

St. Mary Handed SBC Setback At Carey

Mosser Drives Over In Final Quarter To Avert Shutout, 34-8

Carey's Blue Devils were twice as good as the St. Mary Panthers in the statistics department and slightly better than four times as good on the scoreboard in a Friday night 34-8 romp before a large Dad's Night turnout at Carey. The Blue Devils now stand 4-1-1 for the season and 2-1-1 in league play.

Entering the Sandusky Bay Conference tilt with their 1957 crown all but relinquished, the Panthers absorbed their soundest licking of the season at the hands of a "fired up" football locomotive. The locals didn't have to look bad to lose, either, for the Carey squad was truly one not to be denied.

Carey began the game with a string of 10 quarters without being scored on, and the Blue Devils continued their end zone perfection with comparative ease until the 2:30 mark in the final quarter.

Dave Mosser saved the Panthers from a whitewash as he tumbled into the end zone from the 1-yard line to cap a 37-yard drive. Charles Kromer added the extra two points on a run.

St. Mary rooters had little opportunity to cheer until the final stanza when the locals clicked off six of their total eight first downs while holding Carey scoreless.

A FORECAST OF "things to come" was evident from the first Carey series after the kick-off by the Panthers. On the third play from scrimmage for Carey, Bob James, Panther two-way halfback, was "wrecked up" and taken from the game. He returned a short time later, but was soon removed again as he sustained a leg injury.

Long on experience and weight, the Blue Devils used both factors to good advantage over the Galatians in holding the Panthers to 31 net yards rushing over the first three quarters.

Reflection on the over-all play of Carey for the game makes it fairly easy to understand why the locals had a most difficult time. It just isn't easy to down a squad with six top-notch stars on offense and a defensive alignment that emulates the offense for sterling play.

Charles (The Dandy) Dasher, a 160-pound junior left halfback, must be given a slight edge for player of the night, having tallied twice for Carey in addition to carrying a brace of two-pointers and many yards from the line. The remaining three members of the backfield, quarterback Tom Greer, right half Don Stock and fullback Dennis England figured prominently in the scoring, as did the end men, Jim Messmer and Dennis Yingling.

GREER, MAKING like a junior edition of Milt Plum, hit on nine of his 10 pass attempts for a net total of 149 yards. The 170-

NOL Leaders Rush Toward Big Meeting

Bucyrus and Galion, co-leaders in the Northern Ohio League, rushed headlong toward their climactic Oct. 31 meeting with impressive wins Friday night.

Defending champion Galion polished off Upper Sandusky, 26-0, while Bucyrus ripped Tiffin Columbian, 42-14. Galion plays Shelby next week while Bucyrus tackles Norwalk.

Bucyrus trailed 14-6 at half-time, but tacked 28 big points on the scoreboard in the third period and 8 more in the fourth. Fullback Dave Katterhenrich sparked the winners with touchdown runs of 43, 49 and 47 yards.

Paul Hunt returned a punt 70 yards to paydirt in the first quarter for Galion, but the Tigers couldn't add any more until they exploded for three touchdowns in the final period.

Bell Memorial Race At Speedway Sunday

One of the big racing classics of the year will be held at Sandusky Speedway Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock when the second leg of the "Bud" Bell Memorial race is held. Some 20 qualifying drivers will speed around the half-mile track in 30 laps for the \$3,000 purse.

This annual event is a round-robin between drivers from three of the state's leading tracks, New Bremen Speedway, Columbus Speedway, and the local race track. The first leg of the event was run at New Bremen on October 5 and the final race will be staged at Columbus on the 26th.

Track director Bert Decker expects an overflow crowd on hand to witness the crack event, as 12 drivers from each of the three areas will go in the qualifying time trials starting at 12. The 20 fastest drivers will compete in the big race.

A large crowd from the Lima area, where the Bremen track is located, is expected to make the 140-mile trip to see the race—just as a large turnout from Sandusky was present at the Bremen event several weeks ago.

The drivers from the Sandusky area include Jack Conely, Rowley Beale, Zeke England, Leo Caldwell, Al Beale, and Jay Fair. Also, Joe Bontowski, Gordon Duke, George Fosco, Morris Van Vlerah, Harold McGilton, George Neuman, Clarence Ray, and Johnny Ault.

The race will be run on what is considered one of the country's finest stock car racing tracks. The Sandusky Speedway has excellent parking facilities, and a half-mile asphalt track in excellent condition.

Leroy Blanks Plymouth

The Red Raiders of Leroy thumped Plymouth Friday night in a North Central Conference game at Lodi, 30-0.

They scored 16 big points in the second half to break the backs of the Warriors, who now have a record of 1-4 in conference action. The victors have a 3-1-1 mark in the NCC.

In the first quarter Bob Garner scored from the 2 and the attempt for the extra points failed. Then in the second frame, Mike Ferrell went across on an 88-yard run and Dave Pointing ran through for the extra points.

Later in the same quarter, with 24 seconds left in the half, a pass from Pointing to Wayne Schlack for 25 yards accounted for the next Red Raiders score, and Garner ran for the extra points.

In the final stanza, Ferrell plunged over from the 1 and Garner again took care of the extra points chore on an end run. Plymouth was without fullback Duane Utiss, who has been in bed for a week with the flu.
