

Margaretta Over Perkins By 30-14

"Our defense came up with a sock-em" meeting in which both teams effort and "we made too many mistakes which hurt us" were the comments made by Margaretta winning coach George Reash and loser Ted Schwanger following Friday's grueling battle at Castalia before an overflow crowd.

Margaretta jumped off to an early lead and went on to register a 30-14 victory over the close-by Pirates in a "rock-em and

roll-em" meeting in which both clubs hit exceptionally hard from the opening whistle.

Reash praised his defensive unit for its work in holding Perkins, while the mistakes Schwanger referred to were two costly fumbles in the first half which the Polar Bears promptly turned into touchdowns.

Although it was the first gridiron clash between the schools, not many could ever come close to the vicious play turned in by

Polars Notch 5th In 'Backyard Brawl'

The Pirates and Polars who both went all out to win.

Trailing by three touchdowns midway through the third period, Schuylkill's veteran Pirate 11 (4-2) still battled all the way, scoring in the final minute of action and having another called back by a penalty.

Polars Score Early

Margaretta (5-1) struck the first time it had possession in the opening period. Perkins received the opening kickoff, but fumbled on the very first play from scrimmage and Bob Remy recovered for the hosts on the 32.

The Polars picked up a first

down on the 21 and went all the way from this point with junior quarterback Bob Oakes tossing a strike into the waiting arms of senior end Dave Gowitzka and the former Lakeland Conference team, now playing as an independent, posted six points on the scoreboard with 9:04 remaining in

the first period.

Jim Bright, 185-pound senior, who was moved to fullback by Reash from end at the start of the season, collared the next two Margaretta touchdowns. He dodged his way on a 42-yard jaunt with just 42 seconds left in the first quarter and crashed into

the end zone from the 1 in the second period.

Another fumble recovery set up the third Polar Bear score with Bright advancing 22 yards before getting the assignment from the 1 and Al Wiedenheft added the PAT to make it 22-0. Bob Harple picked up the bonus points after Bright's initial marker.

Perkins scored with 56 seconds left in the first half after receiving

a good break. The Pirates were forced into a punting situation, but an off-side penalty gave them a first down and they proceeded to take advantage of the extra chance with the Taylor twins combining for the touchdown.

Bill Taylor found his junior brother Don in the clear and connected for the six points from 17 yards, but the Pirates fumbled on the extra point attempt and the score remained at 22-6 going into the third period.

Free from penalties for almost the entire first half, the second half brought about numerous major step-offs against both clubs as the crunching noise of the shoulder pads clashing continued even heavier than before. Both clubs carried out their assignments full-tilt until the play was called dead and penalties occurred several times when determined gridders continued to do what they were assigned.

Another Pass Clicks

A 15-yard penalty started Margaretta's drive toward its final points of the night when Gowitzka returned a Pirate punt 4 yards to the 31 and the penalty gave the Polars possession on the 46. They went the 54 yards in eight plays with Oakes tossing a little fourth-down pass over the center to Harple who grabbed the pigskin while falling backwards into the end zone from the 8.

Margaretta needed six for the first down and Oakes came up with the right play which was almost the same one as he tossed to Gowitzka in the first cant. Wiedenheft added the PAT and it was 30-6 with 3:37 still left in the third period.

Gary Horvath picked up two to the 30 and Charles Stevenson scrooped his 16th touchdown of the season by going the distance after taking a screen pass in the right flat from Taylor and putting on the speed to outrun the Polar Bear secondary. However, a clipping penalty nullified his fine run and Perkins was stopped on the 30 three plays later.

The Polars marched all the way to the Perkins 4 before relinquishing the ball on downs when Bruce Long crashed in to throw Wiedenheft for a three-yard loss on the seven on fourth down Perkins brought the ball all the way out to Margaretta's 41, but Taylor's pass was intercepted by Al Blumh and that threat was over.

Pirates Bounce Back

Perkins was back at the controls two plays later, however, when Don Taylor intercepted an Oakes aerial on the Perkins 40 and returned 53 yards.

They drove 53 yards against the clock to score with Bill Taylor hitting Skip Woodson on a 10-yard pass play with the latter driving into paydirt the final 2 yards with a pair of Margaretta defenders hanging on. Stevenson carried four straight times to get the march underway, picking up 41 yards in the carries.

