught him at midfield as the gun sounded.

Linebacker Needed
Although St. Mary's pass defense was adequate (the Oakies completed but five of 22 pass attempts) the secondary play was very disappointing to Coach Lee Zierolf and Assistant Coach John Feicht.

Zierolf especially expressed a desire for a linebacker and a man who can carry the ball.

The Saints have two weeks to prepare for their next conference game when Fremont St. Joseph will invade on Oct. 5, and the Panthers are in for some heavy drilling to face the team which must now be considered the favorite to cop the SBC crown.
