

Findlay Looks Like Last Chance

"The longer you carry a winning streak, the heavier it gets." Words of wisdom from either Red Blaik or Frank Leahy, we forget which.

Sandusky High's 1957 all-losing ways, which have now reached seven straight, are

in reverse, but are growing equally burdensome with each passing Friday night. Jeff DeHaven and his Blue Streaks would like to snap the string before it gets any later.

And if they don't do it Friday night against Findlay, it

just might be too late as far as this season is concerned.

For the Trojans represent the next-to-last chance to break into the victory column, and since Marion Harding appears to be far the stronger of the two clubs, it

behoves SHS to act immediately.

THE FRIDAY encounter at Strobel Field is part of a two-game Buckeye Conference card, with first place and last at stake.

The Trojans are winless in

four BC outings and its final game, while the Streaks are 0-3. All the other clubs have won at least twice.

At the opposite end of the ladder, Fremont Ross takes its 27-game victory streak and hopes for the third straight Buckeye Conference championship to Marion to battle the tough Prexies.

Ross is 4-0 in the loop, while Harding has two wins and a 20-20 deadlock with Elyria on its record.

FINDLAY HASN'T done much better this season than Sandusky, owning just one win and a tie compared with five reversals.

The Trojans didn't start out badly, losing their opener 26-14 to strong Piqua and tying a pretty good Toledo Scott eleven 12-12 before smashing Ashland, 48-6.

Since then they've dropped four straight, three to teams who have beaten SHS.

Inflating the losses have been Ross, 21-0; Lorain, 26-13; Marion, 26-6; and Elyria, 13-0.

ARMED WITH 10 lettermen, Findlay coach Neil Schmidt, the former Purdue halfback whose long touchdown jaunt triggered the Boilermakers' shocker that ended a long Notre Dame winning streak a few seasons back, was expecting big things from his club when the season began.

And while the record doesn't indicate it, Findlay is a real tough club.

Injuries and then the flu cut heavily into Findlay's offensive scheme, but the defense is big, rugged and fast.

Big man in the line is Gary Bemiller, a two-way tackle performer weighing in at 230. Another outstanding performer up front is end Clay Karcher, a top-notch pass catcher and rugged defensively.

Fullback Roger Sands is Schmidt's top offensive threat, with halfbacks Chuck Hickie and Pat Lucas also two-year veterans.

Akins Clubs DeMarco To Claim Title

BOSTON, Oct. 30 (UP)—A grinning Virgil Akins, still elated at being the welterweight champion of eight states, rejected the prevailing thought today that a flock of other contenders in 40 states did not recognize his paper crown.

"This was the title fight, no elimination tournament for us," said manager Bernie Glickman with tongue in cheek after the sixth-ranked Akins had knocked out former champion Tony DeMarco in the 14th round of their scheduled "title" 15-rounder Tuesday night at Boston Garden.

The 29-year-old Akins who supposedly hurt his right hand in losing recently to Gil Turner, showed no evidence of the injury as he clubbed the top-ranked contender to the canvas twice in the 10th round, again in the 13th and twice in the decisive round before the third and final count at 1:17 of the 14th.

Michigan, OSU Showing Way In Grid Attendance

NEW YORK, Oct. 30 (UP)—The University of Michigan, whose stadium seats 101,001, again led all other colleges in total attendance with 256,986 for three games. The Big 10 also provided the national runnerup in Ohio State, where 242,986 have watched three games. Those huge turnouts helped Midwest attendance rise 2.28 percent.

The tabulations, based on home crowd at 109 colleges, showed that the average attendance during the first half of the present season was 25,481 a game against last year's 25,489. That decrease of eight customers a game means an overall drop of 0.03 percent.

The East, South and Midwest all showed increases, the East leading with a 9.38 percent rise. Attendance dipped in the Midlands, Southwest, Rockies and Pacific Coast, with the coast feeling 10.42 percent for the largest loss.

Rookie 'Redskin' Backfield Will Test Browns Defense

CLEVELAND, Oct. 30 (UP)—Veteran quarterback Eddie LeBaron, the league's leading passer, will be tested by the Cleveland Browns' rookie backfield in the National Football League when they meet the seven-point underdog Washington Redskins Sunday.

That is the opinion of Redskins General Manager Dick McCann, whose backfield is built around LeBaron at the quarterback slot.

Backfielding LeBaron at the

quarterback slot will be Rudy Bukich whom the Browns tried to obtain from Los Angeles.

THE BROWNS, out to hang onto first place in the Eastern Division, have a defensive problem with the sidelining of veteran linebacker Chuck Noll. Noll will be out at least five weeks with a broken arm suffered in the Cardinal game.

Galen Fiss will fill Noll's shoes but the move leaves the Browns without a substitute linebacker. Fiss is injured it could spell serious trouble for the Cleveland title hopes.

Halfback Milt Campbell, who sprained an ankle three weeks ago in the Steeler game, is expected to be available for duty against Washington.

M'CANN APPEARED unworried about the odds on the game, pointing out that the Browns frequently had to come from behind to win 10 out of their last 13 games with Washington.

LeBaron, meanwhile, leads the NFL in passing with an average of 10.96 yards gained for every throw. He had 44 completions in 67 passes and a net gain of 734 yards.

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Tommy O'Connell of Cleveland was second in passing with a 9.04 yard average, followed by Lamar McLean of the Cardinals.

Eddie Brown of the Bears and John Unitas of the Colts, who dropped from third to fifth place.

Unitas gained the most yards, 982, and threw the most touchdowns passes (14). Earl Morrall of Pittsburgh was second in total yardage with 909.

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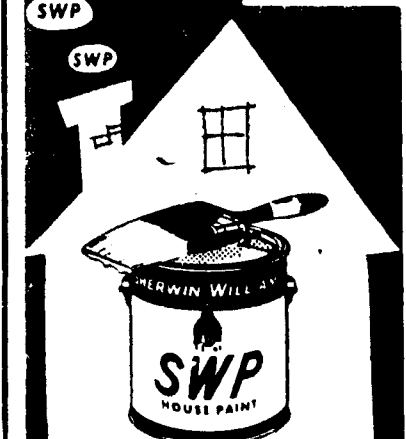
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
