

Waite Hands Blue Streaks Third Loss

TOLEDO—Murdered by penalties and plagued by fumbles and injuries, Sandusky High's losing ways went to three straight games here Friday night as Toledo Waite pulled out a 28-14 decision at Waite Stadium.

Trailing 14-6 at halftime, the Blue Streaks battled back to tie the count in the third quarter on an electrifying 34-yard touchdown pass from Jim Gill to Ray Young before an almost unbelievable chain of misfortunes ruined the chances of Ben Wilson's valiant club.

The game was bitterly contested all the way, one hard to match in rock-em, sock-em play on any level.

DESPITE THE third successive reversal, the Streaks—as they did in last week's one-point loss to

Cleveland Shaw—showed they have a mighty fiber but also mighty unlucky football team.

One of these nights all the parts are going to fall into place and somebody's going to take a real gain over... and it couldn't happen at a more opportune time than next Friday when the Wilsons swing back into Buckeye Conference warfare here against arch-rival Fremont Ross.

The team is coming... the breaks aren't... AS MENTIONED before, penalties were a big factor in the game as the Streaks were assessed a total of 97 yards, including six 15-yarders.

the "cause for defeat" listings. Young, scoring all Sandusky's points for the second straight week, and halfback running mate Waudell White again provided the Streaks with a quick and hard-hitting ground game as each averaged about 5 yards per carry.

While the line play up front was outstanding the whole way for the most part, it would be unfair not to single out Tim Ziemke for special mention.

The rangy 16-year-old who plays tackle on offense and end on defense was especially outstanding when Waite had the ball, time and again making key tackles and putting tremendous pressure on Waite's sensational passer, Pete Stoner, all night.

expected, although he showed only six completions in 12 tosses and failed to come up with a touchdown heave. It was mainly due to an alert defensive brigade that was ready to jar the ball loose from receivers the split second they touched the ball, for only one Stoner effort all night wasn't pin-point-perfect.

THE STREAKS received the opening kickoff and with fullback alternates Willie Nesbitt and Ernie Delaine taking turns cracking through along with White and Young, they immediately moved into scoring position before the first 15-yard infraction halted the bid.

Running on third down from the 24, Young scampered all the way to Waite's 8 but holding was

detected and the ball moved back to the 40. An errant pitchout cost the Streaks 8 more, with Ronnie Krueger then stepping back to punt dead on Waite's 11.

Waite promptly turned the break into its first score in five plays...

Stoner found his favorite receiver, Bill McClory, for a 20-yard advance to the 37 on the third play. Ziemke broke through to throw Pat Durand for a 3-yard loss, but on the next play Joe Cummings — a fast-moving 189-pound halfback—swept through a "mile wide" hole and was gone untouched into the end zone 66 yards away. Stoner passed to fullback Bob Fox for the extra points and Waite was out front, 8-0.

GARY BALCONI lugged the ensuing kickoff out 14 yards to the 31 and the Streaks hit paydirt in 10 plays.

Young went 19 and White 9 for the biggest gainers, with Young climaxing the drive by scoring

from 15 yards out. Young had trouble turning the corner going wide to the left, but managed to get loose and blasted right through two would-be tacklers on the 5 to score on the second play of the second quarter.

White was stopped just shy of the goal on the conversion try and the count stayed at 8-6.

Sandusky held Waite deep in its territory, but fumbled on the second play after taking over and Waite had another six-pointer in three plays.

Cummings dashed 14 to the 7 on the first play, with Tyrone Collins going 3 and then in. Stoner's pass try for the conversion points was broken up and it was 14-6 at halftime.

THE STREAKS bagged the equalizer after Waite had the punt after failing to move with the kickoff.

Young breezed 12 for the big gainer as the Streaks covered 31 yards in six plays. A 15-yard holding penalty threatened to halt the bid, but the Waite secondary was fooled badly when Gill found Young with a perfect pitch down the middle, Young hauling it in on the 22 and racing in untouched.

Young circled end for the two-pointer and the score was tied.

Waite went 78 yards after the kickoff, a 15-yard penalty helping out. It took 12 plays, with Cummings racking up the final 5 yards.