Stevenson, the outstanding 161-pound fullback, was the main target of the Polar Bears' defense all night, but the 5-5 senior still gained 141 yards in 24 attempts which didn't hurt his 9.6 average too much. "Choo Choo" is certainly one of the best backs we have or will face this season, was the tribute made by Reash.

Leading the Polar defensive unit were linebackers Bright and Blumh along with tackle Fred Halladay.

The initial battle between the schools is now history, but there will be more to come. But both Reash and Schwanger have the same feelings. "I'm certainly glad this one is over."

Sailors Win, New London Loses In Lakeland Tilts

Avon Lake Bags Third In Loop To Pull Even With Huron

Avon Lake moved into a tie for the Lakeland Conference lead with Huron Friday night in crushing hapless Ridgeville, 40-8, one of four conference games played.

Wellington kept its hopes alive with a 14-6 win over Amherst, Vermilion blanked Clearview, 12-0, and New London, making only its second start in the L.C. bowed to Midview by a 28-16 count.

Huron went outside the conference to shellack Sandusky St. Mary's, 58-0.

Easy for Shoremen

Avon Lake joined the Tigers at 3-0 in the conference by handing Ridgeville its sixth straight defeat. The Shoremen collared at least one touchdown in every period with Kevin Caine and Bill Armbricht scoring twice each.

Caine, the leading Shoreman scorer and ground-gainer, ran 57 and 24 yards for touchdowns before being ejected along with two Ridgeville players. Armbricht tallied on runs of 1 and 8 yards and scored one PAT, while Gammel cracked over from 7 yards out and Hoxie grabbed a pass good for 10 yards and the other Avon Lake six-pointer from Owen.

The victory was Avon Lake's fifth in six season outings, all of the victories coming in succession. Ridgeville broke into the scoring column in the final quarter with Curt Bolin racing 60 yards and he also picked up the bonus points.

Dukes Retain Hopes Bill Walker's 30-yard pass from Gary Neptune enabled Wellington to break a 6-6 tie and retain its slim hopes for a LC championship.

The Dukes registered their fourth conference win in five encounters and made it five out of six on the season when the pair

Gil Shellhouse for the extra points. The loss was the fourth against one win and a tie for the Comets, co-champions with Huron in 1960.

Sailors Get Even

Vermilion evened its record for the third time this year by shutting out Clearview with touchdowns in the third and fourth periods.

The Sailors pushed across their first marker in the third quarter with halfback Mike Brothers racing the last 7 yards and another touchdown with Neptune hitting

Clearview advanced to Vermilion's 1 and a first down in the last canto, but couldn't push the ball over in four tries and this tremendous defensive effort carried Jerry Martin's young club to its third win and now stand at two wins and a setback in the L.C. land.

Wildcats Score First

New London absorbed its fourth defeat of the year in six outings when Midview posted six points in each of the first two quarters and eight markers apiece in the third and fourth cantos. The Wildcats tallied first and last, but the Middies held the upper hand in between.

The Wildcats scored when Bill Damron scooted 7 yards and the veteran back carried over for the bonus points as well. Midview came back with fullback Ken Mazurek punching over from the 1-foot line, but the PAT attempt was foiled and New London held a slim 8-6 advantage.

Midview moved ahead for good in the second period with Al Stacey's run covering 15 yards and Mazurek cracked into paydirt from 4 yards out in the third canto and added the bonus points to make it 20-8. Mazurek accounted for his third touchdown of the night in the final period on a 2-yard thrust and again pushed over the two-point conversion.

The Wildcats struck through the air lanes in the fourth stanza with quarterback hitting his favorite target, Jerry Steinke, for 20 yards and the six points. Alan Grilley added the extra points.

The statistics were quite even with Midview holding a 16-12 edge in first downs, and 269-251 in total yardage. New London connected on half of its 10 aerials with the winners hitting on two of five.

Weaver Scoots 61

In the third period, on the first play following a long Admiral King punt to the Mansfield 39, Henry Weaver darted 61 yards to the end zone for the equalizer. Weaver was snowed under trying to turn end on the PAT attempt.

Weaver, who was held to 5 yards during the whole first half, wound up with 154 yards for the game in 20 carries, much of his ball-toting service coming in the late stages in a drive that reached the Admiral King 9-yard stripe.

Mansfield had a string of five straight victories going into the game, while Admiral King now sports a 2-3-1 log. It was the second straight impressive appearance for the new Lorain school, the Admirals bouncing back from a 52-14 butchering at Sandusky to hand Cleveland St. Joseph its first loss last week, 24-8.

