Sandusky won the first half and Mansfield the second last night.

However, the Tygers made their "victory" the more impressive as they scored three touchdowns after intermission and blanked the Blue Streaks at the same time.

Actually the Tygers had the ball for only nine running plays and two passes in the first half as Sandusky ground out yardage slowly and surely to build up a 14-0 lead. The Tygers gained 143 of their 188 ground yards in the second half and Sandusky got 135 of its 190 in the first half.

Steward Williams, the 212-pound junior fullback, surely lived up to his press clippings. The big fellow ground out 96 yards in 22 carries. However, it was the first time he was held under 136 yards as he piled up 1-155 yards. He had been averaging 8.1 per carry but last night got only 4.4.

Halfback Tom Rutger, playing his first game, added 59 on 13 carries. He had been out with injuries.

Mansfield's Henry Weaver carved out 81 yards on 15 thrusts and little Johnny Brooks picked up 50 on nine tries.

Don Cole's touchdown last night was the first he has scored since his sophomore year when he collected a pair of six-pointers.

His pay-off pass to Elroy Allen in the second quarter marked the sixth time this combination has clicked for touchdowns. Allen now boasts 12 pass receptions—seven for touchdowns.

Three bands performed last night — two from Mansfield and one from Sandusky.

The Tyger-sophomore band played before the game while the varsity unit shared half-time with the Blue Streak musicians.

Theme of the varsity show was "Popular Tunes for Popular Girls" as it saluted Queen Donna Brubaker and her court. Tunes were "Exodus," "Hey Look Me Over," "Five Foot Two, Eyes of Blue," "Oh, You Beautiful Doll" and "My Bonnie Liesie."

Mansfield victory last night broke a three-game Sandusky winning streak in the series which began in 1904. The Tygers nod lead the overall series with 15 victories to 13 for Sandusky.

Madison Wins Cardinal Crown, 12 To 8

Rams Beat Wooster In Loop Game

WOOSTER — Undefeated Mansfield Madison reigns today as football champion of the Cardinal Conference.

The once - tied Rams parlayed two long marches in the first half into a 12-8 victory over the Wooster Generals here last night. The defeat was the first for Wooster (1-6-1) in the four - school league before a crowd of 4,000 persons.

DEFENSIVE BATTLE

Wooster also scored in the second quarter and the game became a defensive battle after intermission. The only threat in the second half ended when Wooster hurled back the Rams on the 11-yard line with 65 seconds remaining. Madison had marched 72 yards with the aid of two Wooster 15-yard penalties.

Quarterback Joe Pearce scored the first Madison touchdown from one-yard out and Sophomore Jerry Hamler, fresh off the injury list, broke 60 yards up the middle for the second. He shook a host of tacklers loose on the way to the touchdown which meant the Cardinal title.

Madison drove 71 yards to the Wooster eight the first time it got the ball but a 15-yard penalty stopped the thrust. The Rams held and Bill Braund punted out to the Wooster 44.

Halfback Gerry Nunn ran off tackle eight yards and Pearce circled end for 35 yards to the one. He cracked into the end zone on a quarterback kick.

FINE BLOCKING

Wooster came right back and surged 52 yards to the Madison 15 where a fumble gave Madison the ball. Six Madison ground plays moved the ball out to the 40 and the chunky sophomore went the final 60 behind fine blocking.

Braund returned the following kickoff 21 yards to his own 46. Five running plays gave Wooster a first down on the Madison 23. Only one minute remained in the first half when Tom Flockinger passed to Eddie Bell inside the five-yard line and the Wooster halfback darted into the end zone.

Madison plays rugged Toledo Macomber at home next Saturday night. Macomber this week was rated 11th in Ohio.

Lymie Norton scored a late-afternoon, late-season hole in one on the 152-yard sixth hole at Westbrook Country Club yesterday.

