Crawford, Butler In Grid Test

NORTH ROBINSON—Both the Butler Bulldogs and Colonel Crawford are both eyeing a first victory of the short football season as they meet here Saturday night.

Butler has suffered defeats to Loudonville, 20-0, and Shreve, 20-8. The Colonels fought to a 6-6 deadlock with Plymouth and lost to Hardin, Northern, 28-14.

The Colonels lost almost all of its first team of last year, with only four returning lettermen among the 1961 contingent. The club lacks experience and size, but shows desire.

ELEVEN RETURN

Although Butler lost 10 vets by graduation, the Bulldogs still have 11 monogram winners this fall, representing 22 letters.

Ron Thorne, 150-pound senior, is quarterbacking the Bulldogs.

Butler beat the Colonels, 52-18, last year in an undefeated-and-united season. The Colonels were in their first season of a full 11-man grid slate and posted a 5-3 mark.

Sherman Wins, 2-0

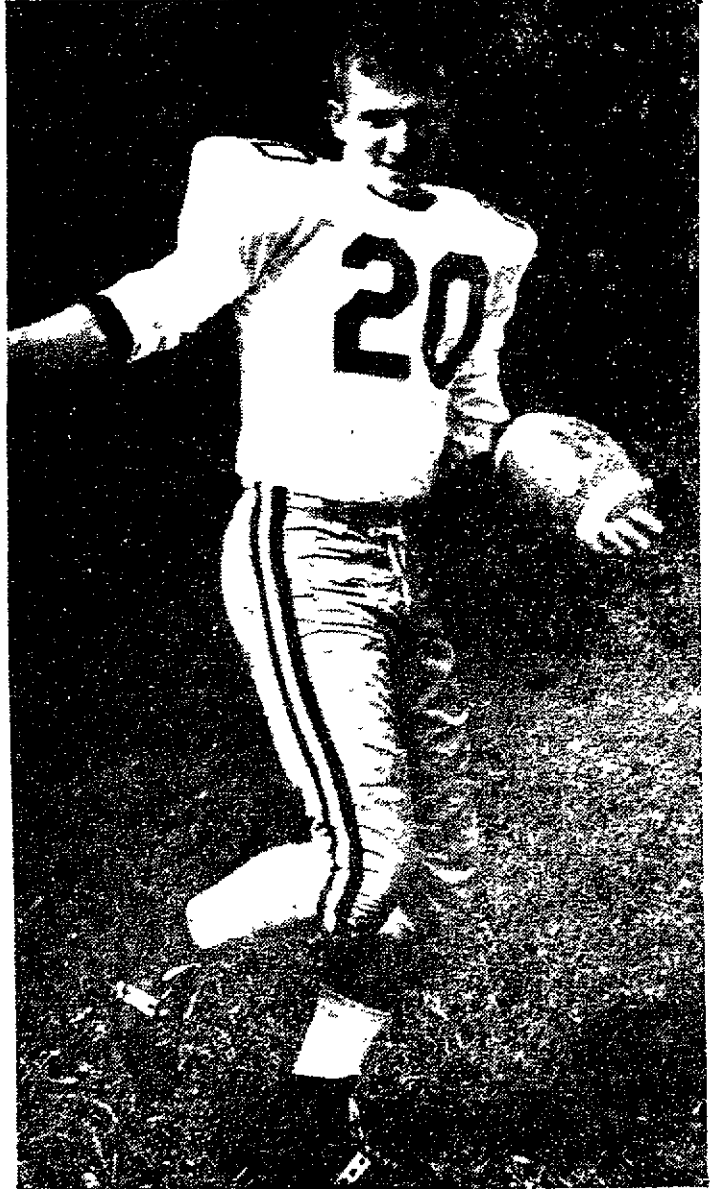
BELLVILLE — John Sherman's ninth grade football team opened its first football season with a 2-0 victory over the Bellville freshmen.

Charlie Williams, Sherman end, tackled a Bellville back in the end zone for the only points in the second quarter.

