

Calvert Power Wears Down St. Mary's

Tiffin Calvert's power was just too much for St. Mary's to overcome as the Panthers dropped a 26-0 decision to the undefeated Senecas in a Sandusky Bay Conference meeting Friday.

The Panthers were in contention until midway through the third period when Calvert moved out to a 14-0 lead after holding a 6-0 halftime edge.

Don Smeznik's offensive unit sputtered again and the defense just couldn't contain the hosts in the second half. Tiffin had a weight advantage of 20 pounds per man up front and it took its toll in the last two quarters.

The defensive unit was given a rugged workout due to the Panthers' inability to move with the pigskin.

St. Mary's had just 29 rushing attempts for the night and wound up with a net total of 23 yards for less than 1 yard per carry.

Panthers Trail 6-0 At Half, Lose 26-0

Calvert gained 156 yards in 41 tries for a 3.8 average with its fine fullback Bob Albus carrying the load.

Albus, 184-pound senior and another of Calvert's long list of hard-running fullbacks, gained 114 yards in 23 attempts and was called upon mostly in the second

half and picked up 50 of the Senecas' 65 yards in the drive to their second touchdown of the night.

He had the ball on 10 of the 16 plays Calvert needed the first time they gained possession in the second half.

Miss Chance

St. Mary's actually had an excellent chance to go off at intermission with a lead, but couldn't cash in on a recovery of a fumble, pass interception or a fine run-back of a punt.

The Panthers kicked off and promptly went to the offense when Jon Ritzenthaler recovered Tony Reed's fumble on the opening kickoff.

The locals were stopped on the 22 when Tom Biehl netted one yard on a fourth and three play. Calvert was forced to punt after picking up one first down and John Eschels returned the kick from midfield to Tiffin's 38 and could have gone all the way if he received just one block.

The 175-pound senior had four

blockers in front of him compared to just one defender, but the Calvert player slipped in to make the tackle or the locals would have broken on top.

Calvert started a drive late in the first period, but was halted on the 12.

However, they marched off with

a 6-0 advantage when Tony Reed intercepted a pass by Dennis Kennedy which went behind his intended receiver. Reed grabbed the aerial on the Panther 38 and just managed to hit paydirt with two tacklers hanging on with 1:38 remaining in the half.

The Senecas proceeded to

score the first time they had the ball in the second half with their 65-yard march in 15 plays which took almost the entire period to cover.

Albus rammed off-tackle for the final seven with 2:00 left and Reed connected with Dave Williams for the PAT.

St. Mary's fumbled on a hand-off on the first play they had from scrimmage in the fourth period and Calvert promptly

turned it into another touchdown after Williams recovered on the 12. After Williams advanced to the 11, Reed left left end Alex Carlo for the score who was all alone in the end zone and it was 20-0 with 7:51 left to play.

Go 72 in 6 Plays

Calvert displayed its great power and fine passing in its next march, going 72 yards after a Panther punt in six plays and four consecutive first downs.

Reed, 170-pound senior veteran and a fine passer who connected on nine of 14 for the night and 145 yards, hit right end Jack Hoffmann for 22 and Williams for 17 before finding Carlo alone again in the end zone for a 20-yard scoring play with 1:38 yet to go.

Paul Millett still wanted his squad to get more and they came within one yard of doing so.

Bill Welty recovered a St. Mary's fumble on the kickoff and Reed immediately went to the air, tossing a strike to Mike Hoffert for 20 yards to the 27. A pass interference play against the locals set the ball on the 1, but Reed was stopped twice in an effort to boost the score before time ran out.

St. Mary's winds up its season Saturday night in playing host to Mohawk at Strobel Field with a 1-7 record. The Panthers have been rapidly improving on defense, but they just can't seem to move with the ball when they do have it.

Calvert is now 8-0 on the year and the win assured the Senecas of at least a tie and they can wrap up the title Nov. 11 against Mohawk.

Ferguson Is Replacement For Renfro

CLEVELAND (AP)—Coach Paul Brown says rookie Charley Ferguson will start at right halfback for the Cleveland Browns Sunday against the Cardinals in St. Louis, replacing Ray Renfro.

Announcing the change Friday Brown said Renfro is hampered by a bruised thigh suffered in the Pittsburgh game last Sunday and will be used only in emergency.

Leon Clarke, who has been alternating with Gern Nagler at the slot end and running in the plays, also is ready for duty at the flanking spot. Clarke suffered a broken finger in Pittsburgh, but it hasn't hampered his pass catching.

Vince Costello also may open at left line backer in place of Gale Fiss, who has a pulled thigh muscle. Fiss, like Renfro, can be used in an emergency.

Brown feels the Cardinals are stronger offensively than they were last month when the Browns beat them 20-17 on a field goal by Lou Groza.

