Tyger Lair... Crestline, Freds

LORAIN — Once again the defensive unit of the Mansfield Tygers outshone the attackers in a game of contrasts last night at George Daniel Stadium.

Using a control style of offense, Lorain put the ball into play 59 times in running and passing situations and managed only 127 yards. The Admirals made only 98 rushing yards in 48 carries and 71 of those came in the second quarter as Mansfield ran only five plays in that period.

On eight of the plays the hard-charging Bengal forwards threw Admiral ball carriers for losses. Eight other times Lorain was stopped with a gain of one or under yards.

Mansfield was shackled in the first half, gaining only 23 yards on the ground.

However, the complexion changed completely in the second half as Henry Weaver shifted into high gear. The big fellow had moved the leather only seven yards in four plays in the first half.

Then after intermission he ran wild. On 14 running plays in the second half, he averaged better than 10 yards a carry. When it was all over he had 153 yards — easily his best yardage of 1961.

Mansfield ran 45 plays and picked up 227 yards but the usually reliable aerial game backfired. Don Cole completed only one of eight passes and had two intercepted — one inside the ten after running plays put the ball into position for a possible tie breaker.

Joe Radman led Lorain with 56 yards in 18 efforts while Mike Urbanic, who had been the top Lorain ball carrier all season, was held to 36 in 11 tries. Bob Lamats scored the Lorain touchdown but wound up with only eight yards in 12 carries.

Harold Phillips gained 37 yards in 13 plays and Bill Mitchell 30 in six for Mansfield.

Tyger linebacker Jim Wareham made crime pay in the third quarter.

Lamats bounced off a solid wall of Tyger defenders and Wareham broke through to steal the ball out of his hands on the Mansfield 35.

Neither team completed a forward pass after intermission. Dave Beckwith and Cole intercepted Lorain's only two aerial tries in the last half.

Rick Ott, injured Tyger co-captain, watched the game in a wheel chair near the players' bench. The defensive ace underwent a knee operation this week and is out for the season.

