

80,000 Expected To Watch Notre Dame Battle Navy

Game At Cleveland Stadium Saturday

CLEVELAND, Oct. 31.—A full house of 80,000 is expected at Municipal Stadium Saturday for favored Notre Dame's joust with Navy, the first major college game here in two years.

Notre Dame — building towards the day when the Irish again will be a gridiron terror — brings in a young club sparked by two standout backs, quarterback Ralph Guglielmi of Columbus, O., and halfback John Lattner, from Pennsylvania.

Guglielmi is the sophomore who pitched strikes for all three touchdowns last season as Notre Dame trimmed Southern California, 19-12.

Lattner, a junior who works both on offense and defense, tops the Irish runners with a 4.9-yard average, punts at a 35.7-yard average and has caught 13 passes for 168 yards and one touchdown.

Shaky Pass Defense
Navy comes in for the 26th meeting between the clubs with one of the best defensive lines in the East, but with a shaky pass defense.

Each team has tied Penn. by the same scores, 7-7. Each has lost one of its four other games — Notre Dame to Pitt, 22-19, and Navy to the rugged Maryland Terrapins, 38-7.

Navy's wins were over Yale, 31-0; Cornell, 31-7; and William and Mary, 14-0.

Notre Dame's triumphs were over Texas, 14-3; Purdue, 26-14; and North Carolina, 34-14.

The Irish-ranked 13th in the weekly Associated Press poll will be favored by six or seven points over the unranked Midshipmen.

Ohioans On Teams

Ohioans playing for Navy are John Raster of Toledo, a sophomore half back; Frank Adorey, a senior right half from Cleveland; Dick Olson, a center from Lorain; and Dick Dutnell, a center from Lakewood.

Besides Guglielmi, Notre Dame has these Buckeyes — Tom Seaman, Canton senior linebacker; Hart Hunter, Akron junior end; Sam Palumbo, Cleveland sophomore linebacker; Dick Cymanski, Toledo sophomore linebacker; Tom McHugh, Toledo fullback; Bob Joseph, a halfback from Martins Ferry; and Jim Weithman, an end from Bucyrus.

Gene Bearden Is Top Hitter Among Major Moundsmen

NEW YORK, Oct. 31 (AP)—Gene Bearden of the St. Louis Browns, who had a mediocre 7-8 record on the mound, distinguished himself as the leading hitter among major league pitchers during the 1952 season.

Final Associated Press statistics disclosed the 31-year-old southpaw moundman, who also bats from the left side, cracked out 23 hits in 64 times at bat for a healthy .359 average. Gene was the only regular pitcher to hit within the charmed .300 circle in '52.

In the National League, Chicago's Bob Rush compiled the highest mark, .292. The tall Cub righthander had 28 base hits in 96 tries, including five doubles and one triple. Bob's record also shows 15 runs batted in and five runs scored.

SMH, Fliers To Meet Tonight For 3rd In SBC

St. Mary's Panthers remain in top physical condition for tonight's game with Clyde's Fliers at Strohman Field—a game that will elevate the winner to sole possession of third place in the Sandusky Bay Conference.

Both teams are currently tied with Gibsonburg for the third place spot, each having a 3-2 conference showing. The winner of tonight's game will take at least a temporary ownership of third place, pending the outcome of Saturday night's Gibsonburg-St. Joe game.

The Panthers hold wins over Lakeside, Elmore and Genoa in their last three outings and will be in search of their fourth straight conquest. Clyde holds wins over Genoa, Lakeside and Gibsonburg in loop play, and victories over Toledo McComb and North Baltimore in independent contests.

The two teams are almost evenly matched in scoring potential and should provide a close, hard fought game. Clyde will attempt to avenge a 47-14 defeat at the hands of the 1951 Panthers, who captured the SBC championship.

A large partisan following is expected to make the trip from Clyde for the 8 p. m. air light game, and the Clyde High school band will be on hand to provide halftime entertainment.

OSU-Wildcats Big Ten Game On Television

EVANSTON, Ill., Oct. 31 (AP)—For the second straight Saturday, TV football fans across the country will see two Big Ten aerial specialists in action as Ohio State's red-faced Buckeyes meet improving Northwestern Saturday.

The nationally televised contest starts at 2:30 p. m. (est). Ohio State, considerably embarrassed by last Saturday's 8-0 upset by Iowa, sends Johnny Borton against Northwestern's Dick Thomas in what should be a skilled sharp-shooting duel.

Last Saturday at Champaign, Ill., the TV game of the week produced a 40-12 Purdue victory over Illinois in which Purdue's Dale Samuels and Illinois' Tommy O'Connell between them completed 30 of 38 passes, five for touchdowns.

