

SANDUSKY SNAPS LORAIN WIN STREAK

Panthers Overpower Elmore With Ground Force For 32-12 Win Friday Night

Powerhouse Wall, Supremacy In Air Keeps SHS Unbeaten

SANDUSKY 30, LORAIN 13

Jeff DeHaven's "aerial circus," featuring an array of scintillating stars with a powerful line and a combination of spiral tossers and expert receivers—plus a kicker with the style of a college grinner—today was claiming state-wide recognition.

Some 6,000 spectators jammed the Strobel Field stadium Friday night to watch the Sandusky High team extend its streak to six games without defeat by routing a Lorain Steelers' club, 30 to 13. The setback was the first for the invaders after a brilliant record to date of five straight victories over the Ashland College Reserves, Fremont Ross, Shaker Heights, Lakewood and Cleveland Heights.

To single out any one player or combination would be unfair, since the Streaks performed as a "team" and one which functioned with precision when the dazzling aerials began to pepper the Steelers' secondary—especially in the fourth quarter when 13 points were chalked up to dismiss any doubts of a Blue Streak win.

Acierio Boots Field Goal
However, Chuck Acierio, 17-year-old 170-pound fullback, is destined to find a place on a college team of his choice with his kicking. His exhibition last night, with or against the winds of the northeast, warmed the hearts of Sandusky rooters—especially in the second quarter when he dropped back to calmly boot a 22-yard field goal to send his team ahead at the half, 17-0.

The Streaks' line was solid during the first half, giving off with bone-jolting tackles that held the Lorainites to 32 yards via rushing. Neither team, however, gave out with a successful ground gaining performance before the intermission, the Blue also being limited to 35 yards via rushing.

Already in the first half the Streaks began to click through the air, with Acierio in the driver's seat. All told, Sandusky picked up 79 yards by completing six of 12 passes.

174 Yards Via Air
For the entire game the Streaks whipped 28 forwards, completed 12 and garnered a grand total of 174 yards through the air. Lorain shot 20 spirals, completing 11 for 119 yards gained.

It was the 17th win for Sandusky in the series with Lorain, the latter still holding the edge with 24 victories. Two ties were waged.

Jude Theibert, injured Streak back, watched the game from the sidelines but was not in uniform for the second straight week.

Sandusky scored in the first quarter when John Manuel went off his left end for five yards and a touchdown to climax a march from the Lorain 47. Acierio kicked the point.

Ten points sewed up the contest in the second quarter. Acierio whipped a pass over the goal to End Bill Mallory with the ball on the Steelers' 4 1/2 yard mark. Acierio booted the point on second try after a penalty.

Before the half ended, Acierio

booted a field goal with Tom Murray holding the ball on the 22. Sandusky at the time had marched to the Lorain 12 1/2-yard mark. This youngster Murray turned in a fine performance last night, his second game of major play after undergoing baptism of fire last week in place of the injured Theibert.

Lorain Rallies In Third
Lorain swept the Streaks off their feet for a short period in the third quarter, registering two touchdowns and giving the visiting rooters short lived hopes that the Steelers may have hit their stride. Dan Jones heaved a pass to End Jim Dick to complete a 51-yard play, the latter racing approximately 30 yards to cross the goal. Earl Price kicked the point.

Lorain again came back to march 46 yards for its next touchdown.

Jerry Taleitnik going over from the two-yard mark. Price's kick was wide to the right of the uprights.

With the score favoring Sandusky, 17-13, going into the final stanza, the Blue Streaks lost little time in bringing joy to their followers. With the ball in the Blue's possession on the Lorain 35, Acierio tossed an aerial to End Alphonse White over the goal. Acierio again kicked the point.

Another Spiral Pays Off
Shortly afterwards Acierio flipped another spiral, the ball again floating lazily into the hands of White—good for 24 yards and a touchdown. The oval hit the goal post on Acierio's point attempt.

Streak rooters were doffing their hats to the forward wall of White, Mallory, Roll, Taylor, Kelley, Lewis, Whinnery and Rehlfuss. The backfield combine included Thompson, Murray, DeVese, Acierio, Manuel and Harple.

