Mantle Probable Starter In Game Today

CINCINNATI, Ohio (AP) — The World Series plunged into its third game today with the New York Yankees fretting over the landscaping of compact Crosley Field and the steamed-up Cincinnati Reds scenting a second successive series victory.

Despite their 2-1 betting edge, the pressure definitely was on the aching Yankees as the series, after a one-day layoff, resumed in perfect weather before an overflow crowd of 32,000 mainly wild-eyed Redleg partisans.

Starting time is 1 p.m. EST.

Must Win Sunday

St. Mary's Fights For 'Gold Football'

St. Mary's will be meeting Fremont St. Joe in the 10th renewal of the "golden football" series at Harmon Field in Fremont Sunday afternoon and the Panthers risk the chance of losing the traveling trophy for good if they fail to come up with a win.

The miniature football was initiated in 1952 by students at St. Mary's and possession will be permanent when one of the schools captures three grid wins in succession. St. Joe has threatened twice before to keep the trophy and could accomplish the feat Sunday by winning.

Panther fans well remember 1960 when the Crimson Streaks handed the local club their worst defeat in the history of gridiron clashes, 68-0, and Don Smeznik's injury-riddled club would like nothing more than to snap their 17-game losing streak at the hands of the fierce arch-rivals.

Injuries have caused five grid-ders to miss action altogether and four more are on the doubtful list, leaving the Panthers offensive unit without a senior.

St. Joe coach Bob Smith has scouted St. Mary's in each of its four losing appearances this season, but in each case, has seen a revamped backfield which will be changed again this week with sophomores Mike White and Mark Sidner moving into the starting alignment.

The Streaks have divided their first four outings, but have captured 14 SBC victories in their last 15 encounters and could move into a tie for the conference lead with Tiffin Calvert by winning. Kickoff time is slated for 2 o'clock.

Clyde, Calvert Post Shutout SBC Verdicts

Tiffin Calvert and Clyde posted shutout wins in the Sandusky Bay Conference Friday night, the unbeaten Senecas brushing off Lakota, 16-0, and the Fliers scoring late in the fourth period to nip Oak Harbor, 8-0.

Bob Albus ran 34 yards in the

second period and Tony Reed cracked over from the one in the third stanza as Calvert registered its fifth straight season victory and moved into the lead spot in the SBC with a 3-0 record.

The loss was Lakota's second in five starts.

Clyde broke a scoreless battle in the late stages of the final quarter on Jeff Pump's 33-yard run off left tackle with 3:53 to go and Frank Slessman added the bonus points.

The Fliers had three previous threats halted until the speedy halfback broke loose.

Oak Harbor came roaring back with the ensuing kickoff and marched all the way to Clyde's 10 before being halted on downs with 44 seconds left.

Roger Dick and Tom Kowalski were outstanding on defense for the Fliers who are now 3-2 on the season and 3-1 in the conference.

Compared with New York where neither of the first two games drew capacity, the series fever is burning at terrific pitch in this Ohio River metropolis.

Gaudy and giant signs everywhere exhort a Redleg victory, and the man in the street is a red-hot baseball fan. Tickets are going at scalpers' prices, one businessman being arrested for exacting \$600-\$80 a ticket—for a dozen \$7.50 seats.

A typical series touch appeared in a downtown restaurant window. It read: "Special today: Roast crow for our N.Y. friends."

Both clubs were down to their No. 3 first-line pitchers—Cincinnati's Bob Purkey, 32, a knuckleballer, facing New York's Bill Stafford, who just completed his first full major-league season. Purkey had a 16-12 regular season mark, and Stafford, also a right-hander, had 14-9.

In Friday's workout in freshly, all-white painted Crosley Park, the Yankees were obviously concerned over the lush infield grass and the sharply-terraced outfield perimeter which, it is said, is mounded over utility pipes.

It was reported the quite high infield grass, which would slow down rollers considerably, would be trimmed before game time. Consensus is that the Yankees have a better defensive infield than the Reds and would profit less from any grassy assistance.

As for the outfield terrace, it begins to rise some 20 feet from the walls and the pitch is especially sharp in left field where Yankee Yogi Berra customarily plays his "side-saddle" defensive game.

This is a game in which the benched Mickey Mantle could turn the tide for the Yankees, who have had absolutely no help from their famed and fabled M&M home-run combination. Roger Maris, who set the all-time season homer mark of 61, has yet to hit the ball out of the infield in this series.

Maris failed to reach the Crosley Field 360-foot right-field bleacher mark in Friday's batting drill. But Mantle, who missed the two New York games because of an infected hip, swung an explosive bat in practice. He boomed four balls into the right-field stands, two into the center-field stands—batting left handed—and lofted two over the left-field wall at the 340-foot mark hitting right-handed.

