

Giants Need Win Over Eagles

Would Mean East Division Tie

Sunday may well be the day of reckoning in both divisions of the National Football League. Then again, it may merely set the stage for one of the wildest races down the home stretch the league has seen in years.

Barring a complete reversal of form, the defending champion Philadelphia Eagles could all but wrap up the Eastern Conference championship by whipping the

Giants in New York. The Eagles have won seven, lost one. New York has a 6-2 record.

Of course, if the Giants conquer the Eagles, the two teams would be tied.

In the Western Conference, the front-running Green Bay Packers, now 8-2, tackle the Bears in Chicago. The Bears, generally regarded as the most improved club in both conferences, have a record of five victories and three losses. Green Bay, like the Eagles, would become division favorite with a decision over the Bears. Chicago, would climb into a deadlock for first place if the Bears master the Packers. A month ago, Green Bay roughed up the Bears 24-0.

Other Eastern action sends the Dallas Cowboys (4-4) to Pittsburgh (3-5) and the Cleveland Browns (5-3) to Washington (0-8). The San Francisco 49ers (4-3-1) move into Los Angeles (2-6) and the Baltimore Colts (4-4) invade Minnesota (1-7) in other Western activity.

The Detroit Lions (4-3-1) will

Frosh Leads Way In York Triumph

York High School opened its 1961-62 basketball season with a 52-42 triumph over visiting Thompson Friday night with a freshman leading the way for Bob Gwinn's charges.

The Panthers gained a 9-8 lead at the quarter and were in front the rest of the way with frosh Gary Johnson dropping in 17 points to lead a well-balanced attack in which all of the starters collared at least 8 markers.

Johnson, 150-pound 6-3 center, canned 10 of his points in the third quarter as the Panthers outscored the Tigers by a 22-14 margin and held a 42-31 advantage. Johnson cashed in on 4 of his 7 field goals in the stanza.

Bud Hayward, 6-4 forward, followed with 10, while Rich Ziebler netted 9 and Jerry Bogner and Joe Risner 8 apiece. Three Thompson cagers were in double figures.

Russ Beeler connected for 12, while Herman Dale and Bill Cummings tallied 11 each.

In the statistic department, York hit on 23 of 66 from the field for 35 per cent, while the Tigers dropped in just 15 of 55 for 27 per cent. York canned 6 of 16 free throws for 38 per cent and Thompson connected on 12 of 26 for a mark of 46.

Sailors Pin 6-0 Setback On Firelands

A third-period touchdown was all Vermilion needed in handing host Firelands a 6-0 defeat in the 1961 grid finale for the Sailors Friday night.

Vermilion wound up with a 4-0 record, bagging all of its victories in road ventures and absorbing all six losses at home.

The Sailors struck for the only touchdown of the night after they were halted on Firelands' 8. The Falcons were unable to move out from deep in their own territory and punted with Vermilion coming right back to score this time with sophomore Dave Ackerson slashing over from 3 yards out.

Pipers Win Again

ABL Has Another Dispute

American Basketball League officials, beset by numerous headaches in the opening weeks of the new professional circuit, were scurrying for the aspirin bottle again today over the case of Pittsburgh Rens' star Connie Hawkins.

Hawkins, who scored 14 points as the Eastern Division leading Rens whipped the Washington Tapers 117-88 Friday night and is one of the league's top scorers with a 24-plus scoring average, has had his eligibility status questioned by several coaches.

A New York schoolboy standout, Hawkins attended the University of Iowa in 1960, but dropped out due to scholastic difficulties. The coaches claim an ABL rule prohibits Hawkins from playing in the league until his college class graduates. That would place Hawkins on the sidelines until 1964.

But Pittsburgh owner Lenny

Litman says the owners voted to waive the rule because of economic hardship on the part of Hawkins' family. "Hawkins couldn't go back to school and he needed a job, badly. The best thing he could do was play basketball," Litman said.

The officials will meet in Chicago Sunday to consider the case.

While the Rens were bringing the ABL's best record to 3-1, Cleveland beat San Francisco 97-88 and knocked the Saints off the top rung in the West. Kansas City 121-101 winners over Hawaii, and Los Angeles, which defeated Chicago 121-106, are tied for first.

