Terry's Late Dash Brings Huron Win

Tigers Rally For 16-14 Verdict At Oberlin

OBERLIN—Statistically, Huron held a wide margin over Oberlin here Friday night, but the Lakeland Conference contenders were forced to come from behind in the fourth quarter to register a 16-14 squeaker.

The Tigers controlled the pigskin throughout and gained a net total of 290 yards in 59 rushes and also picked up a total of 17 first downs, while limiting Oberlin to 100 yards rushing and only nine first-and-tens.

Huron marched to Oberlin's three in the first period, but were halted by the Indians who punted out to the 40. Quarterback Ray Majoy passed to Keith Hamilton for a 15-yard gain on the first play and then Majoy picked up 13 more on a rollout to give Huron a first down on the 12.

Five-yard thrusts by Jim Boos and Pat Terry gave the Tigers another first down on the two from where Boos hit the left side for the score with 6:30 remaining in the opening stanza. Terry added the extra points.

OBERLIN TIED the count in the second period after Hamilton punted to the hosts' 33. Halfback Joe Harris swept left end for 15 and a first down on the 48 after which sophomore Bob Bourne tossed a 35-yard pass to Gary Cowling on the Huron 17. Harris again skirted the left side for 14 and halfback Al Petroff carried the pigskin over from the three on the next play. Harris blasted off tackle to knot the count at 8-8 at halftime.

Huron received the second kickoff, but on a fourth down

play on their own 27, the snapback to punter Hamilton sailed over his head and Oberlin gained possession on the one.

Bourne then vaulted into the end zone on the fifth play of the half, but Petroff was stopped on the extra point try and that proved to be the deciding play. Huron marched to Oberlin's seven early in the fourth period after an interception by Hamilton, but were thwarted by the Indians who eventually punted to Huron's 28.

A HAMILTON to Boos pass covered 13 yards after which Terry cracked off a nine-yard advance. Majoy went two to the Oberlin 32 and Terry three more, but a penalty put the ball back on the Indians 34.

Terry, 185-pound senior halfback, then reeled off the final 34 yards on an off-tackle thrust to tie the score at 14-14 with 3:30 to go and the veteran ball-carrier smacked off right tackle to give the Tigers a 16-14 lead which they held.

The Tigers open their LC season Friday when they play host to Wellington.

Vermilion Stifles Plymouth By 42-13

VERMILION — Jerry Martin's coaching debut at Vermilion couldn't have been much brighter as his Sailor 11 walloped Plymouth by a 42-13 count Friday night with six different players collecting touchdowns.

Plymouth actually held a 7-6 lead at the quarter, but Vermilion roared back with two touchdowns in both the second and fourth periods and another in the third canto.

Hugh Darley was the first Sailor to hit paydirt with a five-yard run in the opening quarter, but Plymouth's Fate Christian raced 30 yards for the equalizer and Bill Strine's placement gave the hosts a 7-6 edge.

Vermilion forged ahead to stay in the second quarter when junior halfback Denny Owens dashed in from the three and Darley added the extra points. Cliff Bartome and Bob Bors combined for a 35-yard pass play later in the period with Bors also adding the point after.

Decker is offering a total purse of \$2700 with \$250 going to the winner of each feature event . . . the first 20-lapper coming before the semi-feature with the other winding up the nine-event card.

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Perkins Pirates Under Full Sail

Milan No Match For Campbell-st Eleven

Rolling up more than half as many points as they were able to score all last year, Perkins High school inaugurated its 1959 gridiron battles by walloping Milan on the S. Campbell-st field Friday afternoon.

The Pirates, who totaled just 82 points in their first full year of grid warfare, erupted for 42 while holding the hapless Milan 11 scoreless.

Leading the six-touchdown scoring barrage was 154-pound junior quarterback Stan Crist, who tallied one while throwing for two more . . . he also added one of three extra points.