The Tigers came right back to march 51 yards after the free kick with Dan Bunn covering the last 21 on a rollout.

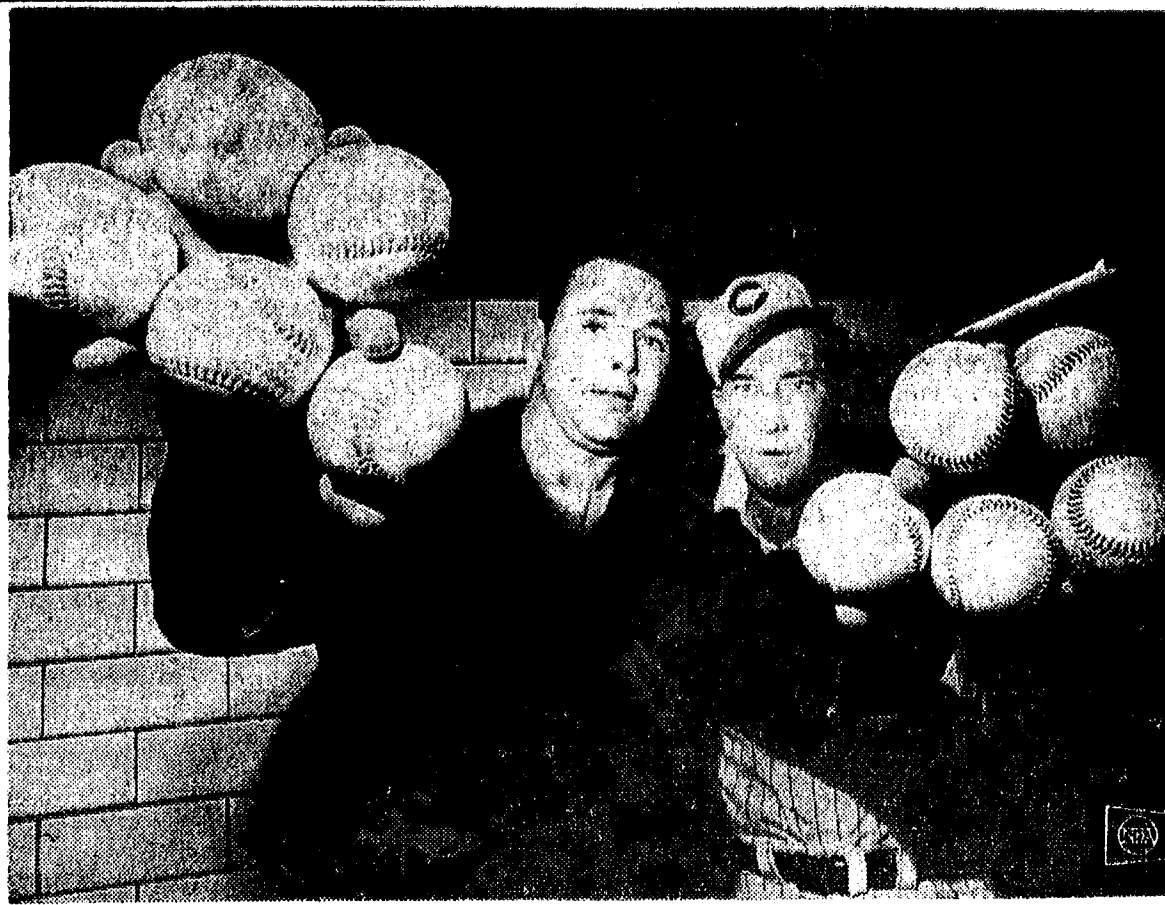

St. Wendelin Cops Seaway Top Position

Fostoria St. Wendelin holds undisputed possession of the Seaway Conference lead today following Friday's action in which the Mohawks knocked off Gibsonburg, 20-8, and Ottawa Hills suffered its first loss of the season, to North Baltimore, 16-14.

The Mohawks ran their undefeated streak to five games, two in the conference, with Jim Banks grabbing touchdown passes of 31 and 22 yards from Mike Faber. Jim Zender also scored on a five-yard run with Gibsonburg's lone tally coming late in the game on Steve Newcomer's short plunge.

Ottawa Hills, winner of four games in succession and unscathed on, dropped the narrow decision to North Baltimore after building up a 14-0 lead in the first quarter. Dick Clark provided the deciding points for North Baltimore by passing to Dale Spier after the second touchdown after scoring the first PAT himself on a run.

