

SHS, Waite Deadlock 14-14

Corso Knots Count

With the 1956 football season well underway, it's alarmingly apparent — and certainly to the opposition — that Sandusky High's football team has little in the way of a passing attack.

Its absence will never be more accentuated than in was in Friday's 14-14 deadlock with Toledo Waite in a bruising battle before over 5,000 fans at Strobel Field.

Although the injury-hampered Blue Streaks played their hearts out, their effort wasn't quite good enough for victory.

But then, from the other side of the fence, Waite's wasn't either.

WAITE HAD its large and mobile defense geared almost solely to halt Sandusky's ground game, and it paid dividends as the locals were limited to 153 net yards rushing.

The Indians used what amounted to a nine-man line, four up front with five linebackers tight plus two close-in safetymen.

Jeff DeHaven's club can move the ball on the ground—they have the boys and they have the plays—but there were two very necessary ingredients lacking last night that minimized its effectiveness: the scarcity of healthy running talent due to injuries and the aforementioned passing, or rather, lack of it.

LARRY CORSO ground out 117 of the yards in 19 carries to be the workhorse of the attack, but was a "marked man" after Carl Augustus was finally hit too hard to continue and it became evident that a limping Dave Jones was no threat when pressed into service.

Sandusky's two scores came with dramatic suddenness in the first half, Harold Burger nailing a Waite fumble in the end zone for the first one and Corso bagging the second on a lightning-like 59-yard scamper.

All the scoring was confined to the first half, with the Indians matching the SHS scores in each of the first two quarters.

WHILE THE cold, hard facts of the final score tell nothing but the tie, the Streaks missed another touchdown by about an inch.

In fact, when the game movies are studied, they may show full-back Roland Unckrich was in the end zone far enough to count on the final play of the first half.

One official was nodding his head vigorously that Unckrich had scored and was about halfway up with his hands to signify the score, but his good intentions were sidetracked by one of his stripe-shirted cohorts and that was that.

Calling for a time out probably would have provided time for another play.

THE GAME was only 22 seconds old when SHS chalked up its first score.

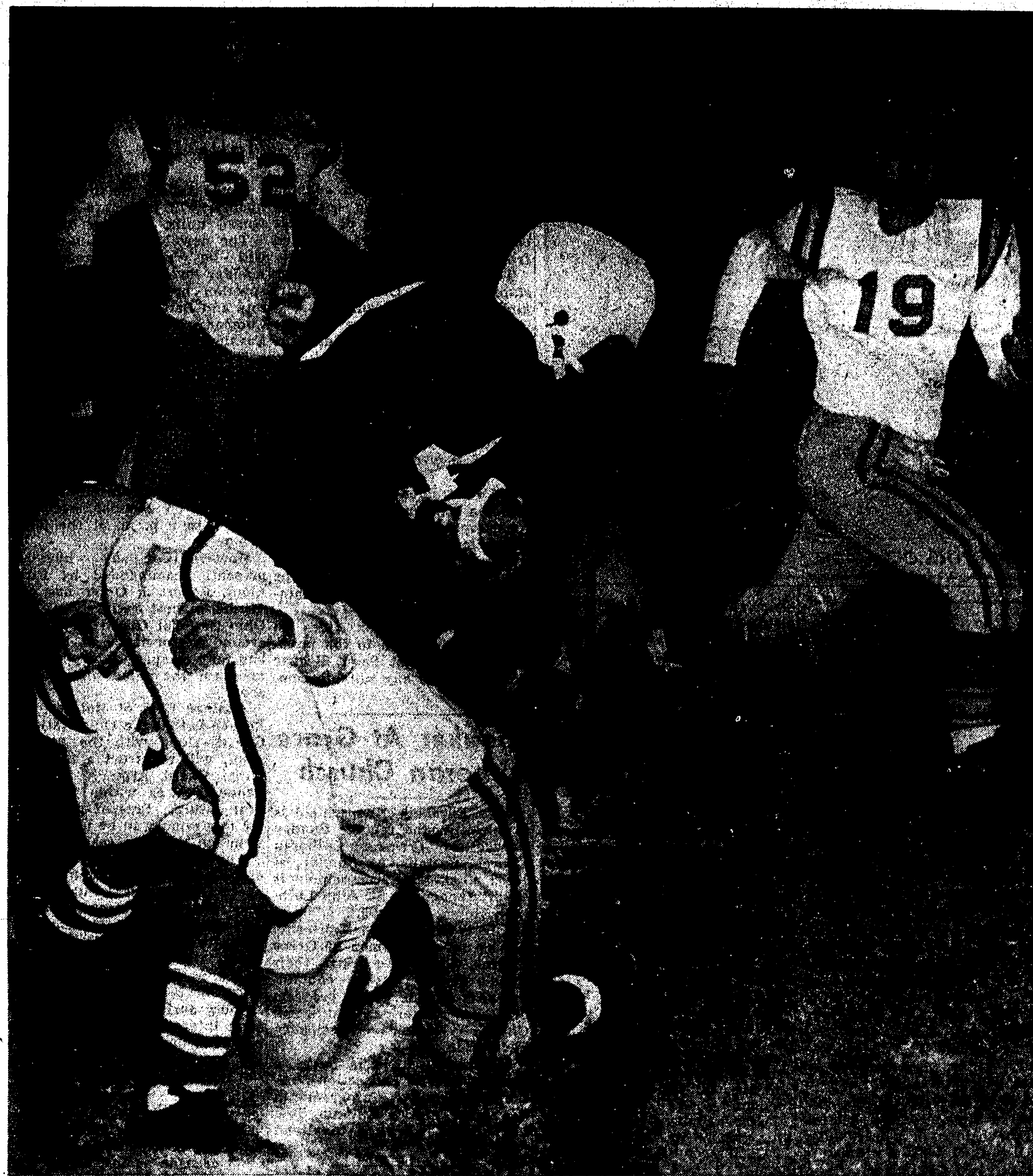
A clipping penalty on the opening kickoff put Waite back on its one-yard line, and they were detected off side on the first play from scrimmage to put the ball a scant half yard from the goal line.

Burger alertly pounced on the ball for the touchdown on the next play and also booted the extra point—his sixth straight successful conversion—for a 7-0 lead.

WAITE MATCHED that one later in the period and went out front 14-7 in the second stanza, both scores not quite the outright gift Sandusky's first one was but still helped along by the locals.

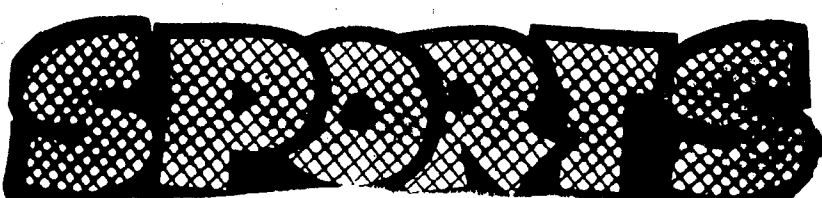
