

Eager Reds Trying Too Hard In Race

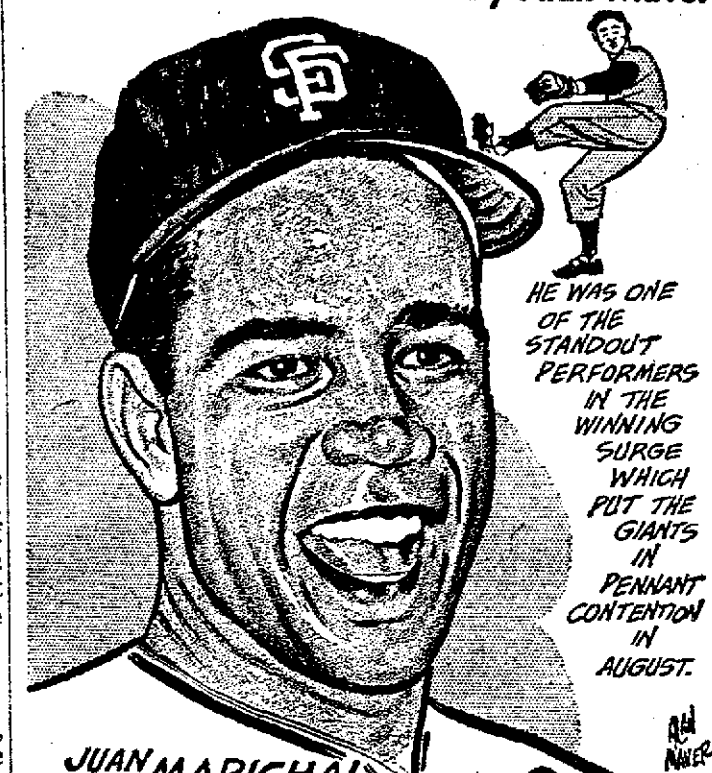
CINCINNATI (AP) — The Cincinnati Reds are too eager for their own good to win the National League pennant, according to a man who ought to know — Manager Fred Hutchinson.

The Reds have been playing only 500 ball since regaining first place from the Los Angeles Dodgers on Aug. 16. The Dodgers now are right at their heels, trailing by only one game.

Hutchinson says the trouble is "too many players are trying too hard."

"I suppose it's only natural, especially at this period of the pennant race," said the usually dour Hutchinson, whose team starts a three-

Part of the Reds' troubles, Hutchinson admitted, are due to Frank Robinson's batting slump. The slugging right fielder had only five hits in 27 times at bat during the eight-game road trip that ended last night.

"I'm sure our pitching is better than it has been recently," Hutch said after appointing Jimmy O'Toole to start tonight.

O'Toole, who owns a 14-9 record, has lost two to the Cardinals. The probable St. Louis starter, Curt Simmons, has won eight and lost 10, including three to Cincinnati.

Plymouth To Open Rebuilding Season

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The Big Red, suffering the loss of its entire starting backfield and most of the line through graduation, begins the long grind of rebuilding.

But with ten letter-winning players returning, the road to victory may be shorter than it appears.

Quarterback Jim Hamman could easily step into the spot left empty by Dayton Reed. Hamman will be joined by two other junior vets in the backfield, Fullback Gary Utiss and Halfback Roger McQuown.

Coach Bill Ramsey, in his first year at Plymouth, is also expecting Phil Fletcher to produce at halfback. He is a sophomore monogram holder.

Plymouth opens a ten-game schedule tomorrow night at Colonel Crawford. The test will be a good one to start with, since the Colonels, although only in the second year of football, are expected to be a rugged foe.

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Dallas Possesses Champion Material

DALLAS, Tex. (UPI) — Coach Henry Stram of the Dallas Texans thinks his club "has the makings" of an American Football League champion.

Stram, who kicked around for years as a top - grade assistant coach until wealthy Texan owner Lamar Hunt picked him for his first head coaching challenge, says the 1961 Texans "have a good share of talent, a world of enthusiasm and a fine mental attitude."

"In any championship race, you need all three of these ingredients plus a good share of the breaks," he says. "With a few good breaks the Texans can be champions."

The breaks went the other way last season, the infant league's first sortie against the rival National Football League, and the Texans wound up no better than second to the Los Angeles now San Diego Chargers, although blanking the last three teams on the schedule.

Injuries to key personnel, augmented by what appeared to be a lapse in attitude contributed mightily to a mid-season slump that cost the Texans at least a divisional crown.

GOOD CHOICE

Stram is high on his top draft choice rookies — E. J. "The Beast" Holub of Texas Tech, who already has proven ability at offensive center or linebacker; End Fred Arbanas of Michigan State; Tackle Jim Tyrer of Ohio State, and defensive end-tackle Jerry Mays of Southern Methodist.

Add these ingredients to a mixture that includes such carryovers as Abner Haynes, the league's "most exciting player" who led the circuit in rushing and punt returns, ranked high in pass receiving and kickoff runbacks; his halfback teammate, Johnny Robinson, who is equally adept in these departments; agile fullback Jack Spikes, whose place - kicking made him the No. 3 loop scorer; and two fine quarterbacks, Cotton Davidson and Hunter Enis, and it's easy to share Stram's optimism.

TOUGH DEFENSE

Texas quality doesn't stop there, either. For, returning is virtually the same defense that turned in five whitewash jobs on league foes a year ago—Ends Paul Miller and Mel Branch; Middle Linemen Ray Collins, Paul Rochester and Buffalo Napier; Linebackers Sherrill Headrick, Smokey Stover and Ted Greene, and Deep Backs David Webster, Don Flynn and Duane Wood.

Holub, Mays and Halfbacks Cedric Price of Kansas State and Ed Kelley of Texas seem destined to force their way into this defensive alignment. Price is a real surprise since he gained fame mostly as a

basketball player in college. The shock troops in front of Davidson, Haynes, Robinson and Spikes include Steller returning Guards Bill Krisher and Sid Fournet and a sophomore fill-in Marvin Terrell; Tackles Jerry Cornelison and Charley Diamond, and Center Jim Barton.

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Coach Lloyd Dunne, in his first year at the Arrow helm, is putting his newly-developed double-wing attack to use tonight.

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