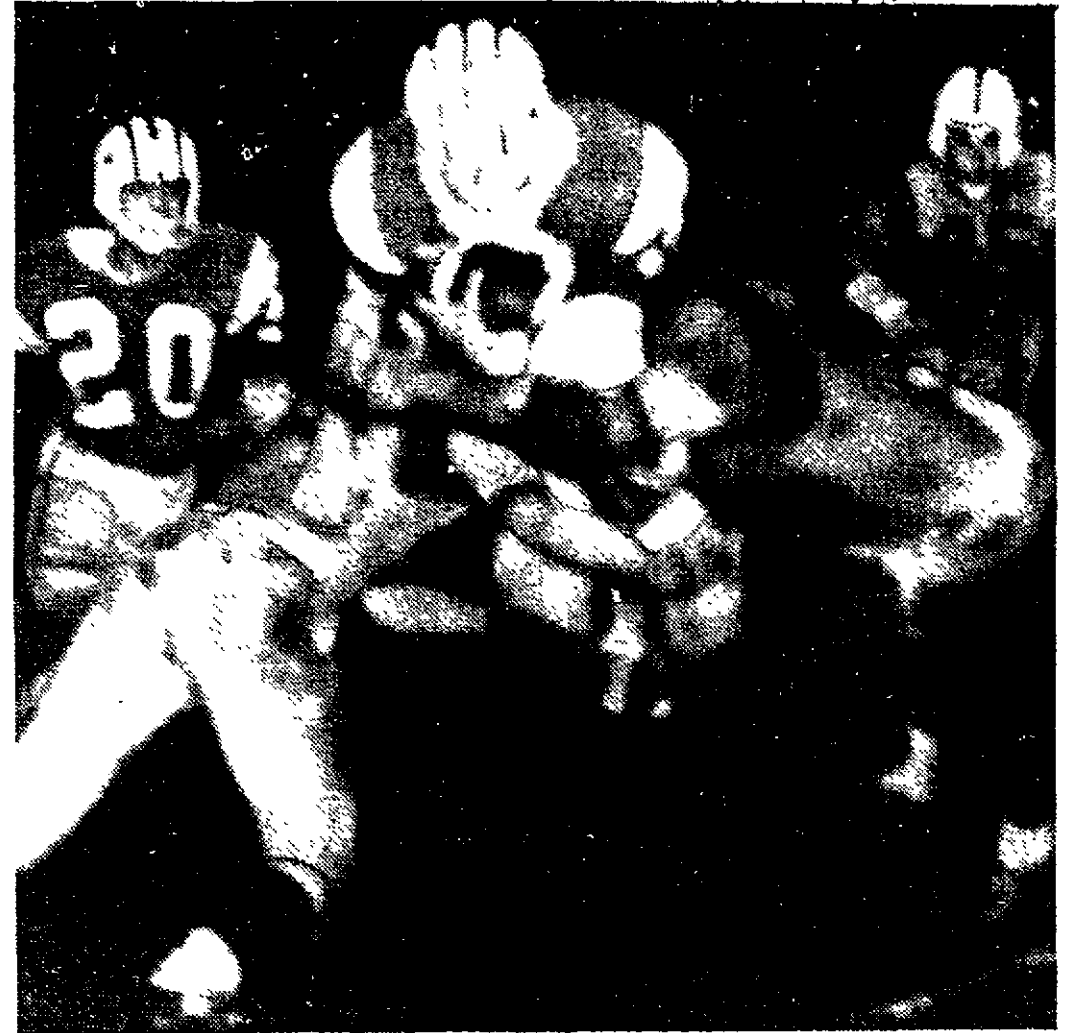
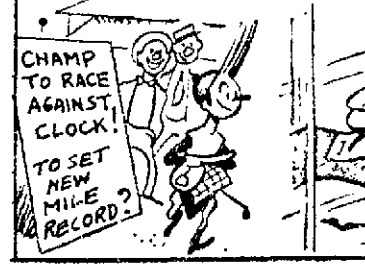
Using an eight iron, Norton said that the ball hit about eight feet from the pin, bounced once, and rolled in.

PLYMOUTH — A safety in the final five minutes projected Plymouth's Big Red to its first football victory of 1961 here last night.

The Big Red had suffered through six straight defeats since tying Colonel Crawford in its opener 6-6. Then last night fortunes turned as Plymouth's alert defense paid off in a 10-8 victory over a Ridgedale grid machine, which lost for the seventh time in eight contests.

Plymouth marched to the Ridgedale one in the final quarter only to run out of downs. However, on the first play Steve Craycraft tried to run the ball out of the end zone but a crashing tackle by Gary Utss brought him down for the two points which ended the victory famine for the Big Red.

Sam Snead Trailing In Golf Meet

HUNTINGTON, W. Va. (AP) — It was 25 years ago when Sam Snead, then at the age of 24, burst from virtual obscurity to win the first annual West Virginia State Open Golf Tournament. The year was 1936. The victory at Huntington was the biggest of his young career.

Today, at the start of the second round of the 25th annual state open, Snead found himself one stroke behind the 24-year-old pacesetter Roy Shreves, a relatively obscure pro from Sisterville.

Shreves conquered the par 70 Riviera Country Club course with a 64 Friday.

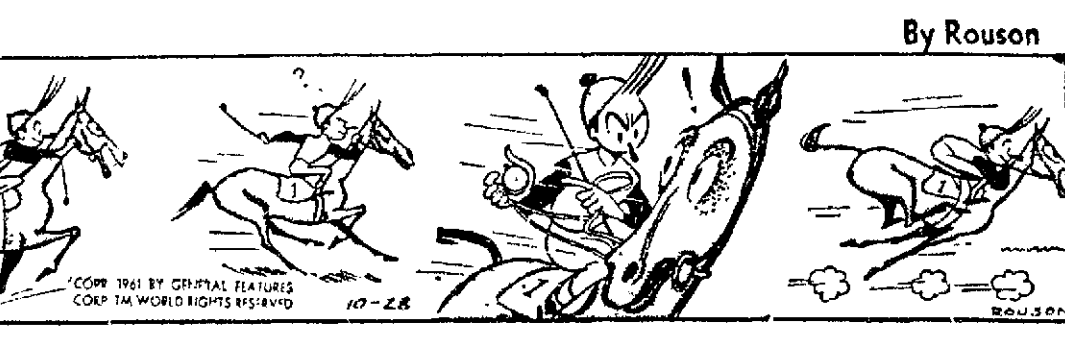
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Freds Win, Crestline Falls; Mohican Clubs Play Tonight