Stoner's pass was no good on the conversion try, but the Streaks were detected to be off side and Stoner found Durand free the second time for a 22-14 bulge.

A 15-yard penalty on the kickoff put Sandusky back on its 10, but the Streaks went all the way to Waite's 28 before a fumble halted the drive.

WAITE HAD to punt without a first down, but the Streaks fumbled on the first play and Waite was in possession on the SHS 39. Their final score came 10 plays later.

The Streaks seemingly halted the drive when Stoner was racked up on fourth down while passing with SHS recovering, but after the unpinning—with the Streaks starting to huddle—a flag was detected and Waite had first down on the 2.

Fox went over on the third play as the Streaks put up a rugged fight for the score. Stoner again missed connections for the point after.

Jon Jackson hauled in the following boot and raced 31 yards to the 41 behind crisp blocking, but it was wiped out by another 15-yarder. Three plays later it was all over...

CLEAT MARKS—Wilson and Athletic Director Vic Malinovsky exchanged "pleasantries" over events of the evening with the game officials and Waite brass afterwards... Gill tried only one other pass in addition to the payoff toss to Young... Stoner showed 60 yards for his six completions... The Streaks held a 15-11 edge in the first downs, with a 15-6 advantage in rushing although just outgaining Waite, 215 yards to 209... White finished with 99 yards on 20 carries with Young showing a net of 67 in 13 tries...

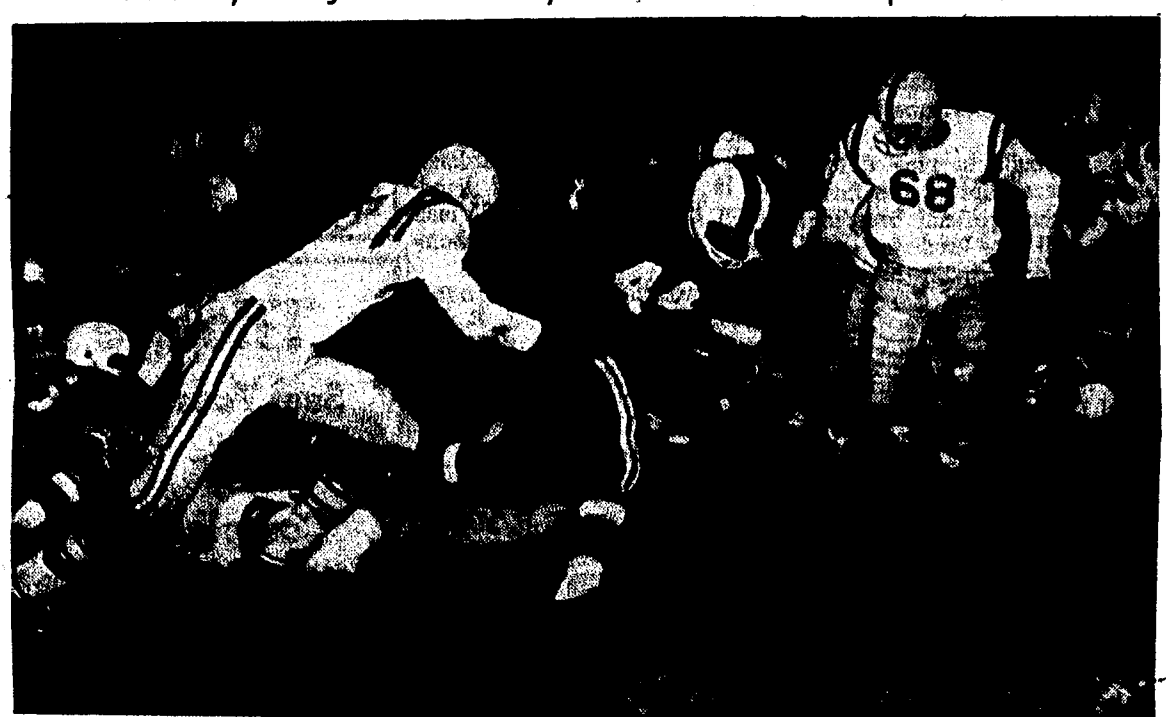