Marshall To Change Vote After Sunday

CLEVELAND (AP) — George Preston Marshall, president of the Washington Redskins, has sided with the Cleveland Browns' Dick Schafrath for Sunday's game between the Redskins and Browns at Municipal Stadium.

Marshall cast the only dissenting vote when National Football League owners were asked to waive an ancient league rule prohibiting servicemen from playing in league games. He indicated he would switch his vote when another telegraphic poll is taken Monday.

Schafrath, the Browns' regular left offensive tackle, went on active duty with the Air National Guard at Mansfield last Monday. The following day he received permission from his superiors to play football when it didn't interfere with his military duty. Sunday is an off day for him.

However, unanimous approval must be received from owners of NFL teams before servicemen can participate in league games.

Coach Paul Brown said Friday night that Ed Nutting, a rookie from Georgia, and veteran Lou Groza, who has been confining his activity to place-kicking, will fill in for Schafrath.

Marshall earlier this week recalled for Washington reporters an incident in 1950 when the Browns refused him permission to activate a player for one game.

Sammy Baugh was injured and Marshall didn't want his team to play Cleveland with Harry Gilmer as its only quarterback. He requested that Tommy Mont, an assistant coach, be allowed to play.

"Paul Brown wouldn't permit it," Marshall said.

CINCINNATI (AP)—World Series ticket scalpers went into action here before the baseball players did.

Play between the New York Yankees and the Cincinnati Reds starts today. Police nabbed a ticket scalper Friday afternoon.

He was identified as Louis Glenn Wilkins, 58, a parking meter salesman. According to police he sold 12 grandstand tickets, worth \$7.20 each, to a detective for \$600.

A city ordinance allows persons to set up ticket brokers' offices for a \$1,000 fee.

No brokers' licenses have been sold here. But earlier this week, a Cincinnati man named Joseph Dermer took out a ticket brokers' license across the Ohio River in Newport, Ky., where the annual fee is only \$750.

Ross Throttles Findlay, 20-8

Fremont Ross joined Sandusky and Marion Harding at the top of the Buckeye Conference standings Friday night by turning back Findlay, 20-8.

Sandusky had earlier nipped Elyria, 16-14, and Marion jolted Lorain, 28-6, with the loop in its final season as a six-team operation. Mansfield and Lorain Admiral King will become BC members in 1962.

A full loop slate is on tap next week with Sandusky at Fremont, Elyria at Marion and Lorain at Findlay.

Sandusky was the only winner, 46-14 over Toledo Whitmer, in non-loop action Friday. Marion was

upended by Toledo Scott, 16-0. Lorain lost at Mansfield, 37-0, and Elyria bowed to Cuyahoga Falls, 28-6.

Findlay broke on top against the Little Giants in the first quarter when quarterback Chuck Reinand passed 24 yards to fullback Tom Williams and to fullback Steve Siford for the bonus points.

Fremont completely dominated action from that point, pulling up 8-6 in the first period when halfback Steve Frontz went 4 yards to climax a 68-yard push.

The winners completed their scoring in the second canto. After a fumble recovery on the Findlay 25, Frontz scored from the 2 on the fourth play and quarterback Guy Nuhler added the PAT for a 14-8 lead. Later, fullback Jack Ziemke capped a 67-yard move with a 1-yard plunge.

Ziemke, an 180-pound junior, picked up 124 yards for Mal Mackey's club in 24 carries.

Potent Tiger Passing
Unbeaten Mansfield scored in every quarter against the Steelers and unveiled a potent passing combination in the process as quarterback Don Cole hit end Elroy Allen on scoring plays covering 10, 5 and 20 yards.

Henry Weaver scored on a 27-yard scamper for the Tiggers. Elyria was blanked for three quarters by Cuyahoga Falls before Jim Burnett cracked over from the 2 late in the game.

Scott scored in the middle quarters to hand Marion its first loss at home since 1957.

Allen Smith, who is the state Class AA broad jump champion, scored on runs of 11 and 6 yards after marches covering 35 and 48 yards.

The Prexies threatened only once and had three passes intercepted.

Miteff Tests Clay Tonight

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Can Olympic champion Cassius Clay take a real hard punch?

That question will be answered tonight when the 19-year-old Louisvillean meets Argentina's rugged Alex Miteff in a scheduled 10-round nationally televised (ABC TV, 9 p.m. EST) boxing match at Freedom Hall. Clay is rated the 2-1 favorite.

Both heavyweights are expected to be in peak condition for the bout. Clay, who won the Olympic light heavyweight title last summer at Rome, will weigh in at about 192 against Miteff's 205 pounds.

Clay has an 8-0 record as a professional. The 26-year-old Miteff has compiled a 24-10-1 mark. He has kayoed 14 of his victims.