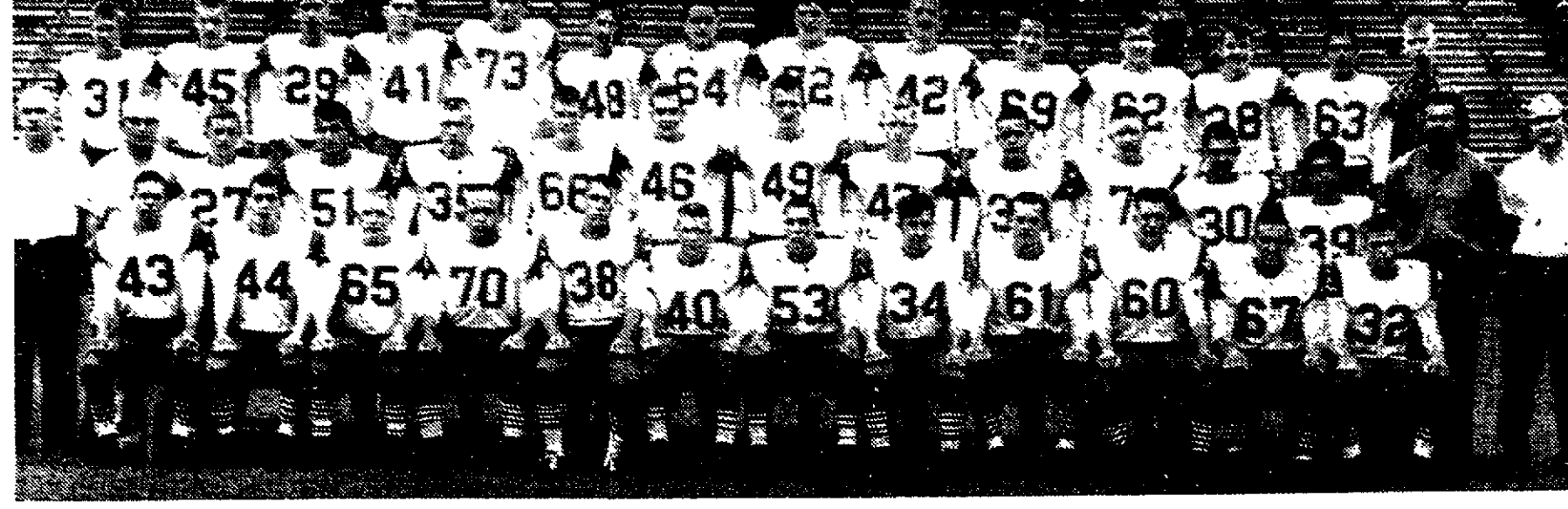
The Sherman line proved to be the standout, with the backs still a question mark.

Shelby Battles Big Foe In NOL Opener

SHELBY — The Shelby Whippets will try to extend their victory string to two games by dumping the Norwalk Truckers (0-2) Friday night in the Maple City opening Northern Ohio League play for both schools.

It will be the 41st meeting between the two schools on the gridiron since 1899.

Last season the Whippets nipped the Truckers, 16-12, to win their second straight NOL grid title and ninth since the loop was organized in 1944. The defeat spoiled Norwalk's best grid record of eight straight wins.

The Whippets will average 163 pounds per griddier on the line and 169 pounds each in the backfield. The Truckers tip the scales at 175 pounds apiece on the forward wall and 163 on the backfield.

BIG BOY

Heaviest player in the starting line-ups of both schools is Dallas Newton, Norwalk end, weighing in at 215 pounds. Newton, a cage star, stands close to five feet, nine inches tall.

About 2,000 Whippet fans are expected to go to the game if the weather is not inclement.

Shelby has its longest win streak going over the Truckers, winning on the gridiron for the past 12 years. Shelby has won 26 games, tied two and lost only 12 in the series.

Cincy Reds, Yanks Set Ducat Plans

NEW YORK (AP) — Here are the announced plans of the New York Yankees and Cincinnati Reds for handling World Series tickets:

YANKEES

Tickets will be sold in blocks of four for the games at Yankee Stadium. They are the first two games—Oct. 4 and 5—and the sixth and seventh, if necessary—Oct. 11-12. Mail orders will be limited for no more than two sets of tickets per person. The price of two sets of box seats is \$84-\$42 per box seats for four games. Two sets of reserved seats cost \$58.80 — \$29.40 per set of four. A \$1 fee for mailing and handling must be added to each order. Money orders and checks should be made payable to the New York Yankees and mailed to Yankee Stadium, Bronx 51, New York.

