

Big Calvert 11 Threaten Panther String

St. Mary After 6th Straight Senecas Own 3-3 Record

Shooting for Victory No. 6 on the season, the unbeaten St. Mary Panthers face a rugged opponent Friday night when they tackle Tiffin Calvert at Heidelberg Stadium.

Calvert has managed to break even in six games, but have a far better record than the record shows even though they only have six lettermen returning from the 1956 team that rolled to a 7-2 mark.

Up front, the Senecas average 188 pounds per man, spearheaded by returnees making up the whole right side of the line which includes six-six Gil Farley, 195-pounder at end, Jim Ring, 205 at tackle, and Dave Seislove, 180, at the guard. All three are seniors.

Ron Rochester handles the center chores, while on the left side is Dave Masella, 180-pound sophomore guard, Jim McNulty, 230-pound senior letterman and end Vince Fisher, 170, junior.

CALVERT LOST the services of aerial wizard Joe Hunter due to disciplinary reasons, with Bob Altweis taking over. Hunter was the main clog in last year's 48-33 scoring barrage at Strobel Field in a tilt that lasted almost 60 minutes.

The officials had difficulty with the time in the first period, which lasted almost as long as the entire second half.

Hunter completed 10 of 16 pass attempts for 138 yards and two touchdowns. Altweis is a 160-pound junior and a left-handed passer.

ALONG WITH him in the backfield will be Jim Saad, 160, at left half, with either Dave McGowan or Mike Huffman at the other halfback spot. McGowan is a 160-pound junior letterman, while Huffman weighs in at 140. The bulldozer of the club is fullback Mike McCrory, a 190-pound senior letterman who tallied one of the Senecas' markers last season.

Only one change is slated on defense with Mike Sauber moving in at a halfback slot. The 200-pound junior is also slated for offensive action as well.

The Tiffin 11 has scored victories over Norwalk St. Paul, 50-0, Holland, 32-12 and Fremont St. Joe, 33-7, while losing to Bucyrus, 27-12, Crestline, 20-13, and Toledo St. Francis, 49-19. Fumbles have been very costly to the Senecas as well as lack of reserve strength. In the past two games, they have chalked up 65 points to only 19 for the opposition.

ST. MARY HAS again been hampered by poor weather which has forced them to move drills inside, but coach Ed Sustersic feels his club will be in tip-top shape Friday with the exception of Tom Kaman.

Kaman will still be on the sidelines, but may be ready for a little action if needed against Clyde next week.

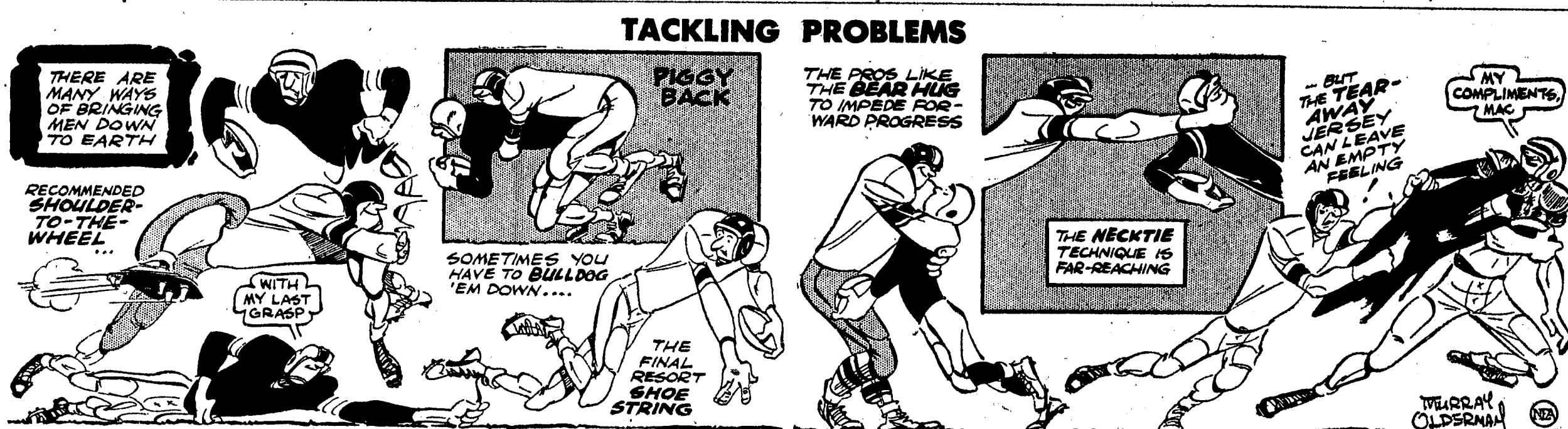
The lineup will be the same as in the past with Earl Reed, Tom McCafferty, Ed Macek, Tom Voltz, John Harkelroad, Ted Papek and Bill Myers making up the all-senior forward wall.

Charles Kromer will direct the attack with Dave Nofitz and Larry Capucini at the halves, with Dave Yeager at fullback.

THE PANTHERS are expected to take to the air again following four touchdowns a passes while romping to a 40-7 win over Elmore.

Sustersic plans four switches in the defensive alignment, Ken Blakely at middle guard, with Bill Wettle and Jack Tomlin moving in at tackle and end respectively. Junior Ed Will is also slated for action at the guard slot.

Bob Tight and Macek will handle the halfback posts with Capucini at safety. Dave Lill is another possible starter.



