Ed Wynn To Celebrate 71st Birthday

NEW YORK (UP)—This Saturday, Ed Wynn celebrates the 71st year of his birth. But even more important, this autumn also marks the first anniversary of Wynn's re-birth.

"I'll be 71," mused Wynn, "and here I am 56 years in the business and I find myself discovered all over again. It's like being reborn, you know. Do you know how many times I've been back and forth across the country this year? Six times. Why, I've worked more this year than the previous three.

"This renaissance — or whatever you want to call it — of Ed Wynn is a remarkable thing. I go out in the street nowadays and I seem to be as popular as Jayne Mansfield. Not as pretty, of course. But it shows the power of this medium, television.

No Requiem For Him It was a dramatic role last fall on a "Playhouse 90" production of "Requiem For A Heavyweight" that jolted Wynn back to life as an entertainer. A giant of the vaudeville stage and radio, Wynn dropped into semi-obscure after his NBC-TV show folded a few years back.

"It was in 1953 that my NBC show stopped," recalled Wynn, "and I didn't work again until I did a Red Skelton show that November. Then, two months later, George Gobel, Las Vegas and another Skelton show a year or so later. But that's not much work. "I didn't need the money, but you know it was kind of a funny feeling. That period was so strange. And dreadful. I started getting imaginary aches and pains in my body and the doctor would come and look at me, but of course, he couldn't find anything. "But there was also this other feeling. Inside I'd look at myself in the third person and say — 'Ed Wynn, what has happened to him? What in the world has happened to him?' And I'd say — 'Is that it for Ed Wynn? You see Ed Wynn isn't my real name it's Isiah Edwin Leopold and I've always looked at him from outside.'"

"On Borrowed Time" Wynn landed a small role in the picture, "The Great Man," when he was feeling at his lowest. "Somehow word leaked out that I had done this one big scene in the movie in one take," said Wynn, "and they asked me to do the 'Playhouse 90' before the picture came out.

"Well, the results of that one TV role was explosive. Really explosive. Everything happened after that. It's not like my radio days, of course, when I had two body guards to protect me — that's when I found the 'Fire Chief.' But it's certainly remarkable in its own way.

"And I think one of the most valuable things about it all is that it should give some pause to those who think a man's value to his society is somehow lessened when he reaches a certain age — the sort of thing that calls for the retirement of people in their 50's and 60's. It's good to upset that sort of conformist thinking.

"Now, look at me, almost 71 and here I'll be doing 'On Borrowed Time' on TV. After 56 years in the business, I've become a dramatic actor. 'On Bo-

Peony Roots Should Not Go Too Deep

MADISON, Wis. — (UP) — A University of Wisconsin floriculturist says the most common cause for poor peony development is planting the roots too deep.

Lou Berninger said the buds of the plant should be under only one and a half inches of soil when planted and packed firmly to prevent the roots from settling later. Peonies grow best in full sunlight and in a well-drained location, the plant specialist said. Fall is the best season for transplanting peonies, although they need to be transplanted only every six to ten years.

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Election Not Over With Results

There are some people who think that when the election results are posted on the precinct booth door that the election is over.

Of course, that is not true. Telephone returns are the first to be sent by the 88 county Boards of Elections to the Secretary of State's office.

They are actually the "telephone unofficial" returns, as the actual "unofficial" comes later — it is mailed to the Secretary of State following the night's compilation and sometimes does not always agree with figures given hurriedly over the telephone.

Then comes the official canvass by the Board of Elections, following which the official abstract is sent to the Secretary of State.

This, sometimes, takes days but usually changes the result of only the closest races. From these abstracts the official tabulation is made by the Secretary of State and a certification made, following a canvass by certain state officials.

In cases where recounts occur in state races, the canvass cannot be made until these recount results are available.

The Board of Elections spent many months preparing for an election and it takes considerable time before they have finally completed the work connected with an election. By then, it is usually time to begin planning another!

line. It would be equipped with checking devices so that the tank could be filled at times when domestic use of water in the area is low and line pressure high.

Such an installation, estimated to cost \$3,500, would give the hospital an emergency reservoir which could be drawn from when pressure in city mains dropped below the minimum required for operation of various items of equipment in the hospital.

The tank would also serve as an emergency protection for the hospital in event of an interruption of supply from city mains. The plan was referred by Council to its Water Committee.

Plant Head Needed Mr. Westrick also told Council of the urgent necessity for obtaining the services of a qualified engineer to assume responsibility for operation of the Municipal Light Plant. Harry L. Sellinger, who has been in charge of the plant since the resignation of Howard Salabank, is not available for permanent appointment to the position and is anxious to be relieved of the additional responsibilities.

According to Mr. Westrick, it is not considered possible to obtain the services of a qualified utilities engineer unless the city is prepared to pay an adequate salary. He indicated that James Emery, of the consulting firm of Emery, Marker and Campbell, the city's consultants on the plant, has recently retired from active association with the firm and might be available at least on a temporary basis if Council would sanction a more adequate salary.

Council gave the Board of Control a vote of confidence to proceed in filling the post.

Other action by Council included:

Christmas Lights The Service Director was authorized to make available personnel from the light plant to install Christmas lighting in the downtown area.

The protest of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Hipp to the assessment for the Benedict Avenue sewer extension was referred to the Sewer Committee which will confer with the Board of Control and nominate three members of an equalizing board to study the question.

The City Solicitor was authorized to prepare legislation providing for a reciprocal agreement between Norwalk and Milan for use of fire apparatus.

The Finance Committee reported that studies indicate that alterations which would be necessary so that the Council Chambers could also be used by the new county court would involve an estimated cost of \$3,500. To finance this and to meet increased maintenance and operating costs, the city would have to receive approximately \$90 per month.

With the rules suspended, Council passed a resolution for the issuance of \$20,000 in anticipatory notes to finance the construction of sidewalks on Whitesey Ave.

Mr. Westrick reported that plans are nearly complete for the Benedict-Olive-James St. storm sewer and would be submitted to Council at its next meeting.