Mike Souchak, United States, beat Ralph Moffitt, 5 and 4.

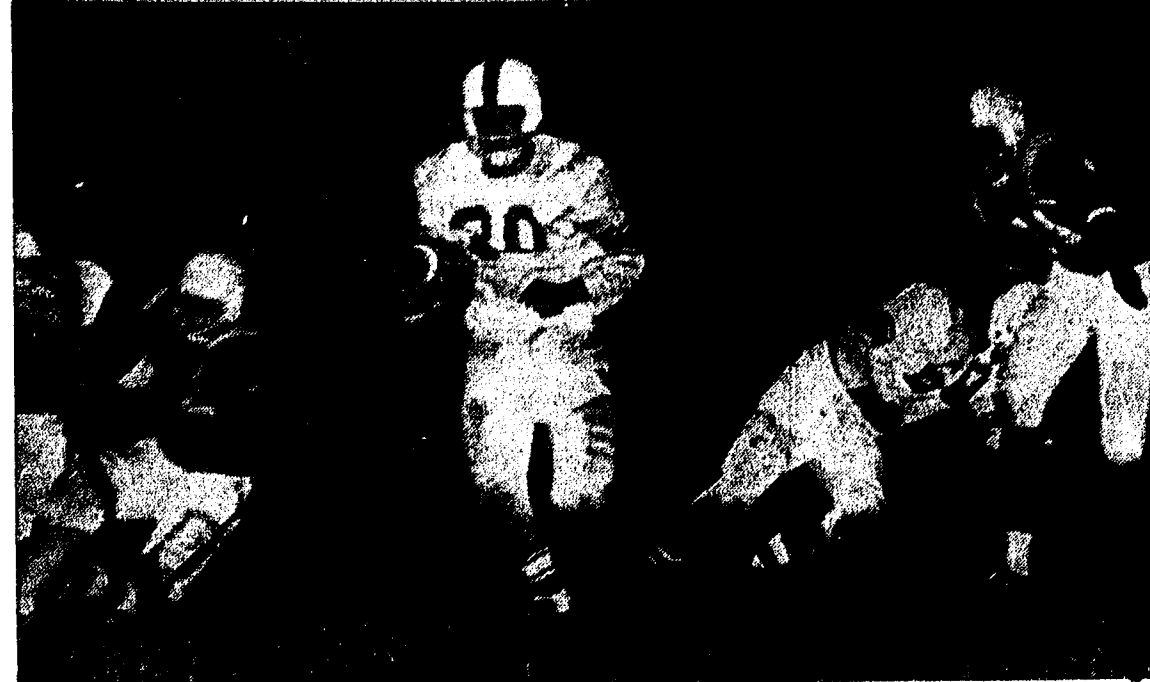
Bill Casper, United States, beat Ken Bousfield, 5 and 3.

Colorado Halts Miami On Foot Line In 9-7 Victory

Associated Press Sports Writer Colorado used a tough, alert defense and Detroit a brilliant quarterback as the keys for their victories Friday night—each preserving an unbeaten season—as the college football season headed into a Big Ten-dominated weekend.

Colorado, shooting for the Big Eight championship and a post-season trip to the Orange Bowl, showed the bowl committee a determined defense which pounced on a fourth-quarter fumble that set up the winning field goal in a 9-7 victory over injury-weakened Miami.

Junior quarterback Jerry Gross passed for 196 yards—including scoring strikes of 43 and 57 yards—in leading Detroit to a 20-3 conquest of Boston College.

Features of the Saturday slate include three Big Ten games, topped by the Michigan-Michigan State clash in Ann Arbor, Mich. A crowd of about 101,000, plus a national television audience, is expected to watch the struggle between the fifth-ranked Michigan and sixth-ranked State.

Other key contests in the conference include second-ranked Iowa (2-0) opening conference play against winless Indiana (0-2), and seventh-ranked Ohio State

(1-1-0) league opener against Illinois (0-2).

Colorado halted a 78-yard Miami drive one foot from its goal in the first period, then turned around and launched a 99-yard march of its own for a 6-0 half-time lead. Miami was on the Colorado five when the half ended.

The Buffaloes went up 9-0 in the last quarter when big Jerry Hillebrand pounced on a Miami fumble that paved the way for his 37-yard field goal. The three points proved decisive as Miami drove 62 yards to score with four minutes left. John Bennett's 25-yard pass to Bill Miller scored the touchdown.