Standing room tickets at \$4.20 each may be purchased in any quantity for single games, either by mail or at the stadium advance ticket office and at the Yankees Grand Central Terminal ticket office, stating day and date desired. Bleacher seats at \$2.10 each will be sold only the day of each game.

REDS

No box seats will be available for public sale. Only two tickets for a single game will be accepted per order for the three games set for Crosley Field — Oct. 7-9. The cost for one ticket is \$8.20 including \$1 postage for handling charge. Price of two tickets will be \$15.40 including the \$1 charge.

Payment may be through money orders or American Express Co. or bank certified or cashier's check, made out to the Cincinnati Baseball Club and mailed to Cincinnati Reds, Post Office Box 1486, Cincinnati 1. The club asks inclusion of self-addressed envelope.

The club said orders will be filled from available reserved seats, but the club cannot comply with requests for specific locations or for specific dates.

Standing room and sun deck tickets are to be sold several days prior to the first World Series game here.

Plymouth Big Red Eyes First Victory

PLYMOUTH — The Plymouth Big Red (0-1-1) will be trying to break into the win column by invading Berlin Heights (0-2) at 2 p.m. Saturday in a game billed as a North Central Ohio Conference battle.

Berlin Heights, who is also playing in the newly organized Firelands Conference, has dropped two straight games to Western Reserve, 22-0, in a Firelands contest and Firelands, 16-12, outside of the loop.

Only four schools, Black River, Plymouth, Berlin Heights and Milan, are playing for the mythical NCOC title this fall.

Plymouth has failed to show scoring punch so far with only 190-pound Fullback Gary Utiss hitting pay dirt for a touchdown. The Big Red tied Colonel Crawford, 6-6, and then lost to powerful Margaretta, 30-0.

Coach Bill Ramseyer's first Plymouth grid squad has 12 letter winners back from last season. He is short on bench strength.

"The complaints about this and that are starting to lessen and the pendulum is beginning to swing the other way."

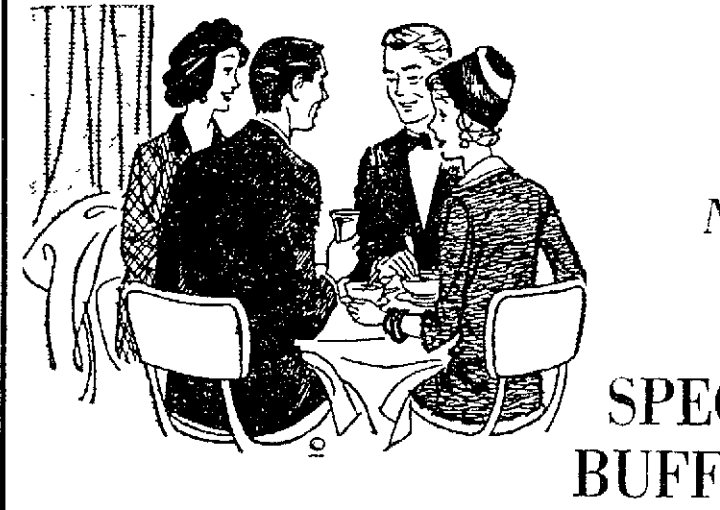
"Baseball attendance goes in cycles. This town is ready now and it's our job to give them something to see."

Asked whether Cleveland could ever duplicate the major league record of 2,620,627 set in the 1948 championship season, Paul replied:

"I'll bet anybody that within a period of a few years we'll have a two million attendance. Everything has to go right for you, of course. Weather, a team in contention, etc."

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Ex-Grid Star Dies
CLEVELAND (AP)—Stanley B. Cofall, 67, a star halfback for Notre Dame 47 years ago and a player on the old Massillon Tigers pro football team, died of a heart attack here Thursday.

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
