

Blue Streaks Grab Buckeye Loop Win At Findlay, 33-7

Long Runs Help Hike Win Total

SHS Turns From Power To Speed

NEATLY effecting a forced change-over in their offensive script, Sandusky High's Blue Streaks swept to victory No. 6 of the campaign against two losses at Findlay night, 33-7.

Without the powerhouse backfield twosome of 210-pound fullback Jim Schwanger and 219-pound wingback Larry Corso most of the way, the locals came up with a sparkling exhibition of speed and finesse that ran the outgunned Trojans right into the ground.

With the injured Corso making only a limping, token appearance and Schwanger banished from action in the first period by the officials, the Streaks still had the goods elsewhere to ring up their highest point total of the season.

Top previous effort was against Toledo Scott in the opener, 28-13.

FREMONT ROSS locked the Streaks out of a chance for co-championship honors when they wrapped up the second-year Buckeye Conference crown with a 30-12 conquest at Marion Harding last night.

Harding is Sandusky's foe here next Friday night in the closest game of the 1955 campaign, with the Streaks (3-1) needing a victory for assured sole occupancy of second place since Elyria (2-2) might topple Lorain in their wind-up match.

Still, a championship and a second place finish isn't a bad two-year record and the way SHS's football program is developing the end isn't in sight just yet.

TAILBACK Dick DeHaven scored two touchdowns and averaged 8.3 yards per try as he had his best night of the season in racking up 157 yards in 19 carries.

Bill Wisner scored once himself and connected with end Harold Burger for another with Latham Stowers scoring for the fifth score.

Mel White converted three extra point tries into the scoring column to round it out.

BOTH SIDES exchanged fumbles and damaging 15-yard penalties in a scoreless first period of

HERE'S HOW the play went. Wiseman, on a direct snap-back, drove into the line, handed off to Wisner who moved out and pitched to DeHaven around the right side, who in turn handed off to Stowers on a naked reverse from his wingback post and went streaking 47 yards into the end zone.

Sound complicated? It was—and Findlay couldn't figure it a second time.

Next one was a little different. The idea was the same starting out, but this time DeHaven kept the leather instead of giving off to Stowers and went 64 yards to pay dirt untouched through a befuddled Findlay secondary.

THE FINAL TD came on the final play from scrimmage when the Findlay 12, climaxing a 53-yard bid, Wisner uncorking a well-aimed pitch to Burger who made a diving catch in the corner of the end zone as the ball arched over his shoulder.

White's kick was good, but a 15-yard penalty nullified it and his try from the 17 was far short.

CLEAT MARKS—Neil Schmidt, who took over the reigns of Findlay's grid fortunes after two years at Bellfontaine, is a well-remembered athlete at Purdue and probably at Notre Dame as well. For it was the same Schmidt who several years back raced the opening kickoff back for a touchdown to provide the Boilermarkers

play, with Sandusky's infraction costing them a score as they were detected holding when Schwanger crashed over from the one after Lloyd Robbins recovered a bobble on the Findlay 32 on the second play of the game.

The Streaks marched 57 yards to score the first time after forcing Findlay to punt early in the second quarter. After short yardage hauls by Schwanger, Wisner and DeHaven, Stowers clipped off a 17-yard jaunt for a first down on the eight and DeHaven went the distance on the next play, cutting over his left side and going in free.

THE STREAKS had to go across the final stripe again two times before they were allowed another six-pointer. Starting after a fumble recovery on the Findlay eight, DeHaven went over two plays later from the six but a roughing penalty rubbed it out.

Wisner squeezed the final yard on the drive for a 13-0 lead at the half, with his pass to end Jim Wild ruled good on the 1-yard stripe when the Trojans were called for pass interference in the end zone on the play before.

SANDUSKY'S three second half scores were still only worth the usual amount, but they sure were sensational.

The first two were neatly executed plays off the buck-lateral series.

Starting to move very well on the ground in the third period after an exchange of punts, DeHaven moved for gains of eight and 16 yards and sophomore Dick Wiseman—subbing at full for the retired Schwanger—belted up the middle for 11 before the first "bolter" was executed.

LED AGAIN by Chuck Brady, who passed for three touchdowns, scored one and set up the other, the Panthers knocked Clyde out of contention midway in the second quarter. Playing without the services of three reg-

ulars Blaine Powell, Charles Friesch and Jerry Dankelson—the Panthers completely dominated throughout.

Defense played a big role for the Panthers—the longest run Clyde could muster was a 15-yard jaunt in the first quarter.

ST. MARY'S received the kickoff and marched 39 yards to the Clyde 24 where John

Bolinger intercepted Brady's pass on the 20 to stop the threat. But not for long.

An offside penalty gave the Fliers first down and five, but they couldn't make it and punted, Jim Green returning the kick to the Clyde 48. Four plays later, Green swept around right end for the touchdown with 5:18 left in the first quarter. Brady ran the bootleg for 26 to the six

to set up the score. Paul Christiansen's point try was true and the Panthers led 7-0.

JOE WOTT later recovered Brady's fumble on the Clyde 40. The Fliers drove to the St. Mary 19 as the quarter ended, and on the third play on the second quarter Tom Lynch threw a perfect strike to Jerry Ashton for the touchdown. Frank Hum-

berger's conversion was good to make it 7-7.

Following the kickoff, St. Mary's was forced to punt and Brady proceeded to punt out of bounds on the Clyde 2, three plays later with Clyde still on the two. Burt Benefiel went back to punt, it was blocked by four members of the hard charging Panther line and St. Mary's had first down and goal on the two. Brady sneaked over and Christiansen again converted to make the scoreboard read 14-7.

THE Fliers were held for downs again and St. Mary's took over on the Clyde 49. Brady faded back and passed to Mike DeCaro who took the ball on the 40 and danced down the sidelines to the Clyde 23.

Green drove 8 and 13 yards in two plays for a first down on the two. On fourth down, Brady passed to end Tom Kaman for the Panther's third score and the clock had run out for the half. Christiansen's conversion was wide.

LATE IN the third quarter St. Mary's took over on their own 48 and marched 52 yards in 10 plays, with Brady passing to Harry Cross for the touchdown with 2:37 left. Christiansen converted to make it 27-7.

Clyde took possession and marched 74 yards in 18 plays for their record touchdown, Jerry Ashton went off tackle for the final four yards, and Humberger again converted. Key play was a fourth down pass from punt formation, Jerry Gray to Ted Gray good for 19-yards and a first down.

THE PANTHER'S final score came soon after as Clyde's try for an outside kick failed and St. Mary's took over on the 42 yard line. Seven plays later, Brady threw a 25 yard strike to Monte Keech in the end zone, to end the scoring for the night. Christiansen's conversion attempt was blocked.

Outstanding on defense for the Panthers were Popek, Dan Hemker, Bob McLaughlin and Keech. All the Panther's played good football, and Coach Ed Susterle let the reserves get some experience in the final quarter. The Panthers close out at Gibsonburg next weekend.
