

Shelby Rockets On In NOL Title Quest

Bad Center Costs Whippets 4th Straight Shutout; Redmen Romp

Shelby's all-victorious Whippets roared on relentlessly toward an eighth Northern Ohio League championship with another sparkling exhibition Friday night to highlight a full slate in the eight-school loop.

The Whippets had their shutout string snapped at four straight, but that's about the only thing they were denied in pounding Norwalk's host Truckers, 50-0, to clinch a title tie. Bellevue, beaten only by the front-runners, put a lock on the runnerup spot by rocking winless Willard, 36-0.

Upper Sandusky handed defending champion Galion its fourth loop loss, 20-0, and Bucyrus routed Tiffin Columbian, 25-6, in other NOL encounters.

Shelby must now only get by Galion next week for its seventh undisputed crown, the Whippets sharing 1952 honors with Upper's Rams.

Shelby 50 Norwalk 6

Shelby roared away from the slower-moving Truckers with 16 points in the first quarter, added 14 points in each of the middle periods and finished off with a lone six-pointer in the final stanza.

Russ Pfahler zipped into the end zone from 12 yards out to get the

route underway, with Wilbur Metzger, the other halfback, accounting for the next three touchdowns on runs of 3, 7 and 56 yards for a 30-0 halftime bulge.

Larry Craighead went 34 yards in the third quarter to hike Shelby's lead to 38-0 before the Truckers took advantage of a break to spoil the visitor's bid for a fifth straight whitewashing.

Running from the single wing, a snapback from center went wild and Norwalk recovered on Shelby's 5, from where halfback Mark Fowler took it over on the next play.

It was only the third touchdown given up by the Whippets this season, Ashland and Willard each scoring in the first two games played by Coach Bill Wilkins' club.

Evashevski's Son Top Iowa Prep

DES MOINES, Iowa (UPI)—"Frosty" Evashevski, the son of Iowa football Coach Forest Evashevski has been named United Press International Iowa high school back of the week.

The young Evashevski threw four touchdown passes in a 40-13 victory over Clinton, Iowa, High School last week. The victory pushed Iowa City into fourth place in the UPI poll of the top prep teams in Iowa.

Frosty's star performance brought his total of touchdown passes in the last two weeks to seven.

Mark Wagoner rambled 22 to account for the final touchdowns. Pfahler and Metzger also chalked up a PAT run apiece, Pfahler passed to Tom George for another and George also hauled in one from Mike Greene.

Bellevue 36 Willard 0

The running of fullback Ed Lynch and the passing of Jere Crosby sparked Bellevue to its sixth win in seven outings.

Lynch rambled for three six-pointers, while Crosby, back at quarterback after playing two games at halfback due to a broken thumb on his right hand, passed for one touchdown and completed three PAT throws.

The Redmen went 51 yards to score in six plays the second time they had the ball to ignite a 22-point first quarter, Lynch capping the drive by going over from the 3.

End Phil Beachey hopped on a fumble on Willard's 31 to set up the second score, Lynch breaking off right tackle and going the distance on the next play.

Lowell Schaefer's club went 67 yards in four plays for its third touchdown of the quarter the next time they got the ball, Glenn Miller romping the final 29 on a reverse.

Bellevue drove 92 yards in 9 plays in the second period following a Crimson Flash punt, Lynch again ripping through a gaping hole at tackle and racing 49 yards untouched.

The Redmen added their final score in the third period, Crosby clicking with Beachey on a jump pass from the 3 to climax a 57-yard move.

Beachey hauled in two of Crosby's two-point throws and Miller the other.

Game statistics clearly show Bellevue's superiority, the Redmen piling up a 377 to 94 advantage in total yards and 15 to 4 in first downs.

Upper Sandusky 20 Galion 0

Halfback Ed Schoenberger scored twice for Upper's resurgent Rams at Galion, racing 65 yards in the first quarter to get the scoring underway and later blasting over from the 4.

The other touchdown for the Rams, who scored in each of the first three quarters, was accounted for by Dick Miller on a 3-yard thrust.

Miller also ran for the PAT after Upper's third period tally. Upper, coached by former Sandusky High backfield aide Jack Wilson, has now won three straight after a string of four reversals to open the season.

Bucyrus 25 Tiffin Columbian 6

Bucyrus opened the scoring on the first play of the second quarter when Roy Hargis went 26 yards, and Sam Beach pitched a 12-yard scoring aerial to Mike Crum to put the Redmen out front 13-0 at halftime.