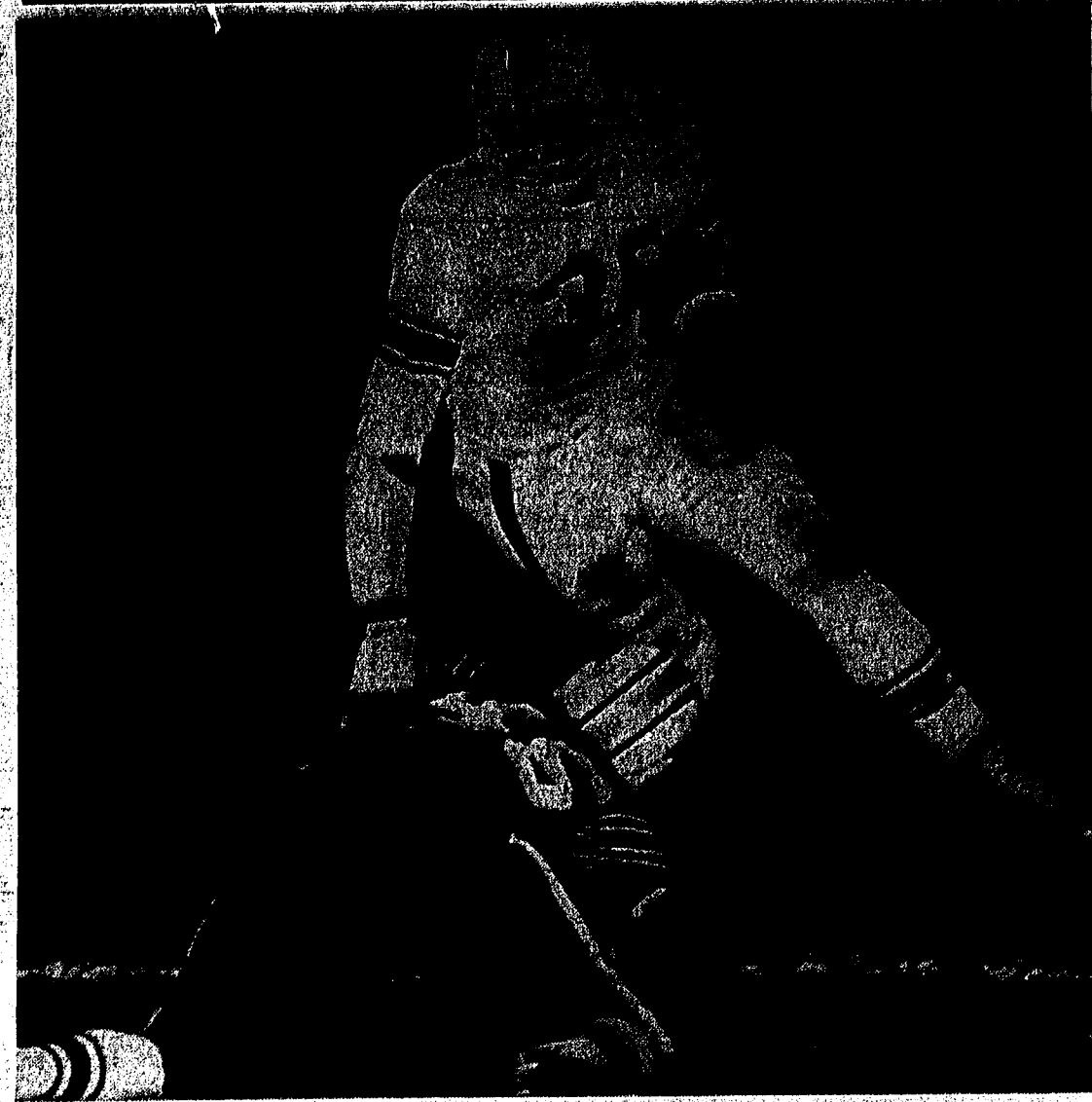
HOLLYWOOD, Fla. (AP)—The Professional Golfers Association has opened its membership door to Negroes and to golfers from every country of the world. Until the constitution was amended Thursday at the annual PGA convention, membership had been limited to Caucasians from North and South America. Now there are no restrictions based on race, religion or nationality.

Lou Strong of Rochester, N.Y., PGA president elected for a second two-year term, said the constitutional changes most likely would not be noticeable on the pro-tournament circuit. He noted that three Negroes have participated in PGA-sponsored tournaments, as well as players from countries outside the Western Hemisphere. Now, however, these players will be able to join the PGA.

Strong said that the 85 delegates, in amending the constitution, demonstrated "a realization of changing conditions in the world situation" by enacting a constructive measure coinciding with decisions set forth by the U.S. government.

Last November the PGA voted against eliminating the Caucasian clause. As a result Stanley Mosk, attorney general of California, said that he would force the PGA to "cease all activity of any kind" in his state until the clause was removed.

Lakers Hit Hard As Baylor Called

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The 6th Army has called up Elgin Baylor for active duty, riddling the chances of the Los Angeles Lakers to bring a National Basketball Association championship to their new home.

An Army spokesman at San Francisco said Friday night that Baylor's orders had been mailed to him in Los Angeles. He said that Baylor probably would have to report to active duty in about a month.

Baylor said he hasn't received the orders. His coach, Fred Schaus, was stunned by the announcement.

Plymouth Is Rapped 62-0 By Bellville

PLYMOUTH — Undeclared Bellville failed to score in the first 17 minutes of play, but then exploded for 9 touchdowns to crush Plymouth by a 62-0 count here Friday night.

The host Big Red marched to Bellville's 10 the first time they had possession only to lose the ball on downs and contained the high-powered Blue Jay attack until midway through the second period when the visitors scored 3 times. They had 14 more points in the third quarter and 28 in the final stanza to wind up their season with a 9-0-1 mark.