Borton, in Ohio's conquests of Indiana, Wisconsin and Washington State and losses to Purdue and Iowa, has connected 57 times in 94 passes for 831 yards, seven touchdowns and a fine 60.5 percentage.

Although Northwestern only last Saturday scored its first triumph in five starts beating Indiana 23-13, Thomas has clicked on 45 of 84 tosses for 732 yards, five touchdowns and a mark of nearly 54 percent. In Big Ten play, Thomas ranks second behind Purdue's Samuels with 33 completions in 61 tries for 568 yards and four TD's.

After flipping five touchdowns passes against Washington State, Borton was handcuffed by Iowa and dropped from first to fourth among the conference passers.

Tech, Duke Collide In No. 1 Game

NEW YORK, Oct. 31 (AP)—Georgia Tech and Duke, two of the killers of the Southland, meet in the No. 1 college football game of the day tomorrow as the season swings into the home stretch.

Most of the teams that were expected to set their opponents back before the campaign started have been living up to expectations with an occasional upset here and there. Unless the Engineer-Blue Devil contest ends in a tie, there will be one less undefeated, untied team among the major outposts when the results are in Saturday night. Both teams have identical 6-0 records and are rainin' to go. They've been pointing for this one all season.

The contest is rated pretty much of a tossup, but when the two take the field in Durham, Tech probably will rate a slight favorite. Tech is No. 4 in The Associated Press poll, Duke No. 6.

Important games are sprinkled over the rest of the nation with the California-UCLA contest probably the best from a competitive standpoint.

This is another one that will have an important bearing on a championship—the Pacific Coast Conference and the Rose Bowl bid that goes along with it. The UCLANS are undefeated with a 6-0 mark while Pappy Waldorf's Golden Bears sport a 5-1 record.

Yankees-Indian Feud Flares Up In Waiver Rule Proposal

NEW YORK, Oct. 31 (INS)—It was Hank (I-hate-the-Yankees) Greenberg's turn to sizzle today in the latest chapter of the running front office feud between his Cleveland Indians and the world champion Yankees.

Greenberg stands accused of leading the lobbying for the latest legislative attempt to break up the Yankee pennant dynasty. General Manager George Weiss, the Yankee dollar man, dumped some time-

ber into the annual hot stove donnybrook Thursday when he bitterly attacked plans to amend the existing waiver rule.

And Weiss indicated he will lead a fight against the proposal of baseball's Major-Minor Executive Council to curtail mid-summer inter-league "pennant deals." Commissioner Ford Frick announced Wednesday the council will suggest to the winter meetings at Phoenix, Ariz., that after July 31, waivers be obtained from all clubs in both leagues before a player can go from one league to another.

Issues Statement

Weiss contended the Yankees "never have obtained a ball player by going behind or beyond the rules of baseball."

Under the present rule, if all clubs in one league turn down a player at the \$10,000 waiver price he can be sold to anyone in the other league at any price.

In this manner the champs have acquired Johnny Mize, Johnny Hopp, Johnny Sain and Ewell Blackwell as pennant insurance during the past four seasons.

Weiss said the only difference between the Yankees' practice of National League "farming" and that of the Indians is that the Bombers have been more intelligent in their selection of players.

Weiss pointed to Cleveland's purchase of George Strickland and Ted Wilks of the Pirates and Wally Westlake of the Reds for last season's stretch drive and said: "Just how far back of the Yankees the Cleveland club would have been without these players is problematical."

Outbid Several Clubs

He also said the Yankees outbid several clubs, including the Indians, for Blackwell. The "Whip" appeared in five games, pitched 16 innings and won one game.

In the "intelligence" dig at the Indians, Weiss listed the Yankee acquisition of Ray Scarborough from Boston.

He said: "Scarborough came to the Yankees after every other club in the league waived on him."

"He won five games for the Yankees. Were these five transferred to the Indians, they might have been champions. Yet we hear nothing about changing the league rule. In fact we hear very little about the Scarborough deal—not from Cleveland in any event!"

Good Time Quits Harness Racing By Shattering Mile Record At Yonkers

YONKERS, N. Y., Oct. 31 (AP)—Good Time, a spunky little four-legged dynamo with a heart as big as a bucket of oats, retired from the harness racing scene today after shattering the Yonkers Raceway track record for a mile.

Going against the clock he was caught in 2:00 4-5 on the half mile oval.

The world record for a mile for pacers against the clock on a half mile track is 1:59 3-4, set by the great Billy Direct at Allamont, N. Y., in 1939. The record for a race of 1:59 3-4 was made by Sampson Hanover last year at Delaware, O. Ervin drove Sampson Hanover last year at Delaware.

Good Time, a son of Hal Dale—On Time by Volomite, hangs up his horseshoes with a total of \$318,792.56 in the bank.
