

Panthers Snarl Too Late In 29-14 SBC Loss

St. Mary Fell Behind Calvert 23-0 At Half

St. Mary played a whale of a second half Saturday night, and people wondered if they were the same team that had taken the field at the beginning of the contest. However, they lost to Tiffin Calvert, 29-14, before a good "Parents Night" crowd at Strobel Field in the Sandusky Bay Conference game.

The Panthers left the field at the end of the first half trailing 23-0, after they had been clobbered all over the field by the fired-up Calvert squad. However, perhaps they had been bumped around just a little too much for their proud blood, as they came back in the third and fourth frames to completely outplay the winners. Unfortunately, the first half deficit was a little too much for them to overcome.

The locals could gain but three first downs in the initial two frames, but ended the game tied with Calvert at 11 first downs apiece. The Panthers fumbled four times in the first half, and the winners capitalized on two of the blunders.

MEANWHILE, the Panthers were being flattened on the field like flies by the tough and rough Calvert defense. The winners were penalized 60 yards in the first half. All three starting backs for St. Mary needed assistance from the trainers in those two quarters, which the Panthers would just as soon forget.

Bob James, a regular halfback taking over for injured quarterback Chuck Kromer, got the wind knocked out of him twice, but remained in the game, and did an outstanding job in the final half for the locals.

ST. MARY fumbled twice more in the first quarter and the beginning of the second. The winners recovered the second fumble on the Panther 9 and on the next play fullback Dan McGowan went off right tackle to score. Jim Gilbig converted the extra point to make it 15-0.

Two plays after the Panthers got their hands on the ball, James, probably groggy from passing out on the field twice, fumbled and the winners pounced on the ball on the Panther 30.

It took them three plays, including a fumble which they recovered, to score as Altwies went over on a quarterback sneak. Jim Soad went around right end for the extra points. Soad played an outstanding game for the winners.

THE PANTHERS roared back on the field in the third period and began blocking and tackling like there was no tomorrow. They recovered a Calvert fumble on the winners' 32 and carried the ball in six plays to paydirt. Dave Nofzt plunged over from the three to score.

On a sustained drive, Calvert rocked from their own 37 to the St. Mary four. Then they fumbled and, as fate would have it, recovered their own fumble and gained two yards doing it. Two plays later, McGowan plunged over for the score. Chuck Smith blocked the conversion attempt for the Panthers.

That was all for the visitors. St. Mary controlled the ball most of the rest of the game, and did

a tremendous job on defense. With 1:30 left in the game, Tight intercepted a Calvert pass and raced 71 yards for a touchdown. Then Roeder raced left end for the extra points.

The game was far from over, however. The Panthers very wisely tried an on-sides kick, and it worked, as Calvert fumbled and the locals recovered. Unfortunately, time ran out before the Panthers could get their attack rolling.

St. Mary now holds a record of 2-4-1 on the season and 1-3-1 in the conference. They will face Clyde in their final game of the season Friday at Clyde.

Utiss Stars As Plymouth Blanks T-W

Berlin Heights Moves Closer To NCC Crown

Berlin Heights moved a step closer to the North Central Conference title and assured themselves at least a tie, by defeating Black River 36-8 Saturday in a homecoming game at Berlin Heights.

The Tigers now hold a clean 6-0 conference record, and whether they tie or win the title will depend on how they do against Plymouth Friday and how Lodi fares against Seville. Lodi now has a 5-1 record on the season.

Dave Davenport, ace quarterback for the Pirates, suffered an ankle injury early in the first quarter and was out for the rest of the game. Also Dave Johnson, right end for Black River, suffered an arm injury and did not play in the second half.

The winners used a ground game almost exclusively and capitalized on some breaks, such as a blocked punt and pass interception. The Tigers scored 14 points in the first quarter and 16 in the second frame, to lead 30-0 at the half.

In the first quarter Harold Linden ran 16 yards to paydirt for the Tigers, and later in the period, Fred Reer vaulted eight yards for the score. Bob Perkins ran for the extra points.