Mike Hamilton paced the Blue Jays with 4 touchdowns, racing 12, 4 and 48 yards from scrimmage and returning a punt 75 yards for another. Karl Rule scored on runs of 16 and 15 yards, while Steve Jones, Gary Walker and Jim Hoffman collared one six-pointer apiece.

Plymouth finished its first season under Bill Ramseyer with a 1-8-1 record.

Baylor, who is married and has one child, has served six months of reserve training.

The Lakers have compiled a 9-2 record in the NBA and seemed headed for a Western Division title.

Baylor is the first major professional basketball star to be called up. Many of the leading players in the game are not eligible for military service because they exceed the height limit of 6 feet, 6 inches.

Baylor, 6-5 and weighing 230, is generally recognized as one of the greatest all-around players in the history of professional basketball. A product of Seattle University, he was an instant success in the tough NBA. He holds the league record of 71 points in a single game and is an outstanding rebounder and playmaker.

Unbeaten Heavy Facing Big Test

NEW YORK (AP)—Tony Alonzi, an unbeaten young heavyweight from Hollywood, Fla., with 27 victories, faces his most important test tonight when he takes on George Logan of Boise, Idaho, at Madison Square Garden.

Alonzi, 22, a rangy 6-4, has been brought along slowly under the guidance of Charlie Goldman, Rocky Marciano's old trainer. Young Tony has knocked out 16 opponents.

Logan, 25, is known hereabouts for three losing fights with Tom McNeely, the Bostonian who challenges Floyd Patterson for the title Dec. 4 in Toronto. Logan's record is 21-5-1.

The fight will be seen on network (ABC) television starting at 10 p.m. (EST).

Massillon Is 21-20 Victor Over Parma

CLEVELAND (AP) — Massillon's defending state high school football champions edged Parma 21-20 Friday night, with a placement by Wilbur Paisley, the Tigers' place-kicking specialist, providing the margin of victory.

The Tigers, ranked first on The Associated Press poll, turned two Parma fumbles into touchdowns in the third period to overcome a 20-8 halftime deficit and remain in the unbeaten ranks. It was their 13th straight victory—10 of them this season.

Parma, which entered the game with a 5-4 record, is the first team to score 20 points against Massillon this season. The strong Tiger defense had yielded an average of only 4.2 points per game until Friday night's contest.

In other games involving the Top 10 teams, second-ranked Niles gained stature by trouncing third-ranked Alliance 30-6; Hamilton Garfield, No. 7 last week, edged fifth-ranked Middletown 26-22; Kettering Fairmont, No. 8, rolled over Xenia Central 28-0; ninth-ranked Martins Ferry defeated Bridgeport 36-6, and tenth-ranked Toledo Macomber downed Toledo Scot 6-0.

Cincinnati Roger Bacon, No. 4, and Bellevue, No. 6, did not play.

LA Names Park Dodger Stadium

86 Yards From Brown Would Top Van Buren

CLEVELAND (AP)—The Washington Redskins have treated Jim Brown roughly on several occasions, but the Cleveland Browns' fullback will try to gain 86 yards in Washington Sunday to make him the second best ground gainer in National Football League history.

Brown, the league leader in rushing this season with 720 yards, has gained a total of 5,775 yards since joining the professional ranks in 1957. He will be shooting for Steve Van Buren's mark of 5,860 yards Sunday.

Joe Perry, the Baltimore Colts' 12-year veteran, holds the NFL record of 7,643 yards and still is going strong. The Redskins last month held Brown to 24 yards on 17 carries. Two years ago when Jim was en route to a NFL ground gaining record of 1,527 yards in a season, the Washington defense held him to a mere 12 yards.

Halfback Bobby Mitchell, who is with a medical detachment at Ft. Meade, Md., hopes to join the Browns for a workout at D.C. Stadium in Washington this afternoon. He returned to Cleveland on a weekend pass to play against the Pittsburgh Steelers last Sunday.

The Browns are counting more heavily on Mitchell Sunday because his replacement, rookie Tom Watkins, is out of action with a dislocated shoulder suffered against the Steelers.

The Redskins will be seeking their first victory since October 1960. They have lost their last 16 games.

Carter Holds 25-Pin Lead In PBA Event

CLEVELAND (AP)—Don Carter, defending titlist in the Professional Bowlers Association's national championships, is taking up right where he left off last year.

Carter, of St. Louis, chalked up a score of 2,248 in ten games to take a 25-pin lead in Friday's opening round of the \$40,000 event.

The field of 192 completes the 20-game qualifier today and will be cut to 96 for Sunday's third round. The field will be narrowed again to 24 for Monday's finals.

Don Scott of Cleveland was the only other bowler to crack the 2,200 level. He posted a 2,223, 27 pins ahead of third place Joe Ostroski of Philadelphia, who had 2,196.

Aside from Scott's 2,223, the best score turned in by an Ohio professional was 2,088 by Joe Bolek of Cleveland. Other Ohio scores included: Ben Vorisek, Bedford, 2,070; Tom Conity, Toledo, 2,051; Bill Boyd, Warren, 2,048; Dale Whisler, Dayton, 2,047, and Phil Audi, North Canton, 2,026.

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