Milt Campbell Is Doubtful Starter

CLEVELAND, Oct. 24 (UP)—Milt Campbell, the fleet halfback who suffered a sprained ankle in the game against the Steelers, was the only doubtful starter for the Cleveland Browns today as they prepared to meet the Cardinals at Chicago Sunday.

Wednesday's practice session was slowed by a rain-soaked practice field.

COACH PAUL BROWN said if Campbell is unable to appear in Sunday's game, he can use either Lew Carpenter or Chet Hanulak at the inside halfback slot.

Hopes of a sharpened offensive increased Wednesday with the green light given Ray Renfro for a return to action. Renfro, Cleveland's fast flanking back, suffered a gashed finger tip in the Eagles game and had to have three stitches taken.

Brown said that he favored Carpenter to start Sunday, but that Hanulak "should be in better shape than he was for the Eagles."

TOMMY O'CONNELL is expected to open the game at quarterback, but Milt Plum, the former Penn State star, is also slated for action.

Plum came into the Eagles game late in the fourth quarter when O'Connell was injured. He directed the Browns to their only score.

Jim Brown, who leads the team in the rushing department with 209 yards in 58 carries for an average of 3.6 yards, will start at the fullback spot.

The Browns currently are tied for the Eastern Division lead with the New York Giants.

Unbeaten Auburn Continues As College Defense Leader

NEW YORK, Oct. 24 (UP)—The Auburn Tigers, belying the tradition of Southern hospitality, continue as the stingiest group among the nation's major college football teams.

Unbeaten Auburn has yielded an average of 157.8 yards a game to rank as the total defense leader for the second straight week. The

Tigers, who have allowed just one touchdown all season, also rate second to Iowa in defense against running plays.

Oklahoma State and Navy are tied for second in total defense, with identical 168.8 yard averages per game. Princeton and Miami of Florida are close behind.

Iowa, in taking the lead in rushing defense, has allowed its opposition an average 58.5 yards on the ground. Georgia Tech tops the nation's colleges in pass defense, having permitted 30.8 air yards a game. Navy, however, boasts the best air defense percentage of .242.

UCLA, on the strength of its 51-yard average against Oregon State last Saturday, jumped into the top spot in punting. The Uclans have an average of 42.4 yards for their 30 efforts. Tennessee is second with 41.7.

Mantle, Fox Pace AL Voting

NEW YORK, Oct. 24 (UP)—Nelson Fox, who's hit a total of 25 home runs in 11 big league seasons, and Mickey Mantle, who's hit that many in half a campaign, were the only unanimous picks on the United Press 1957 American League All-Star team.

The team, selected by a 24-man committee of three baseball writers from each city in the league, also included catcher Yogi Berra and shortstop Gil McDougald of the Yankees, first baseman Vic

Wertz of the Indians, third baseman Frank Malzone and outfielder Ted Williams of the Red Sox, outfielder Roy Sievers of the Senators, pitcher Jim Bunning of the Tigers and Fox White Sox teammate, pitcher Billy Pierce.

The Baltimore Orioles and Kansas City Athletics were the only teams not represented on a squad that averages 30 years of age per man. The eight regulars hit a total of 200 home runs this year and both pitchers hit the 20 victory total on the nose.

Buckeyes Appear Set For Badgers

COLUMBUS, Oct. 24 (UP)—One injury marred Ohio State's rugged workout Wednesday but they were still in fine shape compared to Wisconsin with whom they do battle this Saturday.

No. 2 left guard LeRoy Cowans was shelved for Saturday's game when his chronic shoulder ailment acted up, and Coach Woody Hayes said he may be out even longer.

AKRON SENIOR Tom Bacci was switched from the No. 3 right tackle to the No. 2 left tackle post. All other Bucks were healthy, however, and John Martin, just off the injury list, worked at No. 2 left tackle after earlier work at right tackle.

Wisconsin, meanwhile, has sidelined two starters for the game against the Buckeyes. Coach Milt Bruhn said he is "convinced" that neither Bill Gehler, left guard, nor Jim Heineke, right tackle, will be ready to play this week.

Bruhn said he will replace Gehler with John Heineke and Jim Heineke with either Karl Holzworth or Lovell Jenkins.

Bruhn added that Dave Cocurek has recovered from a knee injury which kept him out of action last week and he will start at left end Saturday.

MEANWHILE, Ohio State was ranked fifth nationally in rushing offense with 305.8 yards per game. Wisconsin was seventh with 288.8 yards.

Individual figures showed Ohio State's Don Clark 17th in rushing offense with 354 yards to rank as the only Big Ten player in the first 21 places.

Ohio State is second only to Michigan State in the Big Ten both offensively and defensively, with OSU's Frank Kremblas topping the league scorers with 19 points. Clark is second to Michigan State's Walt Kowalczyk in rushing, 239 yards to 214.

Wisconsin's Danny Lewis is third with 160 and has the top average of 8.4 yards per carry.

Pro Golfers Swing Into Winter Tour

HESPERIA, CAL., Oct. 24 (UP)—The Winter Western swing of the pro golf circuit got underway here today with more than 100 of the nation's top golfers competing in the \$15,000 first annual Hesperia Open Invitational Tournament.

The four-day tournament which ends Sunday is co-sponsored by the PGA and play today marked dedication of the course on the Mojave Desert which was started only last summer.

Golfers approached the 7,100-yard desert course without much knowledge of its difficulties. The course is dotted with three artificial lakes and an unusual Joshua Tree sandtrap by the 18th green. Par is 36-36-72.