The Cardinals haven't beaten the Browns since 1956 and have only two victories and a tie in 23 games between the two teams since 1950.

Safety Puts Plymouth In Win Column

A safety in the fourth period enabled Plymouth to get into the win column for the first time this season Friday as they pinned a 10-8 setback on visiting Ridgedale.

The Big Red, who managed only one tie in their seven previous outings, were stopped on the 1 in the final period and Ridgedale gained possession, but the hosts picked up the deciding points when Gary Utiss tackled Steve Craycraft in the end zone as the latter was attempting to pass.

Utiss had sent the Big Red out front in the second quarter when he slashed off left tackle from 4 yards out and Jim Hamman rolled out to the right to add the bonus points.

Ridgedale knotted the count later in the period with the brother combination of Steve and Jim Craycraft working to perfection for 41 yards over the middle and the pair teamed up on a quick pass to add the PAT.

Plymouth wound up with 287 total yards, 273 coming on the ground, while Ridgedale gained 156 rushing and 99 through the air.

Winless Clubs Get Second Tries At Eastern Leaders

Winless Washington and thrice-beaten Dallas are in spoiler spots — potential jugglers of the Eastern Division standings — as the National Football League hits midseason Sunday.

They play rematches with Eastern coleaders Philadelphia and New York, and each is a decided underdog. Dallas is at New York and Philadelphia at Washington.

At a glance, it would appear to be a 'breather' for both the Eagles and Giants. But each was

pressed to the limit by its opponent the first time around this season.

Washington, 0-6, which hasn't won in 14 games, came close against the powerful Eagles early this season. A pair of third-period touchdowns passes by Sonny Jurgensen pulled out a 14-7 Philadelphia victory.

And Dallas, 3-3, was driving for the tying touchdown two weeks ago when Erich Barnes intercepted a pass and ran 102 yards for a Giant touchdown that turned the tide in a 31-10 victory.

Washington's chore would appear to be the toughest. The Redskins' youngsters just haven't been able to get sorted out yet, while the powerful Eagles got their running attack in gear last week.

In the others, Cleveland, 4-2, Bay, 5-1, goes against the Minnesota Vikings, 1-5, for the second straight week, and San Francisco, 4-2, will try to recharge its shotgun offense at Pittsburgh, 1-5.

In the others, Cleveland, 4-2, visits St. Louis, 3-3, Chicago, 4-2, visits the Baltimore Colts, 3-3, and Detroit, 3-3, tries the revamped Los Angeles Rams, 1-5.

NCAA Gathering Facts

Grid Injuries Under Scrutiny

NEW YORK (AP) — The chairman of the NCAA committee on football injuries said today he has become highly suspicious of the helmet and face protector.

"I'm speaking only for myself," said Ernie McCoy, Penn State athletic director, "but I am concerned about the helmet we have been using, and some changes may be required."

Already this season four collegians, two semipro players and 15 high school boys—a total of 21—have died, most as a result of injuries.

"We haven't come to any official conclusions yet," said McCoy. "We are gathering the facts. In fact, we have offered to take over some of the research that is being conducted by the coaches' committee on the subject."

McCoy said that he thinks the

plastic helmet and the protruding face guard have resulted in added danger.

"Furthermore," he said, "the way the boys tackle these days doesn't help. Almost all tackling is around the chest, with the hope of causing a fumble. That can snap the neck back."

"I remember in the days of Fielding Yost, he would get terribly upset if we tackled any where over the knees. How often do you see that today?"

McCoy said that his committee had taken a survey two years ago on injuries.

"We found some interesting things," he observed. "For one, we found that the biggest percentage of injuries occurred in the beginning of the third period of games. That would indicate that the boys have not been warming up enough before the second half. Perhaps we should make a compulsory rule that they warm up for five minutes."

"Then we found that most of the seasonal injuries took place in the first three weeks of practice. Perhaps the conclusion here is that there has been too much head-knocking at the start before the lads are properly trained."

Construction Starting Today On New York's New Stadium

NEW YORK (AP)—Ground will be broken today for the \$18 million, 55,000-seat Flushing Meadow stadium that will be the home park starting in 1963 for the New York Mets of the National Baseball League and the New York Titans of the American Football League.

The stadium will be located on the site of the 1939-40 World's Fair, and the site of the World's Fair planned for 1964 — about a 20-minute trip by car from midtown Manhattan.

The architects figure construction of the three-tiered, circular stadium will take at least 14 months.

The Mets, managed by Casey Stengel, will make their debut next spring and will play their games in the Polo Grounds, home of the Giants before they moved to San Francisco. The Titans have played their home games at the Polo Grounds since the AFL began in 1960.
