Paced by the superb running of Jon Wise and a fired up line, the St. Paul's Flyers notched their initial win of the season as they triumphed over the visiting Huron Valley Warriors by a 18-0 score.

The Flyers, who were without the services of their first string quarterback due to his injury in preparation for Saturday night's game, scored once in the first three periods to gain the decision.

Again Jon Wise was the offensive star of the game as he bucked for six points and set up another score on a classy 45 yard dash on a punt return. The fleet fullback gained a total of 173 yards on the ground or three-quarters of the locals' dirt grinding.

After the visitors were stopped and forced to punt on a fourth down play, the Flyers started their move to break the scoreless deadlock. After two ground gaining runs and a pass play, the ball rest on the one-yard stripe. At this point Quarterback Phil Minor wasted little time in diving over for the six pointer. The extra point was missed.

Line Stars
With the line seeming to sense the plays of the visitors in the second quarter, they were again forced to punt, with Wise making a 45 yard return to put the ball on the one-yard line.

On the next play the husky full back powered into the end zone for the TD.
Tom Brown was stopped short in his bid for the extra point.

Fine Plays
Midway in the third quarter the locals put together another series of plays, two of which looked more like college grid plays. This series came to a climax as Minor spotted and connected with Joe Seck in the end zone on a 10 yard aerial play.

After the kickoff Huron Valley put together their fines series of the game as they smashed to the Flyers 22 only to lose the ball on downs.

After this scoring attempt on the part of the visitors faltered, the Flyers again showed their strength in the air as Minor hit for three out of five passes. The passes were in vain, however, as the Flyers fumbled and the Warriors recovered.

Throughout the rest of the game the ball changed hands many times with neither side coming close to the opponents' uprights.

Taylor Stopped

The Flyers are to be commended on their stopping of Ed Taylor who has already amassed a total of 152 points this year. Last year he was the second highest school boy scorer as he rambled for a total of 290 points.

Although Taylor did manage to make a fine 87 yard run, the play was called back because of a backfield in motion penalty.

The line play of the locals was tremendous with Ray Perry and Gary Tien converging to make many a stop. Don Lippert, substitute center for the Flyers, also played a fine game.

Credit must also be given to Dave Carter, freshman quarterback for the Warriors, as this was the first football game he ever played.

Forty-Niners Take 2-Game Lead In Coast Play

San Francisco Edges Detroit In Final Seconds

The San Francisco Forty-Niners, boasting Y. A. Little, R. C. Owens and the spirit that moved the gold miners of a century ago, took a two-game lead in the National Football League's Western Division Sunday while the Cleveland Browns clung to their one-game margin in the east.

San Francisco, threatening to crack open the western race, produced its fourth "miracle" finish of the season to edge the Detroit Lions, 35-31, on Little's 41-yard touchdown pass to Owens with 10 seconds to go.

As the teams hit the halfway mark in their 12-game schedules, the Browns became the team to beat in the Eastern Division by defeating the Washington Redskins, 21-17.

The Pittsburgh Steelers gave San Francisco a big assist by slowing the Baltimore Colts, 19-15. Baltimore and Detroit started the day tied for second in the west, a game behind the Forty-Niners.

Pittsburgh and the New York Giants remained a game behind Cleveland. New York's defense paced a 31-17 victory over the Green Bay Packers in what coach Jim Lee Howell of the Giants called "a game we had to win."

The Giants are defending league and Eastern Division champions. George Blanda's three field goals gave the Chicago Bears a 16-10 victory over the Rams before 80,456 at Los Angeles while Bobby Thomson's two scoring plunges plus his two touchdown passes to Bob Walston and Bob Strubling led the Philadelphia Eagles to a 38-21 upset triumph over the Chicago Cardinals.

San Francisco and Cleveland have 5-1 records. Detroit and Baltimore are tied behind San Francisco with 3-3 marks while New York and Pittsburgh trail Cleveland with 4-2 records.

Earl Morrall, whose 18 completions in 30 tries for 270 yards was the best one-game passing performance of the season, paced Pittsburgh at Baltimore with scoring tosses of 43 and 22 yards to Ray Matthews.

Race Shapes Up As Tops Of The Year

CAMDEN, N. J. (UP)—The \$75,000 Trenton Handicap at Garden State Park Saturday was shaping up today as "the race of the year."

Round Table, Dedicate and Bold Ruler are regarded as probable starters for the mile and one-quarter event and there is a strong possibility that Gallant Man also will join the field, skipping the Washington D.C. International at Laurel next Monday.

Round Table registered his 11th straight victory in a betless exhibition last Friday, scoring by eight lengths. On Saturday, Bold Ruler won the Benjamin Franklin Handicap by 12 lengths, despite a staggering 136-pound impost, while Dedicate posted a two-length victory in another exhibition event.

Bold Ruler won the mile and three-sixteenths Preakness this year but was beaten by Iron Liege in the mile and one-quarter Kentucky Derby and by Gallant Man in the mile and one-half Belmont Stakes.

Palmer Quits Circuit After Tourney Win

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (UP)—Plumb tucked out from the arduous chores of following the golfing trail, San Diego Open cham-

pion Arnold Palmer quit the tournament circuit today and headed for his home in Latrobe, Pa., with \$2,800 in his pocket.

The good-looking, 27-year-old college graduate said he would not compete in any more golf tournaments this year. One reason may be the income tax business.

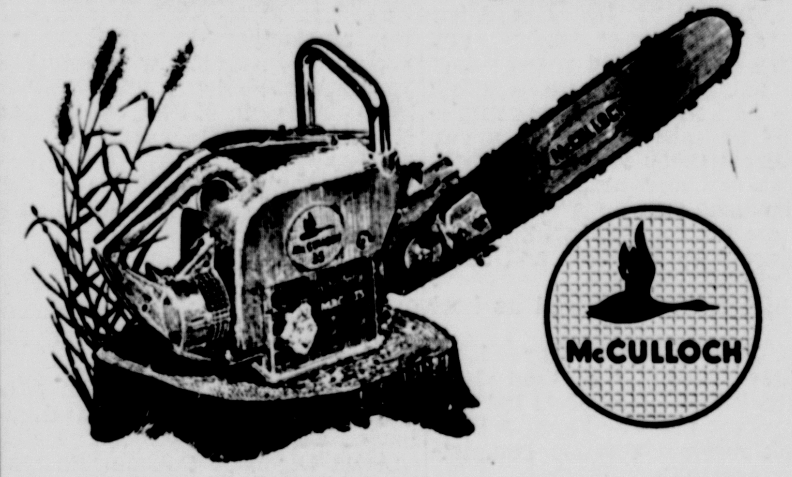
In collecting first money here Sunday, he sky-rocketed his season's winnings to \$27,627.80. He previously had won the Houston, Akron and Azalea (Wilmington, Del.) opens — and he has been

close up in most of the other tournaments around the country.

He finished off a great week by shooting a 70 Sunday which gave him a 72-hole total of 271—17 shots under par, and mostly scored in adverse weather conditions.

Balding picked up \$1,900 for second place; Souchak, Rosburg and Casper tied for third with 273, each collecting \$1,233.33. Far back, at 276, Paul Harney, Worcester, Mass.; Doug Ford, Mahopac, N.Y., and Dow Finsterwald, Tequesta, Fla., came next, each collecting \$916.66.

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