John Weaver pulled off the most spectacular play of the game on a 75-yard punt return for the touchdown in the second quarter for the winners. Perkins again ran the extra points. Reer and Cise Hoffman teamed up for another Berlin score, as Reer ran 14 around right end, and Hoffman scored the charity points to end the half.

Browns, Brown Continue Spree, Colts Stay Clean

Jim Brown, the 230-pound lad Coach Paul Brown selected when he "lost" a coin toss in 1956, may start a new Cleveland Browns dynasty with the biggest season rushing and scoring spree in National Football League history.

While the Baltimore Colts (5-0) retained their one-game Western Division lead Sunday with a 35-10 victory over the Washington Redskins, Brown ran amok for the fifth straight week to spark the Browns (5-0) to a 38-24 victory over the Chicago Cardinals. Brown helped Cleveland retain its two-game Eastern lead by scoring four touchdowns on runs of 62, 41, 7 and 2 yards.

The Chicago Bears (4-1) remained close behind the Colts by defeating the Pittsburgh Steelers, 17-6. Tobin Rote sparked the Detroit Lions to their first 1958 victory, a 41-24 triumph over the Los Angeles Rams before 81,703 in the Coliseum, and the Green Bay Packers edged the Philadelphia Eagles, 38-35 in the other games.

But Brown, a 22-year-old fullback from Hempstead, N.Y., and Syracuse University, is the big story of the first part of the 39th NFL campaign. Barring injury, he almost certainly will shatter the all-time rushing record (1,146 yards set by Steve Van Buren of Philadelphia in 1945) and Van Buren's record for touchdowns (18) made in 1945. At his present pace, Jim also will break the season scoring mark (138 points) set by Don Hutson of Green Bay in 1942.

Cleveland planned to pick Len Dawson of Purdue first in the 1958 NFL draft but selected Brown when it lost a coin toss for the first choice.

Brown gained 180 yards on 24 tries Sunday to boost his five-game rushing total to 815. He only needs about 50 yards in each

of his next seven games to erase Van Buren's record, needing just 332 more to do the trick. Jim has 14 touchdowns and needs five more for a new record. He leads the current scoring race with 84 points and needs 55 more, or nine touchdowns and an extra point, to top Hutson's mark.

Leads Rushing Champions
Brown already has gained more yards in five games than 12 of the league's 26 rushing champions were able to collect in complete campaigns since 1932.

"The way to stop Brown is to have your line outplay theirs," said Coach Frank Ivy of the Cardinals, indicating Brown is operating behind a typical Cleveland line. "The difference in Sunday's game came when Brown got away on that play we had stopped."

