

Tyger Lair ...

NEWARK — The Newark Wildcats spent a frustrating evening here last night. Only once in the long game were the winless Cats able to mount any kind of threat against the rugged Mansfield Tyger defensive football unit. That came in the second quarter when Newark marched to the Tyger 40, a 42-yard push on eight plays. Three of Newark's five first downs came on that surge.

Newark's best in the first quarter was to its own 32 and in the third to its 45. Newark got into Mansfield territory—barely—in the fourth period on two straight penalties.

The Tygers were hampered all night by the little red flags. The officials detected rules infractions 13 times on the Tygers, but Newark refused three of them.

Newark put the ball into action on ground plays only 27 times and averaged 3.2 yards. The Tygers averaged 6.0.

The Tyger varsity and sophomore bands joined the Newark musicians in the pre-game and halftime programs. The Tyger soph appeared only before the game.

Tyger tackle Walt Norris was injured midway in the first quarter. He needed several stitches to close a cut on his mouth.

Mansfield became the first team to blank Newark in four games. The victory was the fourth for Mansfield in six games with the Wildcats.

The 34 points was the most the Tygers have scored in two seasons under Bill Doolittle.

A Senior High team hadn't scored that many points since the 1958 aggregation defeated Cleveland East Tech, 34-6. Last team to score more points was the 1957 outfit which beat Akron Kenmore in early season, 46-6.

It was only the third shut-out scored by a Mansfield team in three years.

The four-touchdown burst was the third time Henry Weaver had scored that many in a single game. He did it once in his sophomore year and once last season. In only two other games has the big speedster run up more than the 133 yards he accumulated last night. Seven of his 17 runs against Newark were 10 or more yards.

Junior Bill Mitchell, starting for the first time, picked up 46 yards on seven efforts and Harold Phillips made 44 on 13.

Ten different Tyger backs carried the ball. Howard Ridella led Newark with 39 yards in 11 carries.

Jim Wareham kicked four straight extra points. The senior reserve fullback has now hit on seven of ten tries.

Rosburg's Splitting Top In Golf Open

Ford, O'Toole Sharp In Tuneup Tests

Rog Maris Fails Again To Connect

Why wait for Wednesday? — Whitey Ford and Jim O'Toole, the two southpaws who'll open the World Series, look ready to go right now.

Both took their final tuneups Friday night and although Ford was a mite sharper of the two, O'Toole turned in a smooth enough performance to win his 19th.

NINE WHIFFS — Ford struck out nine in a scoreless six-inning stint for the New York Yankees, allowed only four hits and might have won his 26th game had not the Boston Red Sox tied the score off reliever Louis Arroyo in the seventh inning.

The Yankees snapped the tie and went on to win, 2-1, at the expense of Bill Monbouquette. Roger Maris failed in a bid for his 61st homer, going hitless in two official trips, but Johnny Blanchard belted his 21st homer in the fourth and then singled home the winning run in the ninth to bring Reliever Rollie Sheldon his 11th victory.

O'Toole also gave up four hits during the five innings he pitched in the Red Sox victory over the world champion Pittsburgh Pirates.

However, he struck out only five and was nicked for a run in the fifth on Rookie Donn Clendenon's triple and Dick Stuart's single. Ken Johnson and Sherm Jones held Pittsburgh hitless over the last four innings.

SPAHN AGAIN — Warren Spahn scored his 21st victory as the Milwaukee Braves defeated the San Francisco Giants, 4-1, in a game called after 4½ innings because of rain.

Spahn yielded four hits in winning the 309th game of his major league career. Eddie Mathews broke a 1-1 tie when he hit his 32nd homer with one on in the third.

In other American League action, the Baltimore Orioles beat the Chicago White Sox, 3-2, in 10 innings. The Washington Senators blanked the Kansas City Athletics, 2-0, the Detroit Tigers scored a 6-4 win over the Minnesota Twins in 10 innings, and the Los Angeles Angels downed the Cleveland Indians, 6-4.

Hank Foiles' 10th inning homer gave the Orioles their victory over the White Sox after Jim Gentile drove in his 141st run with a single to tie the score in the ninth.

FOILES CONNECTS — Foiles connected off loser Warren Hacker, who took over for Juan Pizarro in the 10th. Pizarro struck out 13 and didn't walk a batter during the nine innings he worked. Chuck Estrada, who allowed seven hits and fanned eight, gained his 15th victory.

Pete Burnside checked the Athletics on two hits in posting his fourth victory. Washington scored its first run on a balk by Jim Archer and added an insurance run with the aid of a double steal by Chuck Hinton and Marty Keough.

Jake Wood of the Tigers set a record by striking out for the 139th time but singled with the bases full in the 10th to defeat the Twins. Norm Cash hit his 40th homer for Detroit and Billy Martin connected for Minnesota.