Rehlfuss Snags Two Passes
Glen Rehlfuss, senior, 17-year-old 175-pound center, gave a sparkling performance. In the third period, just before the period ended, he intercepted a Jones' pass and returned a few yards to the Lorain 32 1/2-yard mark. Late in the fourth quarter, Rehlfuss intercepting a second Steelers' spiral this time on the Sandusky 35. He was not pulled down until reaching the Lorain 36. Lorain eventually gained possession on downs on its own 40, and the game ended with Acierio intercepting a Steelers' pass on the Sandusky 42 at the gun.

Sandusky was the only team on the Steelers' schedule to date that used the single wing, a power offense that specializes in getting a horde of blockers in front of ball carriers on end sweeps, in preference to the T-formation.

But the Streaks took to the air in flawless precision, and the Steelers never had a chance.

Top Candidates For State Title Win Friday Tilts

The two top candidates for the Ohio High school football crown—Massillon and Springfield—continued their winning ways Friday night but a dark horse—East Liverpool's Potters—moved another step toward the top with a crushing victory over Alliance.

Several upsets were recorded in Friday night's play as the school boys' eleven played their sixth game of the campaign and reached the two-thirds point in the season.

Only stunning upset of the evening found the underdog Canton Timken Trojans shattering Canton Lehman's four-game winning streak with a 32-7 decision.

The top scholastic contests were played in four cities—Mansfield, East Liverpool, Hamilton and Sandusky and in half of the cases the home teams wound up on the long end of the score.

Massillon's Tigers made themselves right at home on the Mansfield gridiron and proceeded to swamp the Tigers, 40-0, for their sixth straight victory of the season and third in a row over the Mansfield eleven.

Clair Williams was the big gun for the Potters as East Liverpool swamped Alliance, 34-14, before 8,000 spectators in the Ohio River city. Williams scored two touchdowns and passed for another as the Potters remained unbeaten in six games. They have five wins and a tie with Sandusky.

The convincing triumph boosted the Potters' title stock.

In other games Columbus East defeated Lima South, 13-6. Cambridge's team which ended Zanesville's 29-game unbeaten streak, swamped Lancaster, 33-13. Lakewood edged Elyria, 26-20, and Fremont Ross toyed with Tiffin Columbian, 33-6.

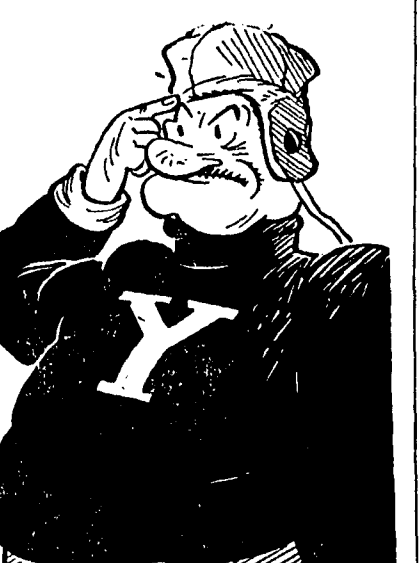
By virtue of their triumph, the local gridgers have remained undefeated since the last game of 1950. Four ties were played during that period.

"I hate everything about them, and I want my players to hate them, too," the Cleveland Indians general manager Hank Greenberg told a reporter today.

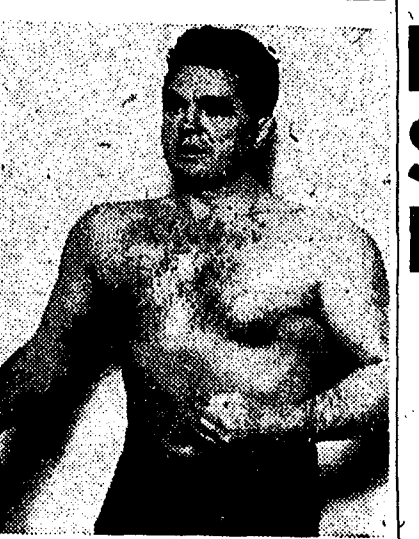
Hank, far from letting bygones be bygones now that the Yanks are champions again, snorted: "It's psychological. The psychology of superiority—that's what they beat you with."