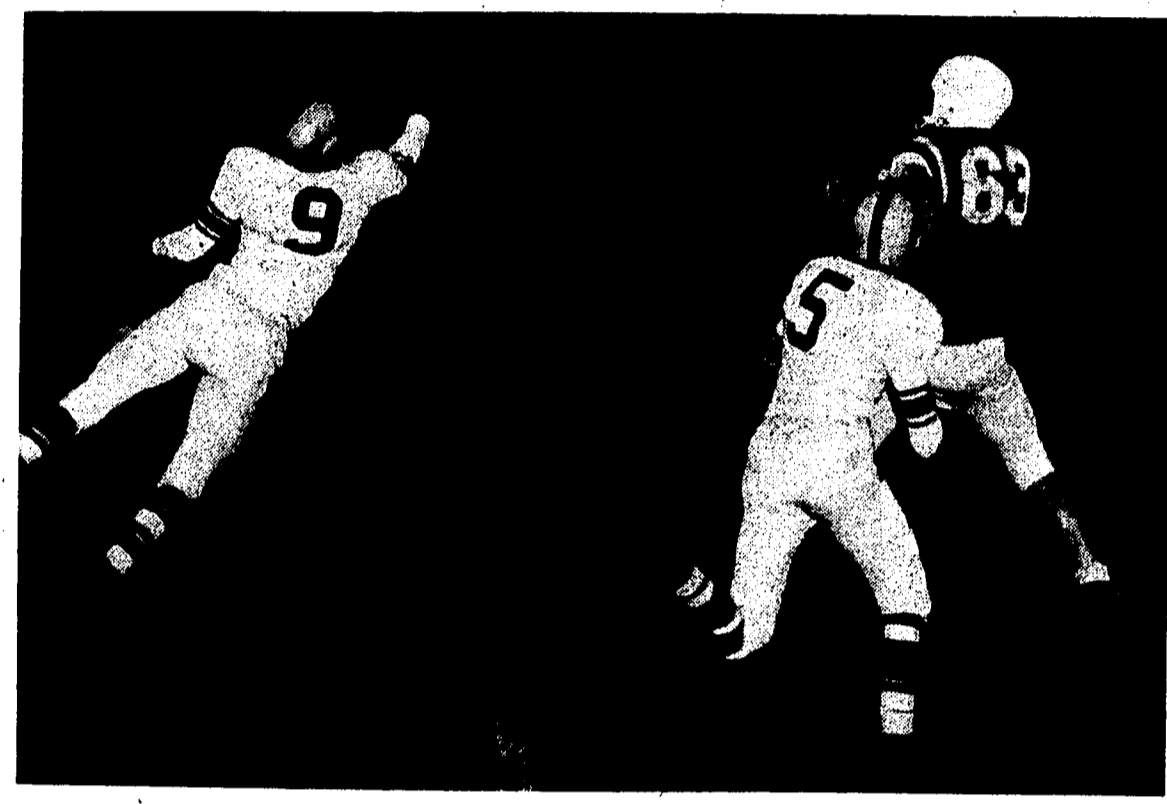
On the play, the Cardinals appeared to have Bobby Mitchell pinned against the sideline for a loss in the third period while leading, 24-17. Mitchell made up a play and flipped the ball to Brown. Jim ran 41 yards to tie the score and went on to clinch the victory with two more touchdowns. Leroy Bolden ran 102 yards with a kickoff for the other Cleveland touchdown.

Leonard Lyles, fleet Baltimore rookie who raced 103 yards against the Bears with a kickoff in the team's 1958 opener, broke Washington's back by carrying one 101 yards in the third period. John Unitas threw two touchdowns passes to Ray Berry while Lenny Moore and Alan Ameche scored on runs to delight 54,403 fans after Bert Zagers gave the Redskins a brief lead.

Bears' Carry Halas
Willie Galimore of the Bears ran 20 yards to score the first time he handled the ball against the Forty-Niners. He also outran the Forty-Niner secondary to score on a 47-yard pass from Zeke Bratkowski in the last period. Halas was escorted off the field by a bevy of his big Bears after they won before a capacity crowd of 60,000 at San Francisco.

The Giants turned two fumbles by Tom Tracy of the Steelers into 10 points during a steady rain at Yankee Stadium. Halfback Carl Karilivacz raced 23 yards to score with Tracy's first bobble and Pat Summerall kicked a 34-yard field goal after halfback Jim Patton recovered the second. Rote, hero of Detroit's 59-14 triumph over Cleveland in the 1957 title game, threw touchdown passes to Dave Middleton, Howard Cassady and Jim Doran to lead the Lions to their first 1958 victory. Gene Gedman and Terry Barr of the Lions teamed on a 104-yard kickoff return. Gedman caught the ball, four yards inside the end zone, ran to the 14 and handed off to Barr, who ran 86 more to score.

Babe Parilli of Green Bay threw two scoring passes to Max Magee and one each to Gary Knafelc and Al Carmichael. But, Pat Hornung's 30-yard first-period field goal provided the margin of victory over Philadelphia. Norm Van Brocklin threw two touchdown passes to Tommy McDonald and one to Gene Mitchell to lead a futile rally by the visitors.