Ray Eldson scooted 61 yards in the third period and Tom Emerson plunged over from a yard out in the fourth to account for the other Bucyrus touchdowns.

The Tornadoes averted a blanketing in the final stanza when Bob Biddle cracked over from the one.

Miscues Help St. Joe In Clinching SBC Tie

OAK HARBOR — Fremont St. Joe used an erring Oak Harbor team as a springboard to clinch no less than a tie for championship honors in the Sandusky Bay Conference race this fall with a 29-6 win over the Rockets here Friday night.

The Crimson Streaks wound up SBC play with a 4-1 record, losing their chance for an undisputed title by bowing 28-8 to Clyde two weeks ago.

Tiffin Calvert, which hiked its loop mark to 3-1 with a 39-0 shellacking of Sandusky St. Mary last night, can pull into a final tie in the six-school league by winning over the Rockets here next Friday.

The remaining members are out of contention, all with at least two losses.

ST. JOE SCORED in every quarter, with the Rockets aiding considerably by losing three fumbles and having two passes intercepted.

Dick LaFontaine scored from three yards out in the second quarter to put the Rockets behind only 15-6 at halftime, but St. Joe was in charge the rest of the way.

PLYMOUTH — Bill Strine's 20-yard pass to Doug McQuate and another aerial from Strine to Duane Baker for the extra points gave Plymouth an 8-6 win over Leroy-Westfield here Friday night.

Plymouth's score came in the third period after failing to hit paydirt twice in the first quarter from four yards out. Leroy tallied its six-pointer when John Smucker plunged over after setting up a 65-yard run. Smucker also tried to run the extra point, but was foiled. Both clubs now have the same record of 3-4.

St. Paul Sets Scoring Mark In 66-28 Win

ELMORE — Norwalk St. Paul established a school scoring record in ripping Elmore by a 66-28 score here Friday night in an independent game.

The Flyers' nine touchdowns and six extra points erased the old mark set in 1956 when they buried Fostoria St. Wendelin, 60-0.

Bernard Fries and Denny Meyers paced the onslaught with three touchdowns apiece, while Jim Rosper added two and Bruce Asterita one on a 33-yard pass from quarterback Tom Bleile who also hit Meyers for a 25-yard touchdown.

Rosper raced 13 yards and Myers added the extra points on a pass from Bleile to make it 8-0, but Elmore scored with Jerry Kroger and Dale Klingbeil combining for the six-pointer from eight yards.

But it was all St. Paul from that point as they rolled up a 38-6 halftime lead and increased the margin to 52-6 at the three-quarter mark. Elmore tallied three times in the fourth quarter.

The victory, coming on the heels of a 26-22 defeat at Lakeside last week in which the hosts scored three touchdowns in the final four minutes, was the Flyers' second in six starts.

Only Elyria stands between Lorain's hard-hitting Steelers and their first Buckeye Conference football championship.

The once-beaten Steelers mauled invading Fremont Ross Friday night, 53-12, to hike their spotless loop record to 4-0.

Elyria, which will be the host when the two clubs meet in the season finale Nov. 13, opened a half-game lead on the runnerup position by blanking Findlay, also last night, 16-0.

Marion Harding, which has one loss like Elyria, gets a chance to pull even with the Steelers next week against the much-maligned Ross Little Giants.

Marion took its powder-keg offensive outside the league Friday night and hung up a smashing 68-20 win at Ashland.

Marion closes its BC slate at Sandusky on the final night of the season. The Blue Streaks also were in non-loop action this week, winning 28-0 at Mansfield Thursday.

THE STEELERS led 34-0 at halftime in clinching a tie for the title.

Halfback Ray Martin scored four times in the rout, three on short-yardage thrusts and the other when on the receiving end of a pass from quarterback Bill

Tipple covering 75 yards.

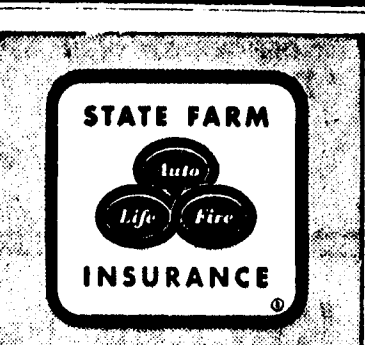

The Presidents gained an amazing 562 yards in the rout, 383 of which was made on the ground. Porietas was in on only three plays the second quarter and scored everytime he was given the nod on runs of 9, 5 and 3 yards.

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
