

Both City 11's Register Loop Victories

Ray Young Scores 3, Gains 233 Yards In 38-0 Win Over Findlay

"Doctor" Ben Wilson and his capable horde of blue-shirted assistants neatly carved Findlay's Trojans to pieces in a rather bloodless operation Friday night at Findlay.

After the task was completed to the tune of 38-0, the Blue Streaks had evened their season's record at 4-4 and balanced the books on their Buckeye Conference endeavors at 2-2.

Sandusky had Findlay on the operating table for only the prescribed 48 minutes, but the Trojans knew they'd had it and so did everyone else in attendance long before the issue got out of hand on the scoreboard.

It wasn't the fact that Findlay was so inept—for the Trojans certainly weren't defensively at least, fighting the Streaks hard the whole way—but the operation was performed in such meticulous fashion that it left no doubt it was going to be successful.

Ray Young wielded the sharp scalpel, dashing to three touchdowns and adding four extra points while racking up an astounding 233 yards in 18 carries.

And if you don't think that's pretty good, consider this: Don Raggsdale, in his magnificent performance for Mansfield here last week against the Streaks, gained 27 LESS yards in 10 MORE carries.

Young averaged 12.9 yards per try, with his three trips into the end zone—on jaunts of 58, 20 and 15 yards—running his touchdown total for the season to 16.

Waudell White and Willie Nesbitt bagged the other six pointers, with Ernie Delaine and Jon Jack-

THE STREAKS had their first score seven plays after Gary Balconi returned the opening kickoff 18 yards to the 20.

The first six cracks at the line netted 22 yards out to the 42 from where Young suddenly bolted up the middle and sped 58 yards untouched. The count stayed at 6-0 however, as the Streaks failed to convert. It was their only miss.

With 205-pound fullback Chuck Hickie carrying on 8 of 11 plays, the Trojans moved all the way to Sandusky's 6 but Hickie fumbled on the next play with White pouncing on the ball in the end zone to quash Findlay's lone threat.

The Streaks couldn't cash in the next three times they had possession, losing a fumble once and 15-yard penalties bogging down the other chances.

A FINDLAY fumble, that end Walt Williams latched on to, set up Sandusky's second score.

Starting from the Trojans' 20, two plays netted exactly nothing as Jim Gill threw incomplete and Young was pulled down, but Young got 20 on his next effort for the score with 3:17 left in the half.

The Streaks had time for another when Findlay gambled and lost on fourth down near midfield, but a 15-yard penalty helped to stave off the bid.

SANDUSKY WENT 62 yards for its third period score after Findlay was forced to punt. Young turned in the longest jaunt, a 12-yarder, as the Streaks needed 9 plays, White finishing it off from the 4.

Wilson's club moved 49 yards to score early in the fourth quarter after another Findlay punt. It took 7 plays, Young breezing 29 on one of them, with Nesbitt cracking over from the 1.

The scoring wound up with Sandusky moving 56 yards in 4 plays after taking over on downs. Nesbitt hit in for 2, Delaine 6, and then Young went to work. The senior speedster stepped away for 37 yards to the Findlay 15 and then covered the rest of the distance on the next play.

Jake Egbert pulled off the most spectacular play of the night, though, on a 102-yard pass interception runback from his own end zone clear across the field.

VanRensselaer scored three touchdowns in the second period on runs of 48 and 14 yards and a 57-yard pass play from Gerry Heller. He also kicked an extra point. His other two tallies came in the third period on a 15-yard jaunt and a 14-yard pass from Heller.

Dee Wayne Brindley tallied for the victors in the final period on a 29-yard run and also added the extra points.

Harold Senrock scored for Elmore in the first quarter on a 4-yard plunge.

Oak Harbor now has a season's record of 5-3.

Berlin Heights Takes NCC Title In 24-0 Win

Berlin Heights became the 1958 North Central Conference champions by virtue of their 22-0 shutout of Plymouth Friday in their final game of the season. They are, therefore, one of the few teams in the state to finish the season with an unblemished 8-0 record, and 7-0 in league competition.

This was the first undefeated season in 11-man football for the Tigers and ended the careers of six seniors, including the top-flight quarterback Cise Hoffman. Berlin has scored 238 points on the season as compared to only 34 by their opponents.

It was an easy win for the champs, as they scored 8 points in the second frame and 14 in the final quarter. Hoffman, who has played steady ball all season, piloted the team to the victory, scoring the first TD himself on a quarterback sneak with 1:30 left in the half. A Hoffman pass to Bruce Burnham accounted for the extra points.

In the fourth period, Roger Perkins scored on a 5-yard run off tackle. Then with 30 seconds left in the game and the Berlin fans going wild with excitement, Hoffman sneaked in a pass to Burnham of 45 yards for good measure, and showed the fans how it was done by repeating the effort for the extra points.

The Tigers have trampled Seville, Lodi, Townsend-Wakeman, Leroy, Milan, and Black River in the league, besides Plymouth to produce their unblemished record. They also beat Firelands in an independent battle.