In Detroit, the gritty little (5-foot-9) Gross was the big show. He entered the game fourth in the nation in individual total offense, and boosted his total to 611 yards passing and 96 running in three games.

Top games outside the Big Ten today include Mississippi, No. 1 in the latest Associated Press poll, seeking to extend its unbeaten string to 19 games against Houston.

Alabama (3-0), ranked third, goes against North Carolina State (1-2), while Coach Darrell Royal of fourth-ranked Texas figures to take his fourth straight decision over winless Oklahoma, where Royal starred for Sooners coach Bud Wilkinson.

Southern California, which just missed, 35-34, against Iowa last week goes against eight-ranked Notre Dame. Baylor, No. 9 takes on tough (2-1) Arkansas, and 10th-ranked Maryland goes against North Carolina.

Bayer Hangs On To Lead Over Nichols

ONTARIO, Calif. (AP)—Miami's George Bayer is still in front at the half-way mark in the \$20,000 Ontario Open Golf Tournament.

The hard-driving Bayer, who had a course-record-setting 64 in the first round, slipped to a one-over-par 71 Friday but still is two strokes in front of young Bobby Nichols of Midland, Tex. Nichols, former Texas A&M golfer, shot a 71 over the wind-lashed Whispering Lakes course and has 137 for the two rounds.

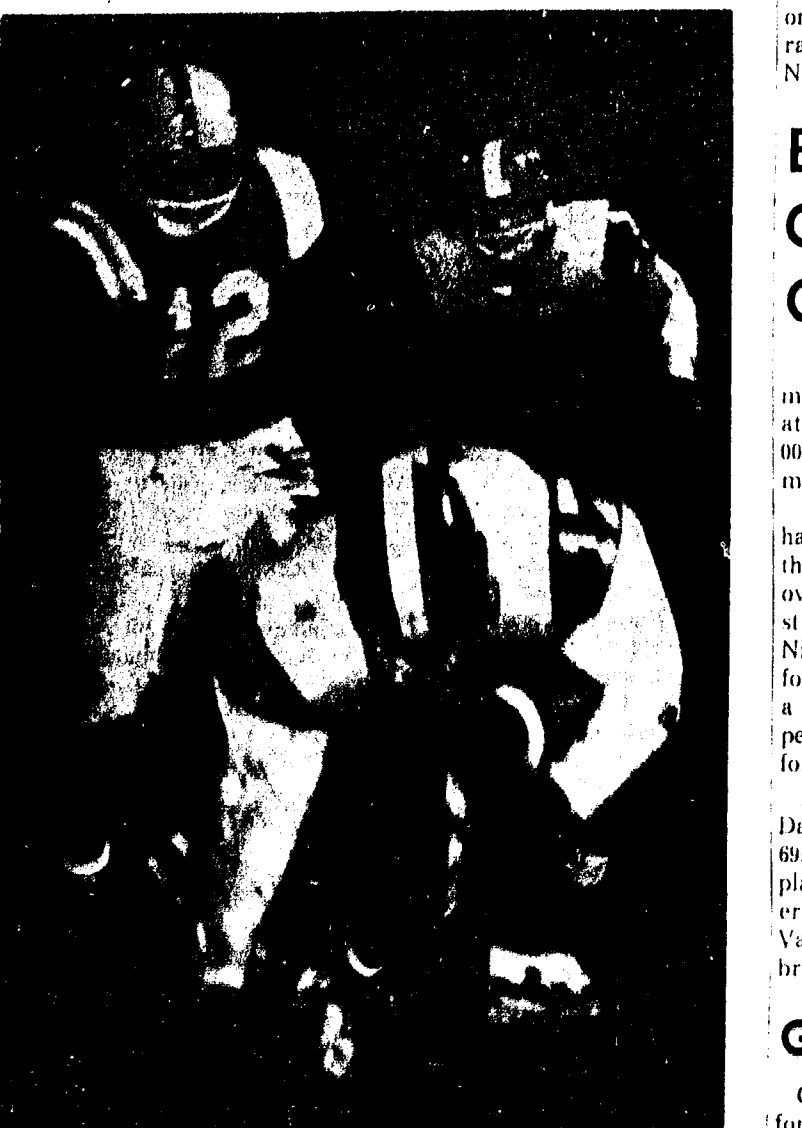