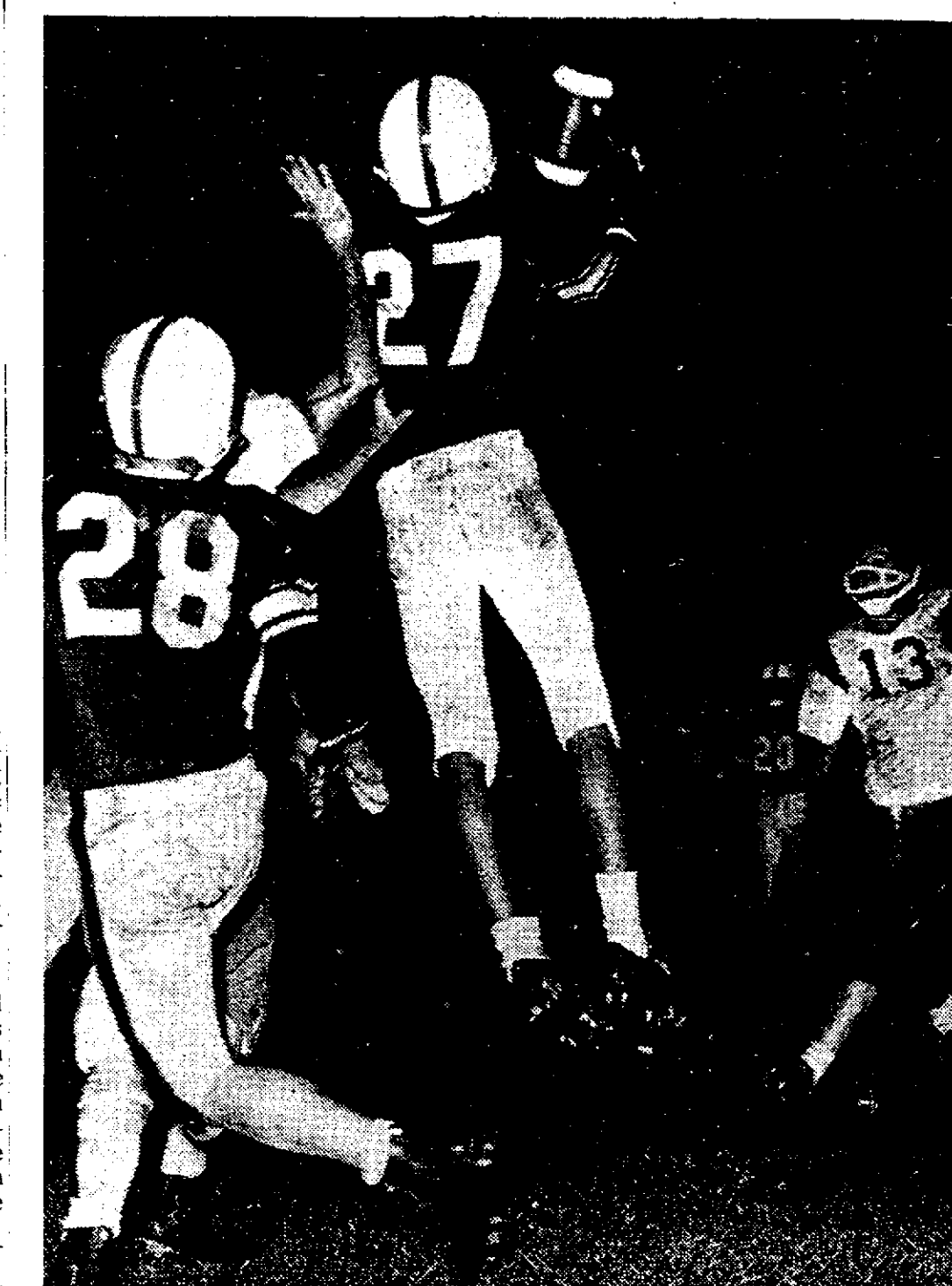

U. S. Netters Gain 1-1 Tie With Italy

ROME, Italy (AP) — Nicola Pietrangeli rallied today to beat Whitney Reed 2-6, 6-4, 6-4, 6-4 and gave Italy a 1-1 tie with the United States after the first two singles matches of the Davis Cup interzone tennis round.

The match was halted by darkness Friday after Reed had won the first two sets.

Immediately after the Pietrangeli-Reed match ended, it was announced that the two teams had agreed to postpone the doubles match until Sunday. The two remaining singles will be played Monday.

Even if the United States eventually loses the interzone final to Italy, the Americans already can claim a moral victory.

They have made Italian sports fans and tennis experts eat their words.

Before the five-match series started, Italians were talking of their team winning all the matches.

NOT SO SURE

Now the Italians are not so sure. Jon Douglas of Santa Monica, Calif., and Reed of Alameda, Calif., have provided the shock for the Italians.

On the red clay tennis court of the Roma Central Club, Friday, Douglas, former Stanford quarterback, came from behind to upset Italian champion Fausto Gardini in the opening match. The score was 4-6, 4-6, 7-5, 10-8, 6-0.

Then Reed took on Nicola Pietrangeli. Reed is virtually unknown here. He is rated only eighth in the United States. Pietrangeli is generally considered Europe's best amateur.

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Colorado's Victor Over Hurricanes

Colorado used a tough, alert defense and Detroit a brilliant quarterback as the keys for their victories Friday night — each preserving an unbeaten season — as the college football season headed into a Big Ten-dominated weekend.

Colorado, shoring for the Big Eight championship and a post-season trip to the Orange Bowl, showed the bowl committee a determined defense which pounced on a fourth-quarter fumble that set up the winning field goal in a 9-7 victory over injury-weakened Miami.

Junior quarterback Jerry Gross passed for 196 yards — including scoring strikes of 43 and 57 yards — in leading Detroit to a 20-0 conquest of Boston College.

DRIVES HALT

Colorado halted a 78-yard Miami drive on foot from its goal in the first period, then turned around and launched a 99-yard march of its own for a 6-0 half-time lead. Miami was on the Colorado five when the half ended.