After the game, joy reined supreme in Berlin Heights. The coaches and school officials were treated to a "traditional" dunking in the showers, and a victory dinner was given for the team, officials, parents and band.

Steeler Defense Stalls Panthers

Lorain gave a mighty boost to its own and Buckeye Conference prestige in the state Friday night with an upset 16-6 conquest of highly-rated Warren Harding.

Warren was rated second in the state by Associated Press and fifth by United Press International this week.

The Steelers, tied for second place in the BC with Elyria, scored touchdowns in each of the first two quarters, while Warren couldn't follow up its first period score.

Lorain held Warren to only 35 yards rushing and 7 first downs, while the Steelers wound up with 226 yards for the game rushing and added 103 more on 6 pass completions.

Junior halfback Ray Martin scored both Lorain touchdowns, a 1-yard plunge and a 12-yard run. Harold Jones ran for the points following both scores.

Quarterback Joe Malone bagged Warren's touchdown on a 4-yard trip up the middle.

Elyria Rips East, 34-0

ELYRIA—Scoring twice in the first period and chalking up single touchdowns in the remaining quarters, Elyria thundered to its seventh win of the season at the expense of Cleveland East Friday night, 34-0.

Fullback Bill Mrukowski plunged 1 yard after a fumble recovery deep in East territory and passed 16 yards to end Walt Rock for the first period scores.

Panthers Close With 20-6 Win Over Clyde

St. Mary ended its season on a winning note Friday night, downing Clyde 20-6 in a Sandusky Bay Conference game on the Clyde field. It was a rough and alert Panther team that took the field—a much better looking squad than the one that had played the two previous games.

The locals had a fine first half, scoring 14 points, while holding their opponents to 11 yards rushing and no first downs. The Panthers, led by hard-driving Dave Nofzt, had 10 first downs and 196 yards rushing in that first half.

However, things didn't go as well for the St. Mary squad in the third and fourth periods. Although they continued to play good ball, they were plagued by penalties, as the flags fell to the ground against them constantly and by some bad breaks, which gave Clyde the ball.

Led by Nofzt, Bob James, and Bob Tight, the Panthers played one of their best games of the season, teamwise, and ended the year with a 2-3-1 league mark and a 3-4-1 season's record. Clyde remained winless in the conference with a 0-5 mark and have one more game next week against Elmore.

NOFTZ STARTED the Panther scoring in the initial quarter with a right end sweep and James added the extra points. Clyde was again unable to move and then the locals carried the ball from their own 48 in 13 plays for the score. With Nofzt and Tight driving through, and James mixing his plays nicely, the ball rested on the Clyde 12. On third down, James went around left end for the score.

The Panthers were on their way to paydirt again as the second quarter ran out. In the third period, Nofzt picked up a Clyde fumble in the backfield and raced 45 yards to make it 20-0, St. Mary. Then things started happening to the Panthers. The officials gave Coach John Galati no end of aggravation, as they called pass interference on seemingly good defensive

plays by the winners. This happened twice in a row, so that two otherwise incomplete Clyde passes were turned into completions and first downs for the losers.

This put the ball on the St. Mary 17. Ron Baker raced into the end zone, but the play was called back for a clipping penalty against Clyde. However, on the next try, Baker scored on the same play to make it 20-6.

CLYDE TRIED to get back into the game in the fourth quarter on passes, but they missed the mark. The Panthers recovered a fumble on their 31 to stop one Clyde drive, and the losers retaliated later in the period as Roy Briegel intercepted a Panther pass. However, the locals held the desperate Clyde squad as they intercepted another pass to end all threats of scoring.

Nofzt definitely made the difference for the Panthers. The speedy lad started the season for St. Mary as an end and was switched to the halfback position in the Tiffin Calvert game, when back Bill Kramer was on the disabled list.

This week he played for injured back Jim Roeder, and performed brilliantly in both contests.

Statistically, the Panther's racked up 16 first downs to Clyde's 7, intercepted two passes to one for their opponents and recovered three fumbles. Clyde completed 6 out of 14 passes, but two of these were given to them on Panther interference penalties, as they were actually never caught.

The Huron Tigers still hold a thread of hope for a share in the Lakeland conference crown with Clearview, as they downed Margaretta 32-0 before a homecoming crowd Friday night.

Meanwhile, New London took the measure of Vermilion, 28-6 in the other conference battle Friday.

Now that the Tigers have soundly trounced the Polar Bears, they would do anything in the world—even play for them—to help Margaretta beat Clearview next week so that Huron might get a share in the coveted Lakeland crown.

Bill Armstrong amazed and delighted the hometown crowd by racking up 256 yards in 20 carries for the winners. Armstrong has been one of the standouts on the team all season. The husky senior fullback scored four TD's and two extra points in racking up his amazing yardage total.

Armstrong carried 34 yards in the first quarter and then ran over for the extra points. He repeated in the second frame on a one-yard plunge and in the third stanza on a 3-yard run off tackle. He ended his spree in the fourth quarter on a 32-yard jaunt.

Dick Ritter also scored a TD for the Tigers on a 20-yard run around left end in the third period.

This gives Huron a 5-1 league mark and a 6-2 season's record.