Halfbacks George King and Bud Wertz dashed into paydirt twice and each also registered two-pointers. The other Pirate counter came when defensive guard Mike Shelby returned a blocked punt 29 yards.

THE RAMPAGING Pirates opened the scoring in the first quarter when they marched 55 yards in 11 plays with King throwing a key block as Wertz went in standing up from eight yards out. Crist's pass to end Dan David on the extra point play was incomplete at the three minute mark . . . King picked up 33 yards in five attempts and Wertz added 29 in the same number of carries with a penalty temporarily halting the drive.

Just seconds into the second stanza, Milan gambled on a fourth and seven situation on the Pirates 32 and failed with Perkins gaining possession. King, 155-pound junior halfback, then carried the mail 68 yards on the very first play. Apparently stopped on his own 35, the 18-year-old speedster spun away from three would-be tacklers to race the rest of the way untouched to give Perkins a 12-0 lead. Wertz smacked over the middle for the added points.

John Stone's squad then added eight more markers in the period when they marched 53 yards in 10 plays with Crist hitting Wertz on a 12-yard aerial in which the Crestline transfer grabbed the toss on the two after hesitating before going out. Crist kept the ball to register two more points, netting the Pirates a commanding 22-0 bulge at halftime.

The Pirates had actually scored earlier when Crist connected with King for a 38-yard screen pass, but the touchdown was nullified by a clipping penalty.

It took the Perkins squad just three plays to produce their fourth six-pointer of the afternoon after receiving the second half kickoff.

CRIST RETURNED the kickoff to the 48 and with Wertz moving down the invaders, King was able to gain 14 on a sweep around right

end for a first down on the 38. King then scampered 11 yards off left tackle and was hauled down by a shoestring tackle by Larry Fox, the only man between King and the goal.

The shifty King went all the way on the third play of the second half when he grabbed a Crist pass on the 26 and with great broken field running, sidestepped his way across the goal.

The Indians returned the kickoff back to the 36 but stalled. Fox dropped back to punt with Perkins' Mel Weltie crashing right over center to block the punt and the alert sophomore guard Shelby picked up the free ball and skirted into the end zone.

Perkins' final tally came in the fourth quarter after Weltie again blocked an Indian punt attempt on Milan's five. Wertz hit off-tackle for four and then Crist plunged over from the one. King darted off-tackle to ring up the Pirates final points.

THE GOING won't be as easy when the Pirates trek to Genoa next week, but they certainly displayed a great running attack as well as a stubborn defense and should give the Comets plenty of trouble.

The running of both King and Wertz was tremendous with the junior duo rolling up over 200 yards rushing between them, while Crist directed the S. Campbell-st team flawlessly.

Defensively, the entire squad played very well, holding the Indians to less than a total of 100 yards net rushing.

Plenty of work is still needed though as the Pirates opponents won't get any easier, but with the added experience and the incentive to win, Stone's club could very well finish the season on the plus side of the ledger.

New London Rout Loudonville, 28-0

NEW LONDON—Held scoreless in the initial period, the New London Wildcats rolled up two touchdowns in the second quarter and added another pair in the second half while routing Loudonville, 28-0.

The speedy Lakeland Conference squad was paced by seniors Jim Craabs and Phil Mourtou who divided the scoring with two six-pointers apiece.

Craabs, 146-pound halfback, hit paydirt twice in the second period, going 11 yards on a sweep for the first counter and then going over later in the stanza from the four. He also added two points after the second touchdown.

Aerials from quarterback Gary Bonney to sophomore end Jerry Steinke set up both scores. Bonney hit Steinke for 31 in the first drive and 42 the second time after New London recovered a Loudonville fumble on the visitors' 48.

DON JERRY'S Wildcats marched 57 yards in the third period with Mourtou cracking off-tackle for the final eight after Bonney had set it up with a 20-yard keeper.

The Wildcats completed the route in the fourth canto when Mourtou charged over the goal from 10 yards out to cap a 41-yard march Bonney pass to Steinke gave the hosts two more markers.
